CHAPTER 1.

NUMBER OF INHABITANTS.

Introduction.—This chapter gives the population of Iowa, by counties and minor civil divisions, as enumerated at the Thirteenth Census, taken as of April 15, 1910, with comparative statements of population where possible, and a statement and discussion for the state as a whole of the population living in urban and in rural territory. The statistics are given in detail in two general tables.

Table 1 (p. 573) shows the population of Iowa, distributed according to counties and minor civil divisions, at the last three Federal censuses, namely, those of 1910, 1900, and 1890. The arrangement of counties and of the primary divisions in each county is alphabetical. The figures for secondary divisions are printed in italics. The changes in boundaries, name, or form of organization that have taken place since 1900 are indicated in the footnotes to the table. For changes between 1890 and 1900 reference must be made to the census report of 1900.

It may be noticed that the county totals as given in Table 1 for 1900 and 1890 sometimes exceed the aggregate population of the minor civil divisions as shown in the table. This is due to the fact that some of the minor civil divisions had gone out of existence by 1910, their territory having been annexed to other divisions or taken to form new divisions, or they had undergone such changes in territory that it was impossible to present strictly comparable figures.

Table 2 (p. 593) shows the cities and incorporated towns in Iowa, alphabetically arranged, with their population in 1910, 1900, and 1890.

The population of Iowa, by counties, at each of the last five Federal censuses, from 1870 to 1910, inclusive; the increase during the last two decades; the density of the total and the rural population at the census of 1910; and the distribution of the population at the last two Federal censuses according to urban and rural districts, are given in Table I of Chapter 2.

The tables and text of the present chapter contain few technical expressions whose meaning is not appar-

ent. The census usage in regard to certain terms is, however, explained below:

Density of population.—The density of population of a state or county is obtained by dividing its total population by the number of square miles in its land area. In calculating the density of rural population, the same divisor is used as it is not practicable to ascertain and deduct the exact area covered by the urban districts, and even if this could be done with accuracy the deduction of this area from the total land area would ordinarily make no appreciable difference in the resulting quotient.

Minor civil divisions.—The counties are divided generally into smaller political units which bear different designations in the different parts of the country, such as towns, townships, election precincts, etc. Of these minor civil divisions those which rank next to the county as geographic areas are termed primary divisions. In many instances, however, these primary divisions contain political units of still smaller area, such as cities, incorporated villages, towns, or boroughs. These smaller political units are referred to as secondary divisions.

Urban and rural population defined.—The Census Bureau, for purposes of discussion, has defined urban population as that residing in cities and other incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, and rural population as that residing outside of such incorporated places.

The comparisons of the urban and rural population in 1910 with that at earlier enumerations may be made either with respect to the varying proportions of the two classes at successive enumerations or with respect to the increase between enumerations. In order to contrast the proportion of the total population living in urban or rural territory at the census of 1910 with the proportion urban or rural at the preceding census, it is necessary to classify the territory according to the conditions as they existed at each census. In this comparison a place having less than 2,500 inhabitants in 1900 and over 2,500 in 1910 is classed with the rural population for 1900 and with the urban for 1910. On the other hand, in order to present fairly the contrast between urban and rural communities, as regards their rate of growth, it is necessary to consider the changes in population for the same territory which have occurred from one decennial census to another. For this purpose the territory which in 1910 was urban or rural, as the case may be, is taken as the basis, and the population in 1900 for the same territory (so far as separately reported at that census) is presented, even though part of the territory may, on the basis of its population at the earlier census, have then been in a different class. This avoids the disturbing effect on comparisons which would arise from the passage, for example, of communities formerly classed as rural into the urban group. These two distinct forms of comparison are made in Table I of Chapter 2 for the state as a whole and for each county separately for the last two Federal censuses.

HISTORICAL NOTE.—Iowa takes its name from a tribe of Indians which formerly occupied the region now constituting the state. The meaning of the word is variously given as "this is the place," "the drowsy or sleepy ones," "the tribe beyond the river," and "beautiful region."

The eastern border of Iowa was visited by the French missionaries Marquette and Joliet in 1673. White settlers, however, did not come to the region for more than a century, and a century and a half elapsed before any permanent settlements were made.

In 1783 Julien Dubuque made a settlement on the site of the present city of Dubuque. At his death in 1810 this was abandoned and no permanent settlements were made within the present limits of the state until after 1830. Dubuque was permanently settled in 1833, and about the same time settlements were made at Burlington and Fort Madison.

Iowa originally formed a part of the vast Louisiana region claimed by the French on account of the discoveries of Marquette, Joliet, La Salle, and others. It was ceded to France by Spain in 1762, retroceded to France in 1800, and purchased by

the United States in 1803. In 1804 the region was divided by the thirty-third parallel, the present northern boundary of Louisiana, into the territory of Orleans on the south and the district of Louisiana on the north, and the northern district was attached to the territory of Indiana. In the following year the district of Louisiana became the territory of Louisiana. In 1812 the state of Louisiana, formed in part from the territory of Orleans, was admitted to the Union, and the territory of Louisiana became the territory of Missouri.

In 1834 the area now comprising the state of Iowa was added to the territory of Michigan. In 1836 it became a part of the territory of Wisconsin, organized in that year, and in 1838, a part of the area organized as the territory of Iowa. In 1845 Congress passed an act to enable Iowa to become a state. The northern and western boundaries were to be established about 45 miles north and about 90 miles east, respectively, of their present location. These boundaries were rejected by popular vote later in the same year. In 1846 a state constitution, providing for boundaries as they now exist, was adopted, and in December of the same year Iowa became one of the states of the Union.

TOTAL POPULATION, INCREASE, AND DISTRIBUTION.

Population of the state.—The population of Iowa is 2,224,771. Compared with a population of 2,231,853 in 1900, this represents a decrease during the last decade of 7,082, or three-tenths of 1 per cent. During the same period the total population of the United States increased 21 per cent. During the preceding decade, 1890-1900, the population of the state in-

creased 319,556, or 16.7 per cent, a smaller relative increase than that shown at any previous Federal census.

The following table shows the population of Iowa at each Federal census from 1840 to 1910, inclusive, together with the increase and per cent of increase during each decade, in comparison with the per cent of increase for the United States as a whole.

Iowa was organized as a territory in 1838 and appears in the Federal census reports for the first time in 1840. During the 20 years from 1840 to 1860 the population of Iowa increased very rapidly, multiplying more than fifteenfold. During the 40 years between 1860 and 1900 it grew less rapidly, multiplying less than fourfold. This growth was not regular, the rates of increase rapidly diminishing from 76.9 per cent for the decade 1860-1870 to 16.7 per cent for the decade 1890-1900. The decade 1900-1910, as already noticed, showed a decrease of three-tenths of 1 per cent.

During the 30 years from 1840 to 1870 the population of the state increased much more rapidly than did that of the United States. During the decade 1870-1880 the rate of increase for the state fell off more than half, and as a result exceeded the rate of increase for the United States by only 6 per cent. In 1880 the population of the state was more than 37 times as great as it was in 1840, while that of the United States was less than three times as great. During each decade since 1880 the population of the United States has increased faster than the population of the state. The rate of increase for the country as a whole for this 30-year period was 83.4 per cent, while the rate of increase for the state was 36.9 per cent.

Principal cities.—Iowa has 108 cities, of which the largest, Des Moines, has a population of 86,368, and the next largest, Sioux City, a population of 47,828. Besides Sioux City there are six cities in the state having from 25,000 to 50,000 inhabitants. Nine cities have from 10,000 to 25,000, 9 from 5,000 to 10,000, 42 from 2,500 to 5,000, and 40 less than 2,500 inhabitants. The aggregate population of the 108 cities is 748,158, or 33.6 per cent of the total population of the state.

Table 2 shows the population in 1910 of all the cities of the state, with comparative figures, where possible, for 1900 and 1890. The table on page 569 shows the population of the eight cities having in 1910 over 25,000 inhabitants, as reported at each Federal census since their incorporation either as cities or towns, so far as figures are available, together with the increase during each decade.

Of the cities included in this table, Waterloo shows the highest percentage of increase during the last decade, namely, 112.2 per cent, and Dubuque, the lowest, 6.1 per cent. Three cities, Des Moines, Sioux City, and Waterloo, show a higher rate of increase during the last decade, 1900-1910, than during the preceding decade, 1890-1900.

Counties.—Iowa has 99 counties. The population of these counties ranges from 8,137 in Dickinson County to 110,438 in Polk County.

There have been no changes in the territorial boundaries of the counties since 1900.

Twenty-eight counties have increased in population during the last decade, the percentages of increase ranging from two-tenths of 1 per cent in Jasper County to 41.4 per cent in Monroe County, and the absolute increases from 58 in Jasper County to 27,814 in Polk County. Seventy-one counties have decreased in population during the last decade, the percentages of decrease ranging from eight-tenths of 1 per cent in Pago County to 19.1 per cent in Adams County, and the absolute decreases from 120 in Emmet County to 4,413 in Mahaska County. From 1890 to 1900 every county in the state but one increased in population, the percentages of increase ranging from 1.8 per cent in Shelby County to 132.5 per cent in Emmet County. Woodbury County, the one exception, showed a decrease of 1,022, or 1.8 per cent. During the last decade this

county increased in population 13,006, or 23.8 per cent. The aggregate increase of population from 1900 to 1910 in the 28 counties that show an increase is 100,-549; the aggregate decrease of population in the 71 counties that show a decrease is 107,631. The difference, 7,082, is, of course, the total decrease of population in the state.

The maps on page 571 show the increase or decrease in the total and the rural population, respectively, of each county of Iowa during the last decade. In the counties shown in white the population decreased; for the other counties the different rates of increase are indicated by differences in shading.

Density of population.—The total land area of the state is 55,586 square miles. The average number of persons to the square mile is 40; in 1900 and 1890 it was 40.2 and 34.4, respectively. The average number per square mile for the United States as a whole in 1910 was 30.9.

The density of population is given by counties in Table I of Chapter 2 and in the maps on page 572, both for the entire population and for that living in rural territory, excluding in the latter case the population of places of 2,500 or more, but not excluding the land area of such places.

