### EXPLANATORY FOOTNOTES TO TABLE I OF REPORT ON OCCU-PATIONS, TO WHICH REFERENCES ARE MADE IN THIS REPRINT.

CLERKS IN STORES.—Many of the "clerks" in stores evidently are "salesmen and saleswomen."

DRAYMEN, TEAMSTERS, AND EXPRESSMEN.—Teamsters in agriculture, forestry, and the extraction of minerals are classified with the other workers in those industries, respectively; and drivers for bakeries and laundries are classified with deliverymen in trade.

FARM FOREMEN.-Includes turpentine farm foremen.

FARMERS.—Includes turpentine farmers.

LABORERS (NOT OTHERWISE SPECIFIED):

BLAST FURNACES AND ROLLING MILLS,-Includes tinplate mills.

SAW AND PLANING MILLS .--- Includes wooden box factories.

LAUNDRY OPERATIVES.—Some owners of hand laundries are included with "laundry operatives."

LAUNDRY OWNERS, OFFICIALS, AND MANAGERS.—Some owners of hand laundries are included with "laundry operatives."

MESSENGER, BUNDLE, AND OFFICE BOYS.—Except telegraph and telephone messengers.

SALESMEN AND SALESWOMEN.—Many of the "clerks" in stores evidently are "salesmen and saleswomen."

SEMISKILLED OPERATIVES (NOT OTHERWISE SPECIFIED):

BLAST FURNACES AND ROLLING MILLS.-Includes timplate mills.

CAR AND RAILROAD SHOPS.—Includes car repairers for steam and street railroads. SAW AND PLANING MILLS.—Includes wooden box factories.

SEWERS AND SEWING MACHINE OPERATORS (FACTORY).—Includes sewers and sewing machine operators in all factories except shoe and harness factories, and sack sewers in cement, sugar, and grain mills.

SOLDIERS, SAILORS, AND MARINES.—Includes only those resident in continental United States at the date of the enumeration.
