Generally, the data for both 1950 and 1945 are based upon the tabulation of reports for all farms in the county. However, the 1950 data for items followed by a star (%) represent estimates for all farms made on the basis of reports from a sample of approximately 20 percent of the farms.

Inventory items are for April 1, 1950 and January 1, 1965; and production items are for the calendar years 1949 and 1944.

FARM CENSUS SHOWS INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF FARMS IN HAWAII

There are 5,748 farms in Hawaii, according to preliminary figures for the 1950 Census of Agriculture released today by Roy V. Peel, Director of the Bureau of the Census.

Even though there was a change in the definition of a farm, there are about one-sixth more farms in Hawaii than there were in 1940. The greatest increase took place in Honolulu County where the number increased from 1,286 in 1940 to 1,827. In 1950, places of 3 or more acres were counted as farms only if agricultural products, exclusive of a home garden, with a value of \$150 or more were produced in 1949. Places of less than 3 acres were counted as farms only if the value of agricultural products sold amounted to \$150 or more. In the 1940 and 1930 censuses places of 3 or more acres were counted as farms if any agricultural products, other than a small home garden, were produced during the preceding year, while places of less than 3 acres were counted as farms if the agricultural production was valued at \$150 or more.

The value of farm land and buildings in Hawaii increased from almost 113 million dollars in 1940 to almost 200 million dollars in 1950. The average value of farm land and buildings rose from \$45.38 in 1940 to \$79.03 in 1950. About 3,800 of the 5.748 farms in the Territory had electricity in 1950. The number of farms reporting tractors more than quadrupled in the 10-year period from 1940 to 1950. In 1950, approximately one farm in six reported a tractor.

Expenditures for farm labor comprised the most important expenditure on Hawaiian farms in 1949, totaling more than 57 1/2 million dollars. Expenditures for feed for livestock and poultry totaled almost 6 1/2 million dollars, while those for gasoline and other petroleum fuel and oil products amounted to more than 5 1/2 million dollars. The value of all farm products sold from Hawaiian farms in 1949 totaled 164 1/2 million dollars, amounting to more than three times the value of farm products sold in 1939. Crops, including fruits and vegetables, accounted for more than 143 million dollars of the total sales, while livestock and livestock more than 143 million dollars of the total sales. The sales of whole milk from products amounted to approximately 21 million dollars. The sales of whole milk from Hawaiian farms increased from nearly 4 1/2 million gallons in 1939 to about 7 1/2 million gallons in 1949.

Almost twice as many chickens were on farms in 1950 as in 1940. The number of chickens on farms in the Territory on April 1, 1950, totaled 472,006 as compared with 272,590 in 1940. The number of chickens sold increased from 166,545 in 1939 to 613,746 in 1949. The acreage used for the production of vegetables for sale was more than 50 percent greater in 1949 than in 1939. Almost 5,000 acres were used for the production of vegetables for sale in 1949.

FARM CENSUS SHOWS CHANGES IN PUERTO RICO

The number of farms in Puerto Rico in 1950 was 53,515 or 2,004 less than in 1940, according to a special report released today by Roy V. Peel, Director of the Bureau of the Census. More than half the decrease in the number of farms during the decade resulted from the change in definition of a farm, whereby places containing less than three cuerdas were not counted as farms.

Land in Puerto Rico farms in 1950 totalled 1,844,886 cuerdas, (1 cuerda = 0.9712 acres) a decrease of 40,988 cuerdas or 2.2 percent since 1940. Land in farms in 1950 represented almost 82 percent of the total land area of the Island. The number of farms containing 260 cuerdas or more increased 14.5 percent from 1940 to 1950. However, land in farms containing 260 cuerdas or more decreased almost 30,000 cuerdas during the ten years. The 1,072 farms having 260 cuerdas and over contained 41.1 percent of all land in farms in Puerto Rico and 40 percent of all the cropland in the Island in 1950.

According to the 1950 Gensus, there were on farms in Puerto Rico, 36,390 horses and colts; 289,389 cattle and calves; 3,121 sheep and lambs; 39,311 goats and kids; and 91,069 hogs and pigs. The number of each of these kinds of livestock except horses and colts was less in 1950 than 10 years earlier.