Kossuth County, with 973 square miles, has the largest area, and Dickinson County, with 376 square miles, has the smallest area. Polk County, containing the city of Des Moines, has the highest density of any county, namely, 189.8 persons per square mile, while Dickinson County, with 21.6 persons per square mile, has the lowest density.

Minor civil divisions.—The political divisions into which counties are subdivided are collectively termed "Minor civil divisions." The counties of Iowa are divided into 1,664 primary divisions, comprising 1,663

townships and 1 city. There are also 836 secondary divisions, comprising 108 cities and 728 towns. Secondary divisions usually form parts of the townships in which they are located. Thirty-seven cities and 15 towns, however, are coextensive with the townships in which they are located, while one city, Des Moines, comprises two townships. Besides these minor civil divisions there is one Indian reservation in the state, returned under the county in which it is located.

Urban and rural population compared.—The first table on page 570 presents the population of Iowa at the censuses of 1910, 1900, and 1890, respectively, distributed among cities and towns grouped according to specified limits of population, together with the percentage of the total population contained in each group at each of the censuses named. The classification is based upon the population of each place as it existed at each census.

As shown by this table, the urban territory of the state in 1910—that is, the cities and incorporated towns of 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 680,054 inhabitants, or 30.6 per cent of the total population, while 1,544,717 inhabitants, or 69.4 per cent, lived in rural territory. The urban territory as it existed in 1900—that is, cities and incorporated towns then having 2,500 inhabitants or more—contained 572,386 inhabitants, or 25.6 per cent of the total population, while 1,659,467 inhabitants, or 74.4 per cent, lived in rural territory. There has thus been a considerable increase in the proportion of urban population. For the United States as a whole the urban population constituted 46.3 per cent of the total population in 1910 and 40.5 per cent of the total population in 1900.

This table also shows an increase since 1890 in the proportion of the population in the combined groups com-

prising cities of over 25,000 inhabitants—namely, from 7.6 per cent in 1890 to 9.8 per cent in 1900 and 14.8 per cent in 1910.

The 708 cities and towns of less than 2,500 inhabitants each have an aggregate population of 438,715, or 19.7 per cent of the total population of the state. These places comprise 114 cities and towns of 1,000 to 2,500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 172,460; 212 cities and towns of 500 to 1,000 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 145,742; and 442 cities and towns of less than 500 inhabitants each, with a combined population of 120,513.

The above table further shows that in all incorporated places, including those of less than 2,500 inhabitants, there was in 1910 a population of 1,118,769, or 50.3 per cent of the population of the state. The population of all incorporated places, as they existed in 1900, was 973,178, or 43.6 per cent of the population of the state.

Table I of Chapter 2 shows that 53 counties had a larger proportion and 4 counties a smaller proportion of urban population in 1910 than in 1900. Three counties which were wholly rural in 1900 were partly urban in 1910 and 7 counties which were partly urban in 1900 were wholly rural in 1910, while 32 counties were wholly rural at both censuses. In 12 counties more than 50 per cent of the population was urban in 1910.

In order to compare the *rate of growth* in urban and rural communities it is necessary in each case, as previously explained, to consider the changes in population which have occurred in the *same* territory from one decennial census to another. With this end in view places classed as urban or rural according to their population in 1910 are taken as a basis and the aggregate population in 1910 and in 1900 of the same places is then compared. Thus, as shown in the table in the next column, the total population in 1910 of those cities and towns which at that time had 2,500 inhabitants or more was 680,054; in 1900 the total population of these same places (so far as separately reported) was 567,267. It may be noted that the latter figure is less than the total population in 1900 of those cities and towns which at that time had over 2,500 inhabitants each, 572,386 (see above

table), by 5,119. The difference is the net result of the passage since 1900 of certain communities from the rural to the urban class, and vice versa, and of annexations of territory during the same period.

A comparison of the total population in 1910 of cities and incorporated towns having a population of not less than 2,500 each with the total population of the same places in 1900, as given in the table below, shows an increase of 19.9 per cent. This represents the rate of growth of urban communities as thus defined. On the other hand, in the population living in rural territory there has been a decrease during the decade of 7.2 per cent. For the United States as a whole urban population increased 34.9 per cent in the last decade and rural population 11.2 per cent. As shown by Table I of Chapter 2, there are 19 counties in Iowa in which urban population decreased and 90 counties in which rural population decreased.

In the following table the population for the state as a whole is distributed so as to show, for 1910 and 1900, the combined population of the cities and towns having in 1910 25,000 inhabitants or more, and from 2,500 to 25,000 inhabitants, respectively, and the population of the remainder of the state.



This table shows that the decrease in the total population during the last decade was due to the loss of population in the territory of the state classified as rural. From 1900 to 1910 the population living in rural territory decreased 119,869, or 7.2 per cent. On the other hand, the population in the territory classified as urban increased 112,787, or 19.9 per cent, during the same period. The difference between these figures, 7,082, represents the actual decrease in the population of the state.


PER CENT OF INCREASE OR DECREASE OF POPULATION OF IOWA, BY COUNTIES: 1900-1910.

RURAL POPULATION.







CHAPTER 2.

COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION.

Introduction.—The first chapter having given the number of inhabitants of Iowa by counties and minor civil divisions, the decennial increase and the density of population, and the proportions urban and rural, the present chapter deals with the composition and characteristics of the population. The two chapters cover all the principal topics of the population census except occupations and ownership of homes.

Description of the tables.—The greater part of this chapter consists of five general tables, which present statistics of color, nativity, parentage, sex, citizenship, illiteracy, school attendance, and dwellings and families, as follows: Table I for the state and counties; Table II for cities of more than 25,000 inhabitants; Table III for cities of 10,000 to 25,000; Table IV for places of 2,500 to 10,000; and Table V for wards of Des Moines, the only city of more than 50,000.

A series of summary tables (numbered 1 to 14) reproduces from the general tables the more important state and city totals, and presents also certain additional data relative to state of birth, age, and marital condition.

On account of the wide differences in characteristics among the different classes of the population, the statistics on each subject are shown according to race, and for the whites according to nativity and parentage. Classification according to nativity and parentage is scarcely necessary for the other races, since nearly all negroes and Indians are native born of native parentage, and nearly all Chinese and Japanese either foreign born or of foreign parentage.

The white population is divided into four groups: (1) Native, native parentage—that is, having both parents born in the United States; (2) native, foreign parentage—having both parents born abroad; (3) native, mixed parentage—having one parent native and the other foreign born; (4) foreign born. As the second and third classes do not differ greatly in characteristics, they are combined in some of the tables; in a few cases all three native white classes are combined.

Since marked differences often exist between urban and rural communities with respect to the composition and characteristics of the population, the two classes are distinguished in connection with several of the subjects. Urban population, as defined by the Bureau of the Census, includes that of all incorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more, the remainder being classified as rural.

The census inquiry as to school attendance was merely as to whether the person enumerated had attended any kind of school at any time between September 1, 1909, and the date of enumeration, April 15, 1910.

The Census Bureau classifies as illiterate any person 10 years of age or over who is unable to write, regardless of ability to read.

Color and nativity (Table 1).—Of the total population of Iowa, 1,303,526, or 58.6 per cent, are native whites of native parentage; 632,181, or 28.4 per cent, are native whites of foreign or mixed parentage; 273,484, or 12.3 per cent, are foreign-born whites; and 14,973, or 0.7 per cent, are negroes. The corresponding percentages in 1900 were 56.5, 29.2, 13.7, and 0.6, respectively, the comparison indicating a slight increase in the proportion of native whites of native parentage. In 26 of the 99 counties the foreign-born whites constitute more than 15 per cent of the population; the highest percentage for this class (26.9) is in Sioux County. In 64 counties more than one-fourth of the population are native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, the proportion being highest (49.9 per cent) in Winnebago County. (See maps on page 630.)

Native whites of native parentage constitute nearly three-fifths both of the urban and of the rural population (58.2 per cent and 58.8 per cent, respectively); the corresponding proportions for native whites of foreign or mixed parentage are 27.1 per cent and 29.1 per cent. The percentage of foreign-born whites is 13.3 in the urban population and 11.9 in the rural; the percentage of negroes is 1.4 in the urban and 0.3 in the rural.

Sex (Table 2).—In the total population of the state there are 1,148,171 males and 1,076,600 females, or 106.6 males to 100 females. In 1900 the ratio was 107.6 to 100. Among native whites the ratio is 103 to 100, as compared with 135.7 to 100 for the foreign-born whites. In the urban population there are 100.4 males to 100 females, and in the rural, 109.5.

State of birth (Tables 3 and 4).—Of the total native population—that is, population born in the United States—72.6 per cent were born in Iowa and 27.4 per cent outside the state; of the native white population, 27.1 per cent were born outside the state, and of the native negro, 64.8 per cent. Persons born outside the state constitute a larger proportion of the native population in urban than in rural communities.

Foreign nationalities (Table 5).—Of the foreign-born white population of Iowa, persons born in Germany represent 36.1 per cent; Sweden, 9.8; Norway, 8; Denmark, 6.6; Ireland, 6.5; England, 6.1; Austria, 5.8; Canada, 4.2; Holland, 4.1; Russia, 2.3; Italy, 2.1; all other countries, 8.1. Of the total white stock of foreign origin, which includes persons born abroad and also natives having one or both parents born abroad, Germany contributed 39.8 per cent; Ireland, 10.2; Norway, 7.4; Sweden, 7.3; England, 7; Denmark, 4.6; Canada, 4.5; Austria, 4.4; Holland, 3.2; Scotland, 2.1; Switzerland, 1.2; Russia, 1.1.

Voting and militia ages (Table 6).—The total number of males 21 years of age and over is 663,672, representing 29.8 per cent of the population. Of such males, 50.3 per cent are native whites of native parentage, 26.7 per cent native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 22.1 per cent foreign-born whites, and 0.8 per cent negroes. Of the 146,880 foreign-born white males of voting age, 90,573, or 61.7 per cent, are naturalized. Males of militia age—18 to 44—number 475,829.