A much larger proportion of the operators of farms in Puerto Rico owned their farms in 1950 than at any previous U. S. Census. In 1950, almost 94 percent of the farms in Puerto Rico were operated by their owners. There were over 7,000 more farmers operating the farms they owned in 1950 than in 1940. Farm tenamov in Puerto Rico decreased from 20.2 percent in 1940 to 5.4 percent in 1950. Farm tenamov in 1950 was lower than at any previous census. Part of the decrease in tenanov resulted from the sale of tenant-operated farms to their operators by such agencies as the Puerto Rico Reconstruction Administration, Land Authority of Puerto Rico, etc. Also, a part of the decrease in the number of tenants may have resulted from the charge in census procedure whereby places worked by medianeros were not counted as farms in 1950. The decrease in the number of farms operated by managers from 1,303 in 1940 to 421 in 1950, resulted in part from charges in definition. In 1940 and prior censuses, a considerable number of marks were classified as operated by nonegars. In 1950, such farms were classified as operated by managers. In 1950, such farms in Puerto Rico in 1950 were operated by managers, land in farms operated by managers represented 18.4 percent of all land in farms in Puerto Rico.

Almost one-fifth of the farms in Puerto Rico are sugaroane farms, while one-sixth of the farms are part-time farms, and almost one-fourth are subsistence farms. In 1950, farms in Puerto Rico were classified by type of farm, in general, on the basis of the relationship of the value of the farm products sold from a particular source or sources to the total value of all farm products sold. Farms for which the value of all farm products sold was less than \$150 were classified either as subsistence or part-time farms. If the farm operator reported that he worked off the farm 75 days or more during the year preceding the census, the farm was classified as a part-time farm. If the value of the farm products sold was less than \$150, and the farm operator reported that he worked off the farm 125 days during the year preceding the census, then the farm was classified as a subsistence farm.

Farms with a value of farm products sold of \$150 or more were classified by type on the basis of the source from which fifty percent or more of the value of all farm products sold was derived. For example, if the value of sugarcame represented fifty percent or more of the value of all farm products sold, the farm was classified as a sugarcame farm. If the value of ootton, rice, pigeon peas, cowpeas, dry beans, corn, sweetpotatoes, dasheens, yams, taniers, and cassava sold represented fifty percent or more of all the value of farm products sold the farm was classified as a minor-crop farm.

If the value of sugarcane, coffee, or tobacco sold or the combined value of cotton, rice, pigeon peas, cowpeas, dry beans, corn, sweetpotatoes, dasheens, yams, taniers, and cassave' sold was not equal to fifty percent or more of the value of all farm products sold, but the combined value of all these crops represented fifty percent or more of the value of all farm products sold, the farm was classified as a general-crop farm. Farms on which the value of hogs, cattle, milk, poultry and poultry products sold represented fifty percent or more of the total value of farm products sold were classified as livestock farms.

Farms that could not be classified as sugarcane, coffee, tobacco, minor-orop, fruit, livestock, or general-crop farms but on which the combined value of all crops and livestock and livestock products sold represented fifty percent or more of the total value of all farm products sold, were classified as crop-and-livestock farms. Miscellaneous farms represented farms with a value of farm products sold of \$150 or more which could not be classified as sugarcane, coffee, tobacco, minor-crop, fruit, livestock, general-crop, or crop-and-livestock farms.

While sugarcane farms represented less than one-fifth of all the farms in Puerto Rico, they contained more than two-fifths of all the land in farms and more than one-half of all the cropland used for crops.

The most significant changes in the acreage and production of crops between 1939 and 1949, were the increase of 114,000 cuerdas in the area from which sugarcane was harvested, the 86 percent increase in the area from which pine-apples were harvested, and the decrease of 50 percent or more in the area of rice, cowpeas, dry beans, and sweetpota-toes.

Land planted in sugarcane as of December 1, 1949, amounted to 366,441 cuerdas and represented 47.7 percent of cropland used for crops. On the basis of area, coffee is the second most important crop in Puerto Rico. In 1949, coffee was harvested from 176,386 cuerdas. This area of coffee comprised 22.9 percent of the cropland used for crops in 1950. Other important crops having an area harvested of 20,000 or more cuerdas in 1949 were bananas with 44,241 cuerdas, corn with 39,497 cuerdas, tobacco with 26,834 cuerdas, sweetpotatoes with 23,818 cuerdas, and pigeon peas with 20,436 cuerdas. The total area of these seven crops having 20,000 or more cuerdas in 1949 comprised 90.7 percent of cropland from which crops were harvested.

According to the 1950 Census, there were 51,157 parcelas having an area of at least one-fourth of a cuerda but less than three cuerdas on which crops were harvested in 1949 or on which there were cattle, goats, hogs, or poultry in April 1950. Data concerning the production of farm products on these parcelas and the number of livestock on these places were contained in a release issued on July 3, 1951.

Detailed data by municipalities for the 1950 Census of Agriculture for Puerto Rico will be contained in the final report to be published in August or September 1952. 2-PUERTO RICO