Age (Tables 7, 8, and 12).—Of the total population, 10.6 per cent are under 5 years of age, 20.3 per cent from 5 to 14 years, inclusive, 19.6 per cent from 15 to 24, 27.8 per cent from 25 to 44, and 21.4 per cent 45 years of age and over. The foreign-born white population comprises comparatively few children, only 2.8 per cent of this class being under 15 years of age, while 88.1 per cent are 25 years of age and over. Of the native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 46.8 per cent are 25 and over and of the native whites of native parentage, 42.4 per cent.

The urban population shows a smaller proportion of children than the rural and a larger proportion of persons in the prime of life. Migration to the city explains this at least in part. Of the urban population, 31.4 per cent are from 25 to 44 years of age, inclusive, and of the rural population, 26.3 per cent.

School attendance (Table 9).—The total number of persons of school age—that is, from 6 to 20 years, inclusive—is 675,222, of whom 469,778, or 69.6 per cent, attended school. In addition to these, 19,300 persons under 6 and 10,194 of 21 and over attended school. For boys from 6 to 20 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 69.1; for girls, 70. For children from 6 to 14 years, inclusive, the percentage attending school was 90.7. The percentage for children of this age among native whites of native parentage and among native whites of foreign or mixed parentage was 90.8; among foreign-born whites, 82; among negroes, 89.3. (See Table I.) There is little difference between urban and rural communities as regards the percentage attending school for the ages from 6 to 14, but of persons from 15 to 20 years, inclusive, 39.6 per cent were reported as attending school in the rural population and 34.1 per cent in the urban.

Illiteracy (Table 10).—There are 29,889 illiterates in the state, representing 1.7 per cent of the total population 10 years of age and over, as compared with 2.3

per cent in 1900. The percentage of illiteracy is 0.8 among native whites, 6.3 among foreign-born whites, and 10.3 among negroes.

For all classes combined, and for each class separately, the proportion of illiterates is about the same in urban population as in rural, the percentages being 1.8 and 1.6, respectively.

For persons from 10 to 20 years of age, inclusive, whose literacy depends largely upon present school facilities and school attendance, the percentage of illiteracy is very slight, only 0.4. (See Table I.)

Marital condition (Tables 11 and 13).—In the population 15 years of age and over, 38.6 per cent of the males are single and 29.8 per cent of the females. The percentage married is 55.9 for males and 60 for females, and the percentage widowed 4.4 and 9.1, respectively. The percentages of those reported as divorced, 0.6 and 0.7, respectively, are believed to be too small, because of the probability that many divorced persons class themselves as single or widowed.

That the percentage single is so much smaller for women than for men is due to the fact that women marry younger. Thus 7.8 per cent of the females from 15 to 19 years of age are married, as compared with 0.6 per cent of the males, and 45.2 per cent of the females from 20 to 24 years are married, as compared with 20 per cent of the males. In the next age group, 25 to 34 years, the percentage is 75.5 for females and 61.6 for males, while in the age group 45 years and over the percentage married is higher among males. That there is a larger proportion of widows than of widowers may indicate that men more often remarry than women, but, since husbands are generally older than their wives, the marriage relationship is more often broken by death of the husband than by death of the wife.

For the main elements of the population the percentages of married persons among those 15 years of age and over are as follows: Foreign-born whites, 66.2 for males and 70.5 for females; native whites of native parentage, 55.5 and 59.2, respectively; native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, 49.6 and 56.3; negroes, 51.8 and 60.9.

These percentages by no means indicate the relative tendency of the several classes as regards marriage. To determine that, the comparison should be made by age periods, since the proportion married in any class is determined largely by the proportion who have reached the marrying age. Similarly, the proportion widowed depends largely on the proportion past middle life. The percentage married for males is practically the same in rural as in urban communities; for females the percentage is higher in the rural.

Dwellings and families.—The total number of dwellings in Iowa is 498,943, and the total number of families 512,515, indicating that in comparatively few cases does more than one family occupy a dwelling. (See Table I.)

The average number of persons per dwelling is 4.5, and the average number per family, 4.3.





CHAPTER 3.

STATISTICS OF AGRICULTURE FOR THE STATE AND ITS COUNTIES.

Introduction.—This chapter presents a complete statement of the statistics of agriculture for Iowa collected at the census of 1910. Statistics of farms and farm property relate to April 15, 1910; those of farm products, expenses, and receipts are for the calendar year 1909.

Definitions.—To assist in securing comparability for its statistics of agriculture, the Bureau of the Census provided the enumerators with certain definitions and instructions, the more important of which were essentially as given below.

Farm.—A "farm" for census purposes is all the land which is directly farmed by one person managing and conducting agricultural operations, either by his own labor alone or with the assistance of members of his household or hired employees. The term "agricultural operations" is used as a general term referring to the work of growing crops, producing other agricultural products, and raising animals, fowls, and bees. A "farm" as thus defined may consist of a single tract of land, or of a number of separate and distinct tracts, and these several tracts may be held under different tenures, as where one tract is owned by the farmer and another tract is hired by him. Further, when a landowner has one or more tenants, renters, croppers, or managers, the land operated by each is considered a "farm."

In applying the foregoing definition of a "farm" for census purposes, enumerators were instructed to report as a "farm" any tract of 3 or more acres used for agricultural purposes, and also any tract containing less than 3 acres which produced at least \$250 worth of farm products in the year 1909.

Farmer.—A "farmer" or "farm operator," according to the census definition, is a person who directs the operations of a farm. Hence owners of farms who do not themselves direct the farm operations are not reported as "farmers." Farmers are divided by the Bureau of the Census into three general classes according to the character of their tenure, namely, owners, tenants, and managers.

Farm owners include (1) farmers operating their own land only, and (2) those operating both their own land and some land hired from others. The latter are sometimes referred to in the census reports as "part owners," the term "owners" being then restricted to those owning all their land.

Farm tenants are farmers who, as tenants, renters, or croppers, operate hired land only. They were reported in 1910 in three classes: (1) *Share tenants*—those who pay a certain share of the products, as one-half, one-third, or one-quarter; (2) *share-cash tenants*—those who pay a share of the products for part of the land rented by them and cash for part; and (3) *cash tenants*—those who pay a cash rental or a stated amount of labor or products, such as \$7, 10 bushels of wheat, or 100 pounds of seed cotton per acre.

Managers are farmers who are conducting farm operations for the owner for wages or a salary.

Farm land.—Farm land is divided into (1) improved land, (2) woodland, and (3) all other unimproved land. The same classification was followed in 1880. At former censuses, except that of 1880, farm land was divided into improved land and unimproved land, woodland being included with unimproved land. *Improved*

land includes all land regularly tilled or mowed, land pastured and cropped in rotation, land lying fallow, land in gardens, orchards, vineyards, and nurseries, and land occupied by farm buildings. *Woodland* includes all land covered with natural or planted forest trees, which produce, or later may produce, firewood or other forest products. *All other unimproved land* includes brush land, rough or stony land, swamp land, and any other land which is not improved or in forest. The census classification of farm land as "improved land," "woodland," and "other unimproved land" is one not always easy for the farmers or enumerators to make, and the statistics therefore must be considered at best only a close approximation.

Total value of farm products.—No attempt has been made at this census to compute or even to estimate approximately the total value of farm products. Among the numerous difficulties which stand in the way of obtaining a total which would be at once comprehensive, free from duplication, and confined exclusively to the products of a definite period of time are the following:

(1) The duplication resulting from the feeding of farm crops to farm live stock, when the value both of the products derived from such live stock and of the crops are included in the same total. In 1900 an attempt was made to eliminate this duplication by means of an inquiry as to the total value of the products of each farm fed to the live stock on that farm, but, aside from the fact that this would not eliminate the duplication where the products of one farm are fed to the live stock of another farm, it is believed that the farmers were unable to make even approximately accurate answers to the inquiry, and it was accordingly not included in the schedule for 1910.


(2) The fact that farmers may buy domestic animals during the census year which are subsequently sold or slaughtered during the same year and that it is impossible to eliminate the duplication accurately, and the further fact that the value of domestic animals sold or slaughtered, or of forest products cut, during a given year (as well as some other minor items) does not usually represent a value created wholly during that year, and that it is quite impossible to ascertain the value created during the year.

(3) The fact that the returns for some products are incomplete. The returns for all products are to a considerable extent estimates made by the farmers. Special difficulty was encountered in cases where the person in possession of the farm in April, 1910, when the census was taken, was not in possession of it during the crop year 1909. In such cases the farmer was not always able to report completely and accurately the products of the land for the preceding year. It is probable that the returns for the principal crops are in general fairly accurate, but that those for minor crops and for dairy and poultry products are frequently understatement, particularly because the home consumption was disregarded or underestimated. In the belief that no accurate result could be obtained from such an inquiry, the Bureau of the Census did not even attempt to ascertain the total quantity and value of certain by-products, such as straw and cornstalks, which are of considerable importance, the schedule calling only for the value of such by-products sold.

BY COUNTIES: 1910.


PER CENT OF LAND AREA IN FARMS.

FARMS AND FARM PROPERTY.

Iowa ranks twenty-third in land area and fifteenth in population among the states and territories of continental United States. It has passed out of the class of states that are adding to their total farm area. In fact, it has a little less land in farms than it had in 1900.

The entire state of Iowa lies within the northern portion of the low plateau which constitutes the upper part of the Mississippi River drainage basin. The altitude of the southeastern two-fifths of the state ranges from 800 to 1,000 feet, while the altitude of the western and northern parts varies from 1,000 feet to about 1,500 feet in the northwestern portion. With the exception of a small section in the extreme northeastern part of the state, where the Mississippi River is bordered by rugged bluffs, the surface of the state is undulating to rolling and in a few sections hilly. All of the state, with the exception of the section in the northeastern part just referred to, has been subject to repeated glacial invasions. As a result the underlying rocky floor is usually covered to a depth ranging from 15 or 20 feet to extreme depths of over 200 feet, by mechanically ground and thoroughly mixed glacial débris commonly known as the till.

The chief drainage of the state is eastward to the Mississippi River. The portions of the state adjacent to both the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers are thoroughly drained. The north central portion is much more in need of artificial drainage, and there are also considerable areas within the southern portion of the state in which the natural drainage, particularly of the subsoil, is inadequate.

Five different soil areas are distinguished, consisting of the glaciated plateau covering the north central two-fifths of the state; the deep loess soils bordering the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers and also extending from the east in a narrow belt nearly to the center of the state, together covering nearly one-third of the state; the shallow loess soil of the south central section, covering about one-fifth of the state; the small unglaciated section in the northeast corner; and narrow lines of alluvial soil along the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers.

The soils are mainly dark brown to almost black clay loams, silt loams, and loams, with a small amount of sandy loams in scattered areas. With few exceptions these soils are deep, fertile, and well supplied with organic matter. Both with respect to topography and soils Iowa is peculiarly favored for agricultural exploitation. All of the staple crops of northern climates may be grown within the state.

The two maps on the opposite page show, for the different counties, the proportion of the total land area which is in farms and the average value of farm land per acre. Of the total land area of the state over nineteen-twentieths is in farms, and as shown by the first map only two counties have less than nine-tenths of their land surface in farms, while in a majority of the counties the proportion is nineteen-twentieths or higher.

The average value per acre of farm land for the whole state is \$82.58. In 22 counties, comprising a group in the east central part of the state, a belt running north and south near the western border, and four counties in the southeastern part of the state, the value ranges between \$100 and \$125 per acre. The value is between \$75 and \$100 per acre in a majority of the remaining counties, including practically all of those in the central and western parts of the state with the exception of those just mentioned in which the value is between \$100 and \$125, and a number of counties in the southeastern part of the state. In most of the counties in the two northern tiers, about half of the counties in the two southern tiers, and most of the counties in the northeastern corner of the state the value is between \$50 and \$75 per acre. In only three counties does the average value of farm land fall below \$50 per acre.

Progress during the decade 1900 to 1910.—Between 1900 and 1910 there was a decrease in population of 7,082, or 0.3 per cent, and a decrease in the number of farms of 11,578, or 5.1 per cent, together with a decrease of 643,649 acres, or 1.9 per cent, in farm land. As a result of the greater relative decrease in the number of farms than in the total acreage of farm land, the average size of the farms increased over 5 acres.

Farm property, which includes land, buildings, implements and machinery, and live stock (domestic animals, poultry, and bees), has increased in value during the decade nearly \$2,000,000,000, or more than 100 per cent. This great increase is made up chiefly of increases of over \$1,500,000,000 in the value of land and of nearly \$215,000,000 in the value of buildings. There was also an increase of over \$150,000,000 in the value of farm equipment, including implements and machinery and live stock, more than three-fourths of which represents the gain in the value of live stock. In considering the increase of values in agriculture the general increase in the prices of all commodities in the last 10 years should be borne in mind.

The following table summarizes for the state the more significant facts relating to population and land.

The average value of a farm with its equipment in 1900 was slightly more than \$8,000, while 10 years later it was over \$17,000. The average value of land alone rose from \$36.35 per acre in 1900 to \$82.53 in 1910, this advance being accompanied by increases in the average value per farm of buildings, of implements and machinery, and of live stock.

Population, number of farms, and farm acreage: 1850 to 1910.—The table following presents, for the state as a whole for each census from 1850 to 1910, inclusive, a statement of the total population, the number of farms, and the acreage of farm land and of improved land in farms. It also gives the percentage of the land area in farms, the percentage of farm land improved, and the percentage of increase during each decade in the number of farms and in the land in farms.

The land area of Iowa is approximately 35,575,040 acres. Of this area 33,930,688 acres, or 95.4 per cent, are included in farms. Of the farm acreage 29,491,199 acres, or 86.9 per cent, are reported as improved land, representing 82.9 per cent of the total land area of the state. The total acreage of farm land decreased 1.9 per cent during the last decade, while that of improved land decreased only 1.4 per cent. As the reported acreage of improved land showed a smaller relative decrease from 1900 to 1910 than did the total acreage in farms, the percentage of farm land improved was slightly higher in 1910 than in 1900.

The preceding table also shows a very rapid increase from 1850 to 1880 in the total farm acreage and in the acreage of improved land. The proportion of the total land area of the state which was occupied by farms rose during this period from 7.7 to 69.6 per cent, while the proportion which improved land formed of the total land in farms increased from 30.1 to 80.3 per cent. From 1880 to 1900 the increase in the total acreage of farm land and in the acreage of improved land was much slower, while during the last decade both have decreased. The proportion of the total area of the state in farms reached its maximum in 1900, when it was 97.2 per cent. The increase in the proportion of farm land improved has continued up to the census of 1910, although there was only a slight gain during the last decade.

Values of farm property: 1850 to 1910.—The agricultural changes in Iowa since 1850, as reflected in the values of the several classes of farm property, are shown in the next table.

The total wealth of the state in the form of farm property is about \$3,746,000,000, of which 87 per cent is represented by land and buildings, 2.5 per cent by implements and machinery, and 10.5 per cent by live stock. The relative gain (104.2 per cent) in the total value of farm property from 1900 to 1910 was greater than during any other decade since 1870, while the absolute gain (\$1,911,515,000) was over two and a

In the 60 years since 1850 the population of the state has increased by 2,032,557, or more than tenfold, although, as already pointed out, there has been a slight decrease during the last decade.

There are 217,044 farms in Iowa, or almost fifteen times as many as in 1850. The increase was very rapid from 1850 to 1880, averaging 5,685 per year. During the next 20 years the average yearly increase was 2,164, but during the decade just past the number of farms has been decreasing at the rate of 1,158 per year. This decrease was general throughout the state, only 12 counties in different parts of the state showing even slight increases.

half times as great as the largest increase reported for any other decade. Of the total increase during the last decade \$1,759,825,000 represents the increase in the value of land and buildings, \$37,517,000 the increase in the value of implements and machinery, and \$114,173,000 the increase in the value of live stock.

The average size of the Iowa farm decreased a little more than 2.5 acres per year from 1850 to 1870. During the decade from 1870 to 1880 it remained practically stationary and since 1880 it has increased about 23 acres, or over three-fourths of an acre per year. The average farm is now larger than at any census since 1860.

The average value of an Iowa farm, including its equipment, has more than doubled during the last decade, increasing from \$8,023 in 1900 to \$17,259 in 1910. Of the value in 1910, \$15,008 represents land and buildings, \$1,811 live stock, and \$440 implements and machinery. Farm values in Iowa have, in fact, increased steadily and rapidly since the first census of agriculture was taken in 1850. At that time the average value of the farm with equipment was only \$1,454, or hardly one-twelfth of what it was in 1910. In no other decade, however, has the increase been as great as it was between 1900 and 1910. The value per farm of farm equipment, which

includes implements and machinery and live stock, is now nearly seven times as great as 60 years ago.

Farm tenure: 1880 to 1910.—The following table shows the distribution of the farms of the state according to character of tenure at each census since 1880:

It is significant that while the total number of farms decreased 11,578 during the last decade, the number operated by owners and managers decreased 13,957, the number operated by tenants having increased 2,379.

In 1880 approximately one farm out of every four was operated by a tenant, since which time the proportion has increased until it is now slightly more than three out of eight.

The number of share (including share-cash) tenants is about the same as in 1880, although during the interval the number has fluctuated somewhat and has decreased slightly since 1900. On the other hand, the number of cash (including nonspecified) tenants has increased rapidly and in 1900 and 1910 exceeded the number of share tenants. In 1880 share tenants were over four times as numerous as cash tenants, but in 1910 the latter (including those with unspecified tenure) were one and one-third times more numerous than the former.

It will be seen that, in 1910, 59.6 per cent of all land in farms was in farms operated by their owners (including part owners), 1.4 per cent in farms operated by managers, and 39 per cent in farms operated by tenants, the percentage for tenants being higher and that for owners lower than in 1900, while the percentage for managers remained the same.

As shown by the next table, the average size of farms operated by managers in 1910 (254.8 acres) was more than one and one-half times as great as that of farms operated by tenants (161.1 acres), which was in turn somewhat larger than that of farms operated by owners (152 acres). The average size of farms operated by tenants increased between 1900 and 1910, while that of farms operated by managers decreased, and that of farms operated by owners remained practically the same. In 1910 the percentage of farm land improved was highest for farms operated by tenants and lowest for farms operated by managers.

Farm mortgages: 1890 to 1910.—The Eleventh Census (1890) was the first to collect data relating to mortgage debt on farms. The basis of the returns was the "farm home" occupied by its owner. The same class of information was secured by the population schedules of the Twelfth Census (1900). The agricultural schedules of the Thirteenth Census (1910) secured practically the same information, except that the basis was "owned farms" instead of "owned farm homes"—a difference involving, however, no appreciable incomparability.

The next table relates to farms operated by persons owning all or part of the land, and shows for 1910 (1) the number of such farms reported as free from mortgage; (2) the number reported as mortgaged; and (3) the number for which no mortgage reports were secured. Comparable items are included for 1900 and 1890.

In 1910 the total number of farms owned in whole or in part by their operators was 133,003. Of this number, 63,234 were reported as free from mortgage; 68,045 were reported as mortgaged; and for 1,724 no report relative to mortgage indebtedness was obtained. The number of mortgaged farms constituted 51.8 per cent of the total number of owned farms, exclusive of those for which no mortgage report was obtained. The percentage is only slightly smaller than it was in 1900 and 1890. It may be noted that the percentages given for the three censuses are comparable, but that the number of mortgaged and unmortgaged farms reported in 1890 is not entirely comparable with the numbers reported at the later censuses because at the census of 1890 the farms for which no reports were secured were distributed between the classes of mortgaged and unmortgaged farms. It can be seen, however, that from 1890 to 1910 the number mortgaged decreased much more than the number free of mortgage.

The statement of mortgage debt and of the value of mortgaged farm property is restricted to the farms of those farmers who own all of their land and report the amount as well as the fact of indebtedness. Of the 68,045 farms reported as mortgaged, 52,174 are wholly owned by the farmers, and for 50,452 of these the amount of mortgage debt is reported. Only these last-mentioned farms are included for 1910 in the next table, which presents data relating to mortgaged farms for 1910 and 1890. In this connection it should be noted that in 1890 the amount of mortgage debt of farms with incomplete reports was estimated according to the percentages and averages obtained from farms with full reports, but that no such estimate is here made for 1910. The table gives a comparative statement of the value of mortgaged farms owned entirely by their operators and the amount of indebtedness, together with the average value of such farms, the average debt per farm, and the average equity per farm for 1910 and 1890. Data regarding amount of mortgage debt were not obtained in 1900.

The average debt of mortgaged farms increased in the 20 years from \$1,319 to \$4,048, or 207 per cent, while the average value of such farms rose from \$3,964 to \$14,574, or 267.7 per cent. Thus the owners' equity increased from \$2,645 to \$10,526, or 298 per

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cent. As a result of the greater increase in farm values than in farm debt, the mortgage indebtedness, which was 33.3 per cent of the value of the mortgaged farms in 1890, had decreased to 27.8 per cent of the value in 1910.

As shown by the above table, the largest of the groups of farms classified by size is the "100 to 174 acres" group, the 80,121 farms in this group constituting 36.9 per cent, or more than one-third, of the 217,044 farms in the state. The common 160-acre farm falls in this group. The group which is next in numerical importance is the "175 to 259 acres" group, comprising 40,304 farms. Hardly less important is the "50 to 99 acres" group, which includes 38,712 farms. A study of the distribution of farms by size groups discloses the fact that the greatest actual and relative gain in number from 1900 to 1910 was made in the "3 to 9 acres" group. The number of places "under 3 acres" where some agriculture is carried on is reported as only about two-fifths as great as 10 years ago. This decrease may be due to a different interpretation by the enumerators as to what to include as a small farm, or may represent an actual decrease in that type of farm. The farms which fall in the groups between 20 and 99 acres have decreased 16,750 in number, or 23.5 per cent; those between 175 and 499 acres have increased 3,412 in number, or 5.4 per cent; and those which exceed 500 acres in size, representing only 1.2 per cent of all farms, have decreased 514 in number.

Of the total farm acreage of the state in 1910, 50.7 per cent was in farms of 175 to 499 acres and 33.1 per cent in farms of 100 to 174 acres, these two size groups comprising about five-sixths of the aggregate acreage. Between 1900 and 1910 the proportion of the total acreage in farms of these two size groups increased, while the proportion in all the other groups decreased, with the exception of the farms of under 20 acres, in which the proportion remained the same.

As shown by the next table, the percentage of farm land improved is highest for farms of 100 to 174 acres, and is considerably lower for farms of 500 to 999 acres and those of 1,000 acres and over than for farms of any other size group.

Owing to the fact that buildings have normally a higher value in proportion to farm acreage on small than on large farms, the average value of land and buildings per acre of land diminishes with the increase in the size of the farms. It is very much higher for the farms under 20 acres in size than for those of any other group.

Color and nativity of farmers: 1910.—Prior to the Thirteenth Census no attempt was made to secure information on the farm schedules concerning the nativity of farmers. The table in the next column shows the color and nativity of farm operators by character of tenure for 1910.

Over three-fourths of the Iowa farmers were native whites, and nearly one-fourth foreign-born whites. Only 187, or one-tenth of 1 per cent of all farmers, were negroes, 14 Indians being reported. Of the native white farmers, four out of ten were tenants and about six out of ten owners, while among both the negro and the foreign-born white farmers about three out of ten were tenants and seven out of ten owners.

DOMESTIC ANIMALS, POULTRY, AND BEES.

Domestic animals on farms: 1910.—The census of 1910 was taken as of April 15, and that of 1900 as of June 1. Since a great many domestic animals are born during the six weeks between April 15 and June 1, and on the other hand a considerable number of older animals are slaughtered or die during the same period, the numbers of the different classes of animals for the two censuses are not closely comparable, and the same is true in somewhat less degree of the values. For this reason the figures for 1900 are not presented in this chapter, but in the general reports of the census the figures for the several states will be presented and the extent to which their comparability is affected by the change in the date of enumeration will be discussed.

The total value of live stock on farms, including domestic animals, poultry, and bees, in 1910 was \$393,003,000, of which domestic animals contributed \$380,202,000. The value of cattle represented 30.2 per cent of the total value of live stock; that of horses and mules, 47.2 per cent; that of swine, 17.7 per cent; that of sheep and lambs, 1.5 per cent; and that of poultry, 3.1 per cent, the other classes being insignificant.

The next table summarizes the statistics of domestic animals on farms for the state, recorded as of April 15, 1910. Cattle and sheep are divided into age and sex groups, while horses, mules, and swine are presented by age groups only.

Of the total number of farms enumerated, 213,131, or 98.2 per cent, report domestic animals of some kind, the number without any domestic animals being only 3,913.

Of all the farms in the state, 94.7 per cent report cattle, 93.3 per cent "dairy cows," and only 41 per cent "other cows." Only 3,015 farms have cattle

Of the 48,987 foreign-born white farmers in Iowa in 1910, 21,940 were born in Germany; 4,614 in Norway; 4,570 in Sweden; 4,061 in Denmark; 2,592 in Ireland; 2,479 in Holland; 2,374 in England; 2,279 in Austria; 1,433 in Canada; 777 in Switzerland; 676 in Scotland; and 308 in Wales.

Other European countries were represented by a total of 782 farmers, and non-European countries, other than Canada, by 102.

without having dairy cows. The farms reporting dairy cows show an average of 7 per farm, which is also the average number of other cows per farm reporting that class.

Horses and colts are reported by 96.7 per cent of all the farms in the state, while 42.6 per cent report colts born in 1909, and 15.1 per cent spring colts. Spring colts are valued at a little over one-half as much as yearling colts and more than one-fourth as much as mature horses; the average value of the latter is \$128.40.

About one farm out of every ten reports mules and mule colts. The average values of mules of the different ages are about 20 per cent higher than those of horses of the corresponding age groups, except in the case of mature animals, where the difference is a little over 15 per cent.

Sheep and lambs are reported from 21,810 farms, or one out of every ten. Of these farms, 77.3 per cent report spring lambs, the number of the latter being equal to 55.5 per cent of the number of ewes. This comparatively small proportion is doubtless due to the early date of enumeration. Ewes are reported from all but 895 of the farms reporting sheep, and for the farms reporting the average is over 32 ewes per farm. The farms reporting rams and wethers show an average of about 8 per farm.

Of all farms, 84.8 per cent report swine, the average being over 41 per farm reporting. The average value of the swine reported as "hogs and pigs born before January 1, 1910," is \$14.88, while that of spring pigs is less than one-eighth of this amount.

Poultry on farms: 1910 and 1900.—The following table gives the numbers of the various kinds of poultry reported in 1910 and 1900, together with their value, and the number of farms reporting each kind in 1910:

The value of the fowls on Iowa farms increased in the 10 years, 1900 to 1910, from \$6,535,000 to \$12,270,000, or 87.7 per cent, while the corresponding increase in the number of fowls was only 17.2 per cent. The number of farms reporting poultry decreased

from 214,832 to 204,635, while the average number of fowls per farm reporting increased from 93 to 115. The value of poultry and the number of farms reporting were obtained in 1900 for the total of all fowls only, and not for each kind as in 1910.

Bees on farms: 1910 and 1900.—The number of farms reporting bees has decreased from 28,977 in 1900 to 28,935 in 1910, or 0.1 per cent. The number of colonies of bees increased from 138,811 to 160,025, or 15.3 per cent, and their value from \$443,923 to \$517,329, or 16.5 per cent. The average value of bees per farm reporting was \$15.32 in 1900 and \$17.88 in 1910. More than one farm out of every eight reports bees.

Domestic animals not on farms: 1910.—Most of the domestic animals not on farms are found in cities, towns, and villages. Statistics for such animals are shown below. No provision was made by law to secure data pertaining to poultry and bees not on farms. In the table below, age groups are omitted for the sake of brevity; but it may be noted that in cities and villages a comparatively small proportion of the animals of each class are in the younger age groups.

The total value of all domestic animals in the state in 1910 was \$398,131,000, of which the value of animals not on farms represented 4.5 per cent.

SUPPLEMENT FOR IOWA.

LIVE STOCK PRODUCTS.

The returns for live stock products obtained at the census of 1910, like those for crops, relate to the activities of the calendar year 1909. It is impossible to give a total representing the annual production of live stock products for the reason that, as shown elsewhere, the total value of products from the business of raising domestic animals for use, sale, or slaughter can not be calculated from the census returns. Even if this value could be ascertained and were added to the value of the crops the sum would not correctly represent the total value of farm products, because, as already more fully explained, duplication would result from the fact that part of the crops are fed to the live stock.

Dairy products: 1909 and 1899.—The following table shows the principal statistics relative to dairy products in 1909, with certain comparative statistics for 1899:

The number of farms reporting dairy cows on April 15, 1910, was 202,539, but only 179,847 reported dairy products in 1909. That there should be this difference is not surprising. Doubtless some farmers who had dairy cows in 1910 had none in 1909, while other farmers neglected to give information for the preceding year, or were unable to do so, perhaps because the farm was then in other hands. Dairy products in general are somewhat less accurately reported than the principal crops. This is particularly the case as regards the quantity of milk produced. The number of farms which made any report of milk produced during 1909 was 130,796 (considerably less than the total number reporting dairy products), and the num-

ber of dairy cows on such farms on April 15, 1910, was 916,000. The amount of milk reported was 318,955,000 gallons; assuming that there were the same number of cows in 1909 as in 1910, this would represent an average of 348 gallons per cow. In considering this average, however, it should be borne in mind that the quantity of milk reported is probably deficient and that the distinction between dairy and other cows is not always strictly observed in the census returns.

By reason of the incompleteness of the returns for milk produced, the Census Bureau has made no attempt to determine the total value of dairy products for 1909. For convenience a partial total has been presented, comprising the reported value of milk, cream, and butter fat sold and the reported value of butter and cheese made, whether for home consumption or for sale. The total thus obtained for 1909 is \$31,197,000, which may be defined as the total value of dairy products exclusive of milk and cream used on the farm producing.

Only about one-sixth of the milk reported by Iowa farmers in 1909 was sold as such. Comparatively large quantities of milk and cream were sold on the butter fat basis. The butter made on farms in 1909 was valued at \$9,061,000.

Comparisons are made between 1909 and 1899 for but few of the census items relating to dairy products, for the reason that in 1899 estimates were made for farms with incomplete reports, which was not done at the census of 1910. The figures for milk produced and milk sold are particularly affected, but those for butter and cheese are approximately comparable. The table shows a material decrease between 1899 and 1909 in the amount of butter made, and a still greater relative decrease in the production of cheese.

Wool: 1909 and 1899.—The next table gives statistics as to the production of wool on farms, the figures being partly based on estimates.¹

The total number of sheep of shearing age in Iowa on April 15, 1910, was 770,000, representing an increase of 17 per cent as compared with the number on June 1, 1900 (658,000). The approximate production of wool during 1909 was 729,000 fleeces,

¹ Farmers should be able in general to report the production of wool more accurately than that of dairy products. There were, however, 8,355 farmers who reported the possession of 207,210 sheep of shearing age on April 15, 1910, without reporting any wool produced in 1909. Probably in a large proportion of cases this failure was due to the fact that they did not have these sheep, or did not occupy the same farm, during the preceding year. The returns of farms reporting wool in 1909 but no sheep of shearing age on April 15, 1910, would partially make up this deficiency, but it is believed that in many cases enumerators, having found that a farm had no sheep in 1910, omitted the inquiry as to wool produced in 1909 and thus missed more or less wool actually produced. It is a fairly safe assumption that the entire production of wool in 1909 bore the same relation to the entire number of sheep of shearing age on April 15, 1910, as the production of wool on those farms reporting both production and sheep bore to the number of sheep reported on such farms. Statistics for this group of farms are given in the table, and the total wool product, estimated on the basis of the above assumption, is also given.

weighing 5,485,000 pounds, and valued at \$1,414,000. Of these totals about one-fifth represents estimates. The number of fleeces produced in 1909 was 2 per cent greater than in 1899. The average weight per fleece in 1909 was 7.5 pounds, as compared with 7 pounds in 1899, and the average value per pound was 26 cents, as compared with 20 cents in 1899.

Goat hair and mohair: 1909 and 1899.—Although 2,400 farmers reported 20,664 goats and kids on their farms April 15, 1910, only 266 reported the production of goat hair or mohair during 1909. These farmers reported 8,703 fleeces, weighing 29,206 pounds and valued at \$7,261. The production was about the same as in 1899. Many farmers who have goats do not produce goat hair or mohair, but it is believed that the report is somewhat short of the actual production.

The total number of fowls on Iowa farms on April 15, 1910, was 23,483,000. Of the 204,635 farms reporting fowls, 18,825 did not report any eggs produced in 1909, and 18,196 did not report any poultry raised in 1909. The production of eggs actually reported for

the year 1909 was 103,274,000 dozens, valued at \$18,099,000. According to the Twelfth Census reports, the production of eggs in 1899 was 99,622,000 dozens, the value being \$10,017,000. The latter figures, however, are somewhat in excess of the actual returns at that census, because they include estimates made to cover those cases where the schedules reported fowls on hand without reporting the production of eggs. In order to make the returns for 1909 comparable with those published for 1899 similar estimates have been made, the method of estimate and the justification therefor being substantially the same as in the case of wool. The total production of eggs in 1909, including these estimates, was 109,760,000 dozens, valued at \$19,236,000. The total production of poultry in 1909, including estimates made on the same basis as for eggs, was 29,990,000 fowls, valued at \$13,915,000.

Honey and wax: 1909.—Although, as noted elsewhere, 28,935 farms reported 160,025 colonies of bees on hand April 15, 1910, 12,176 of these farms, with 38,747 colonies on hand April 15, 1910, made no report of honey or wax produced in 1909. The actual returns show the production of 2,374,080 pounds of honey, valued at \$275,418, and 44,266 pounds of wax, valued at \$10,011; the true totals are doubtless somewhat above these figures.

The total value of domestic animals sold during 1909 was \$208,069,000 and that of animals slaughtered on farms \$10,147,000, making an aggregate of \$218,216,000. This total, however, involves consider-

able duplication, resulting from the resale or slaughter of animals which had been purchased by the farmers during the same year.

The value of the cattle (including calves) sold during 1909 represented somewhat more than two-fifths of the total value of all animals sold, and the value of swine sold represented about two-fifths.

The census of 1900 called for the receipts from the sale of all domestic animals raised on the farms report-

ing and the total value of those slaughtered during 1899, which amounted, respectively, to \$113,079,000 and \$8,449,000. The item of sales is not closely comparable with that for 1909, when the inquiry covered all sales whether of animals raised on the farms reporting or elsewhere. It is believed, however, that in many cases the returns for 1899 also included receipts from the sales of animals not actually raised on the farms reporting.

CROPS.

Summary: 1909 and 1899.—The following table summarizes the census data relative to all of the farm crops of 1909 and 1899. It includes not only general farm crops, but also flowers and plants, nursery products, and forest products of farms. In comparing one year with the other it should be borne in mind that acreage is on the whole a better index of the general

changes or tendencies of agriculture than either the quantity or the value of the crops, since variations in quantity may be due largely to temporarily favorable or unfavorable climatic conditions, and variations in the value of the crops are largely affected by changes in prices. (See also discussion of "Total value of farm products.")

The total value of crops in 1909 was \$314,666,000. Of this amount, 96.8 per cent was contributed by crops for which the acreage as well as the value was reported, the remainder consisting of the value of by-products (straw, garden and grass seeds, etc.) derived from the same land as other crops reported, or of orchard fruits, nuts, forest products, and the like. The combined acreage of crops for which acreage was reported was 20,374,925, representing 69.1 per cent of the total improved land in farms (29,491,199 acres). Most of the remaining improved land doubtless consisted of improved pasture, land lying fallow, house and farm yards, and land occupied by orchards and vineyards, the acreage for which was not reported.

The general character of Iowa agriculture is indicated by the fact that about three-fourths (73.2 per cent) of the total value of crops in

1909 was contributed by the cereals, and about one-fifth (18.9 per cent) by hay and forage. The remainder, representing 7.9 per cent of the total, consisted mostly of vegetables, fruits and nuts, and forest products.

The total value of crops in 1909 was 60.9 per cent greater than in 1899. This increase was clearly due in part to higher prices. There was a decrease of 7.3 per cent in the total acreage of crops for which acreage was reported, the greatest absolute decrease being that in the acreage of cereals, and the only important increase in that of hay and forage.

General farm crops, minor grains and seeds, and sundry minor crops: 1879 to 1909.—The next table presents statistics for 1909 regarding cereals, other grains and seeds, hay and forage, potatoes, tobacco, and sundry minor crops.

The leading crops shown by the table, in the order of importance as judged by value, are corn, \$167,623,000; hay and forage, \$59,360,000; oats, \$49,047,000; wheat, \$7,703,000; potatoes, \$6,629,000; barley, \$5,321,000; and timothy seed, \$1,406,000. It will be observed that several crops, statistics for which appear elsewhere, are more important than several of the crops mentioned in the table.

By far the most important crop is corn, the reported value of this cereal being nearly three times as great as that of hay and forage, which ranks second, and nearly three and a half times as great as that of oats, which ranks third. From oats to wheat, the cereal ranking next below in value, there is a big drop, the reported value of wheat being less than one-sixth that of oats. In both value and yield winter wheat outranks spring wheat, though the latter exceeds the former both in acreage and in number of farms reporting. Potatoes show a value nearly as great as that of wheat. Timothy seed in some sections of the state is an important crop. Of the total acreage of this crop, almost one-third is reported from six counties—three in the northeastern and three in the southeastern and southern parts of the state. Of the 15,041,039

acres devoted to cereals in 1909, over three-fifths were in corn, which, together with the acreage in oats, accounts for over nine-tenths of the whole. "Timothy and clover mixed" and "timothy alone" constitute nearly three-fourths of all hay and forage crops. Alfalfa is reported for every county, except two, yet three-fourths of the acreage is in the western tier of counties.

For several of the less important crops the acreages are omitted because of uncertainties in the reports; it is believed, however, that the reports of yields are reliable. During the past decade none of the minor crops, with the exception of alfalfa, have made much headway. This crop is now grown by about one farmer in fifty and is valued at nearly \$25 per acre.

The acreage in corn increased from approximately six and two-thirds millions in 1879 to a little more than nine and three-quarters millions in 1899, subsequently decreasing to somewhat less than nine and a quarter millions in 1909. The acreage in oats and also that in barley more than trebled between 1879 and 1899, but decreased slightly during the past decade. The acreage of wheat has varied widely at different periods. At the census of 1910 it is less than one-third as large as it was in 1899, and slightly less than it was in 1889. In 1879, however, the acreage of wheat was almost six times that reported in 1909. For all cereals combined there was a falling off in acreage, during the last decade, of 1,879,056, or 11.1 per cent, all of the important cereal crops sharing in the decrease. By far the greatest of the decreases is that shown for wheat, the acreage of which decreased over two-thirds during the decade. For the other cereal crops, with the exception of rye, the decrease in acreage was relatively small, being in the case of barley 9 per cent, with corn and oats following in order. The only crop here enumerated for which a gain in acreage is reported for the last decade is hay and forage, the gain amounting to 396,807 acres.

The next table shows for 1909 and 1899 the percentage which the farms reporting specified crops represented of all farms, the percentage of improved land devoted to these crops, and the percentage of increase or decrease in the acreage of each crop during the decade, together with the average yields and average values per acre for 1909.

Corn is grown by over nine-tenths of the farms of the state, hay and forage by more than eight-tenths, and oats by about seven-tenths. Potatoes are reported from about four farms in five. None of the other crops are very generally grown. Slightly more than one-half of all improved land is in cereals and about one-sixth in hay and forage.

The average value per acre for all cereals combined is \$15.31, which among the cereals is exceeded by the average for corn only. Corn is reported at about one and one-third times the value of wheat per acre, wheat ranking second. Hay and forage ranks in value per acre above each of the cereals other than the two just mentioned, falling, however, almost 40 per cent short of the value of corn per acre.

Within the state some important readjustments have taken place. The acreage of wheat, though decreasing greatly in the state as a whole, shows relatively large increases in all the southeastern counties, and in some of the extreme southern counties, but nowhere else is there an exception to the general tendency. Oats, on the contrary, show important gains in acreage in all of the northwestern counties, small gains in a few of the central and southern counties, and decreases elsewhere. Barley, although showing a net decrease in acreage, made gains in nearly two-thirds of the counties, the losses, largely in a few northwestern counties, overbalancing them. The decrease in the corn acreage is distributed quite evenly over the state, gains occurring in but seven scattered counties, and in a line of counties extending from Mitchell County west to the corner of the state and south to Plymouth, inclusive. The greatest increase is in Lyon County, about 35,000 acres; the greatest decrease, in Taylor, over 25,000 acres. Hay and forage increased quite generally, decreases occurring in a small group of counties in the north central part of the state, and in a group extending along the southern border.

The total acreage of potatoes and other vegetables was 252,243 and their value \$12,021,408. Excluding (so far as reported separately¹) potatoes and sweet potatoes and yams, the acreage of vegetables was 80,402 and their value \$5,266,000, the acreage showing a decrease and the value a decided increase as compared with 1899. The table distinguishes between farms which make the raising of vegetables a business of some importance (having produced vegetables valued at \$500 or more in 1909) and other farms, on most of which vegetables are raised mainly for home consumption. There were in 1909, 646 farms in the first class, representing only a very small proportion of all the farms that reported vegetables, but containing nearly one-fifth of the acreage and producing about one-seventh of the total value of vegetables, the average acreage of vegetables per farm for these farms being 22.3 and the average value of product per acre \$53.54.

The raising of flowers and plants and of nursery products is also of importance in Iowa, 3,791 acres being devoted to them in 1909, and the output being valued at \$1,503,305. Most of the product was raised on farms where these branches of agriculture were carried on as an important business.

Strawberries are by far the most important of the small fruits raised in Iowa, with blackberries and dewberries and raspberries and loganberries ranking second and third, respectively. The total acreage of small fruits in 1909 was 7,211, and in 1899, 9,635, a decrease of 25.2 per cent. The production in 1909 was 10,344,000 quarts, as compared with 11,327,000 quarts in 1899, and the value \$967,000, as compared with \$878,000.

Orchard fruits, grapes, nuts, and tropical fruits: 1909 and 1899.—The following table presents data with regard to orchard fruits, grapes, nuts, and tropical fruits. The acreage devoted to these products was not ascertained. In comparing one year with the other the number of trees or vines of bearing age is on the whole a better index of the general changes or tendencies than the quantity of product, but the data for the censuses of 1910 and 1900 are not closely comparable, and the product is therefore compared, although variations may be due largely to temporarily favorable or unfavorable climatic conditions.

The total quantity of orchard fruits produced in 1909 was 7,234,000 bushels, valued at \$4,284,000. Apples contributed more than nine-tenths of this quantity, cherries and plums and prunes most of the remainder. The production of grapes in 1909 amounted to 11,708,000 pounds, valued at \$330,000, and that of nuts to 1,721,000 pounds, valued at \$37,000. Most of the nuts were black walnuts and hickory nuts.

The production of all orchard fruits together in 1909 was 109.3 per cent more in quantity than in 1899, and the production of grapes also increased. The total value of orchard fruits increased from \$1,850,000 in 1899 to \$4,284,000 in 1909, and of grapes from \$166,000 in 1899 to \$330,000 in 1909. It should be noted in this connection that the values for 1899 include the value of more advanced products derived from orchard fruits or grapes, such as cider, vinegar, dried fruits, and the like, and may therefore involve

some duplication, while the values shown for 1909 relate only to the products in their original condition.

Sugar crops: 1909 and 1899.—The next table shows data with regard to maple trees and their products, and for sugar beets and sorghum cane. The total value of sorghum cane and sirup produced in 1909 was \$173,000, as compared with \$219,000 in 1899; the value of sugar beets was \$35,024 in 1909, while there was no production of sugar beets reported in 1899; and the value of maple sugar and sirup was \$11,495 in 1909, and \$2,920 in 1899.

Forest products: 1909 and 1899.—The census schedules for 1910 called for the "value of all firewood, fencing material, logs, railroad ties, telegraph and telephone poles, materials for barrels, bark, naval stores, or other forest products cut or produced in 1909, whether used on farm, sold, or on hand April 15, 1910;" and also, in a separate item, for the "amount received from sale of standing timber in 1909." There were 50,952 farms in Iowa (23.5 per cent of all farms

in the state) which reported forest products in 1909, the total value of such products being \$3,649,032, as compared with \$3,266,449 in 1899, an increase of 11.7 per cent. Of the value in 1909, \$2,756,235 was reported as that of products used or to be used on the farms themselves, \$831,937 as that of products sold or for sale, and \$60,860 as the amount received for standing timber. It should be noted that forest products not produced on farms are not included in this report.

Miscellaneous crops: 1909.—Straw and cornstalks derived as by-products from the production of grain and corn have a considerable value for feed and other purposes. They are, however, mainly consumed on the farms producing them. The Census Bureau made no attempt to ascertain the total quantity or value of these products, but the schedules called for the quantity and value of those sold during the year 1909. The returns show that 26 farmers reported the sale of 439 tons of flax fiber, valued at \$5,643, and 123 farmers reported the sale of 1,216 tons of flax straw, valued at \$3,231. In addition, 3,954 farmers in Iowa sold, during 1909, 29,285 tons of straw, for which they received \$97,793, and that 887 farmers sold 9,495 tons of cornstalks and leaves, for which they received \$31,054.

SELECTED FARM EXPENSES AND RECEIPTS.

Farm expenses: 1909 and 1899.—The next table shows the number of farms reporting expenditures for labor, feed, and fertilizer at the census of 1910, as well as the sums expended in 1909 and 1899.

During the decade the total expenditure for labor, one-fourth of which was in 1909 in the form of rent and board furnished, increased 51.3 per cent. Half of the farmers of Iowa hire labor, the average amount expended by those hiring in 1909 being \$228. At prior censuses no tabulation was made of the number of farmers reporting expenditures for labor.

Three farmers out of every eight report some expenditure for feed, while less than one out of every

hundred reports the purchase of fertilizer. Less than one-third as much was spent for fertilizer in 1909 as in 1899, the average expenditure per farm for those reporting in 1909 being \$61.69.

Receipts from sale of feedable crops: 1909.—An effort was made at the census of 1910 to secure as complete a statement as possible of the sales as well as of the production of the more important feedable crops (that is, crops ordinarily fed to live stock). The following table summarizes the data reported:

While the total amount expended by Iowa farmers for the purchase of feed in 1909 was \$18,582,000, the total receipts from the sale of feed by those reporting sales amounted to \$57,034,000.

COUNTY TABLES.

Tables 1 to 6, which follow, present by counties the more important agricultural data collected at the Thirteenth Census, 1910.

Table 1 shows the population, number of farms, land and farm area, value of farm property, and number and value of domestic animals and of poultry and bees, as of April 15, 1910. Comparative data for June 1, 1900, are given in italics for certain items.

Table 2 gives the number of farms, the farm acreage, and the value of farm property operated by owners, tenants, and managers, collected as of April 15, 1910. Statistics of farm mortgages are included in this table. (See explanation in text.) Comparative data for June 1, 1900, are given in italics for certain items.

Table 3 gives statistics pertaining to the products of live stock on farms (dairy products, poultry and eggs, honey and wax, and wool and mohair); also the number and value of domestic animals sold or slaughtered on farms for the year 1909.

Table 4 shows the total value of farm crops and the principal classes thereof, together with the acreage (or

trees of bearing age) and production of the principal crops for the year 1909.

Table 5 gives statistics relating to selected farm expenses for 1909 and also shows the receipts from the sale of feedable crops.

Table 6 shows the number and value of domestic animals in barns and inclosures not on farms, by classes, together with the number of dairy cows and mature horses and mules, on April 15, 1910.

Changes in 1900 figures.—After the volumes of the Twelfth Decennial United States Census (1900) had been printed, a further detailed study and analysis of the data there presented brought to light certain errors in the total farm acreage of 10 counties. These counties, with their corrected acreages, are: Allamakee, 372,448 (not 383,324); Appanoose, 314,952 (not 325,147); Benton, 448,874 (not 458,801); Buena Vista, 354,835 (not 360,231); Clarke, 256,408 (not 259,491); Fremont, 308,174 (not 328,958); Madison, 349,425 (not 354,216); Monona, 410,082 (not 386,780); Polk, 361,513 (not 370,252); and Pottawattamie, 587,001 (not 599,930).

CHAPTER 4.

STATISTICS OF MANUFACTURES FOR THE STATE, CITIES, AND INDUSTRIES.

Introduction.—This chapter gives the statistics of manufactures for the state of Iowa for the calendar year 1909 as shown by the Thirteenth Census.

The text summarizes the general results of the census inquiry, presenting a series of special tables in which the main facts printed in the general tables are given in convenient form for the state as a whole and for important industries. It also presents tables in which the statistics for the industries of the state as a whole and for a few important industries are classified by character of ownership, size of establishments, number of wage earners, and prevailing hours of labor, information which could not be presented in general tables for each industry without disclosing the facts for individual establishments.

At the end of the chapter are three general tables.

Table I gives for 1909, 1904, and 1899 the number of establishments and of persons engaged in the industries, primary power, capital, salaries and wages, cost of materials, value of products, and value added by manufacture reported for all industries combined and for certain important industries (1) for the state as a whole and (2) for the city of Des Moines. It also gives the same items for all industries combined for every city having in 1910 a population of over 10,000 but less than 50,000.

Table II gives statistics in detail for 1909 for the state and for a larger number of industries.

Table III gives statistics in detail for 1909 for Des Moines for all industries combined and selected industries, and for each city having from 10,000 to 50,000 inhabitants for all industries combined.

Scope of census: Factory industries.—Census statistics of manufactures are compiled primarily for the purpose of showing the absolute and relative magnitude of the different branches of industry covered and their growth or decline. Incidentally, the effort is made to present data throwing light upon character of organization, location of establishments, size of establishments, labor force, and similar subjects. When use is made of the data for these purposes it is imperative that due attention should be given to the limitations of the figures. Particularly is this true when the attempt is made to derive from them figures purporting to show average wages, cost of production, or profits. These limitations will be fully discussed in the general report on manufactures for the United States as a whole.

The census of 1909, like that of 1904, was confined to manufacturing establishments conducted under the factory system, as distinguished from the neighborhood, hand, and building industries. Where statistics for 1899 are given they have been reduced

to a comparable basis by eliminating the latter classes of industries. The census does not include establishments which were idle during the entire year, or had a value of products of less than \$500, or the manufacturing done in educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions, or in governmental establishments, except those of the Federal Government.

Period covered.—The returns cover the calendar year 1909, or the business year which corresponds most nearly to that calendar year. The statistics cover a year's operations, except for establishments which began or discontinued business during the year.

The establishment.—The term "establishment" comprises the factories, mills, or plants which are under a common ownership or control, and for which one set of books of account is kept.

If, however, the plants constituting an establishment as thus defined were not all located within the same city or state, separate reports were secured in order that the separate totals might be included in the statistics for each city or state. In some instances separate reports were secured for different industries carried on in the same establishment.

Classification by industries.—The establishments were assigned to the several classes of industries according to their products of chief value. The products reported for a given industry may thus, on the one hand, include minor products very different from those covered by the class designation, and, on the other hand, may not include the total product covered by this designation, because some part of this product may be made in establishments in which it is not the product of chief value.

Selected industries.—The general tables at the end of this chapter give the principal facts separately for the industries of the state. A selection has been made of the leading industries of the state for more detailed consideration. Sometimes an industry of greater importance than some of those selected is omitted because it comprises so few establishments that these detailed presentations would reveal the operations of individual concerns.

Comparisons with previous censuses.—Owing to the changes in industrial conditions it is not always possible to classify establishments by industries in such a way as to permit accurate comparison with preceding censuses. Table I, giving comparable figures for 1909, 1904, and 1899, therefore, does not embrace all the industries shown for 1909 in Table II.

Influence of increased prices.—In considering changes in cost of materials, value of products, and value added by manufacture, account should be taken of the general increase in the prices of commodities during recent years. To the extent to which this factor has been influential the figures can not be taken as an exact measure of increase in the volume of business.

Persons engaged in industry.—At the censuses of 1909, 1904, and 1899, the following general classes of persons engaged in manufacturing industries have been distinguished: (1) Proprietors and firm members, (2) salaried officers of corporations, (3) superintendents and managers, (4) clerks, and (5) wage earners. In the censuses of 1904 and 1899 these five classes were shown according to the three main groups: (1) Proprietors and firm members, (2) salaried officials, clerks, etc., and (3) wage earners. The second group included the three classes of salaried officers of corporations, superintendents and managers, and clerks. In the present census an entirely different

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grouping is employed: That into (1) proprietors and officials, (2) clerks, and (3) wage earners. The first group includes proprietors and firm members, salaried officers of corporations, and superintendents and managers.

At this census the number of persons engaged in the industries, segregated by sex, and, in the case of wage earners, also by age (whether under 16 or 16 and over), was reported for December 15, or the nearest representative day. The 15th of December was selected as representing for most industries normal conditions of employment, but where conditions were exceptional, and particularly in the case of certain seasonal industries, such as canning, the December date could not be accepted as typical and an earlier date had to be chosen.

In the case of employees other than wage earners the number thus reported on December 15, or other representative day, has been treated as equivalent to the average for the year, since the number of employees of this class does not vary much from month to month in a given industry. In the case of wage earners the average is obtained in the manner explained in the next paragraph.

Wage earners.—In addition to the report by sex and age of the number of wage earners on December 15, or other representative day, a report was obtained of the number employed on the 15th of each month, without distinction of sex or age. From these figures the average number of wage earners for the year has been calculated by dividing the sum of the numbers reported each month by 12. The average thus obtained represents the number of wage earners that would be required to perform the work done if all were constantly employed during the entire year. Accordingly, the importance of any industry as an employer of labor is believed to be more accurately measured by this average than by the number employed at any one time or on a given day.

The number of wage earners reported for the representative day, though given for each separate industry, is not totaled for all industries combined, because in view of the variations of date such a total is believed not to be significant. It would involve more or less duplication of persons working in different industries at different times, would not represent the total number employed in all industries at any one time, and would give an undue weight to seasonal industries, as compared with industries in continual operation.

In particular, totals by sex and age for the wage earners reported for the representative day would be misleading, because of the undue weight given to seasonal industries, in some of which, such as canning and preserving, the distribution of the wage earners by sex and age is materially different from that in most industries of more regular operation. In order to determine as nearly as possible the sex and age distribution of the average number of wage earners in the state as a whole, the following procedure has been adopted:

The percentage distribution by sex and age of the wage earners in each industry, for December 15, or the nearest representative day, has been calculated from the actual numbers reported for that date. This percentage has been applied to the average number of wage earners for the year in that industry, to determine the average number of men, women, and children employed. These calculated averages for the several industries have been added up to give the average distribution for the state as a whole.

In 1899 and 1904 the schedule called for the average number of wage earners of each sex 16 years and over, and the total number under 16 years of age, for each month, and these monthly statements were combined in an annual average. Comparatively few manufacturing concerns, however, keep their books in such way as to show readily the number of men, women, and children (under 16) employed each month. These monthly returns by sex and age were, in fact, largely estimates. It was believed that a more accurate and reliable sex and age distribution could be secured by taking as a basis of estimate the actual numbers employed on a single day.

Prevailing hours of labor.—The census made no attempt to ascertain the number of employees working a given number of hours per week. The inquiry called merely for the prevailing practice

followed in each establishment. Occasional variations in hours in an establishment from one period to another are disregarded, and no attention is given to the fact that a limited number of employees may have hours differing from those of the majority. In the tables all the wage earners of each establishment are counted in the class within which the establishment itself falls. In most establishments, however, all or practically all the employees work the same number of hours, so that these figures give a substantially correct picture of the hours of labor in manufacturing industries.

Capital.—For reasons stated in prior census reports, the statistics of capital secured by the census canvass are so defective as to be without value, except as indicating very general conditions. The instructions on the schedule for securing capital were as follows:

The answer should show the total amount of capital, both owned and borrowed, on the last day of the business year reported. All the items of fixed and live capital may be taken at the amounts carried on the books. If land or buildings are rented, that fact should be stated and no value given. If a part of the land or buildings is owned, the remainder being rented, that fact should be so stated and only the value of the owned property given. Do not include securities and loans representing investments in other enterprises.

Materials.—Cost of materials refers to the materials used during the year, which may be more or less than the materials purchased during the year. The term materials includes fuel, rent of power and heat, mill supplies, and containers, as well as materials forming a constituent part of the product. Fuel includes all fuel used, whether for heat, light, or power, or for the process of manufacture.

Expenses.—Under "Expenses" are included all items of expense incident to the year's business, except interest, whether on bonds or other forms of indebtedness, and allowances for depreciation.

Value of products.—The value of products for any industry includes the total value of all products manufactured in establishments whose products of chief value fall under the industry designation. The amounts given represent the selling value at the factory of all products manufactured during the year, which may differ from the value of the products sold. Amounts received for work on materials furnished by others are included.

Value added by manufacture.—The value of products is not a satisfactory measure of either the absolute or the relative importance of a given industry, because only a part of this value is actually created by the manufacturing process carried on in the industry itself. Another part of it, and often by far the larger part, represents the value of the materials used, which have been produced by agriculture or mining or by other industrial establishments. For many purposes, therefore, the best measure of the importance of different classes of industry is the value created as the result of the manufacturing operations carried on within the industry. This value is obtained by deducting the cost of the materials consumed from the value of the product. The figure thus obtained is termed in the census reports "value added by manufacture."

There is a further statistical advantage which "value added" has over gross value of products. In combining the value of products for all industries the value of products produced by one establishments and used as materials in another is duplicated, and the total, therefore, gives a greatly exaggerated idea of the wealth created. No such duplication takes place in the total "value added by manufacture."

Cost of manufacture and profits.—Census data do not show the entire cost of manufacture, and consequently can not be used to show profits. No account has been taken of interest and depreciation. Even if the amount of profit could be determined by deducting the expenses from the value of the products the rate of profit on the investment could not properly be calculated, because of the very defective character of the returns regarding capital.

Primary power.—The figures given for this item show the total of the primary power used by the establishments. They do not cover the power developed by motors operated by such power, the inclusion of which would evidently result in duplication.

Location of establishments.—The Census Bureau has classified establishments by their location in cities or classes of cities. In interpreting these figures due consideration should be given to the fact that often establishments are located just outside the boundaries of cities, and are necessarily so classified, though locally they are looked upon as constituting a part of the manufacturing interests of the cities.

Laundries.—The census of 1909 was the first to include statistics of laundries. The reports are confined to establishments

using mechanical power. The data are presented separately and are not included in the general total for manufacturing industries, in order to avoid interference with comparisons with prior censuses.

Custom sawmills and gristmills.—In order to make the statistics for 1909 comparable with those for 1904 the data for these mills have been excluded from all the tables presenting general statistics, and are given in a separate table at the end of this chapter.

INDUSTRIES IN GENERAL.

General character of the state.—Iowa, with a gross area of 56,147 square miles, of which 561 represent water surface, ranks twenty-fourth in size among the 49 states and territories of continental United States. Its population in 1910 was 2,224,771, as compared with 2,231,853 in 1900 and 1,912,297 in 1890. In 1910 the density of population was 40 per square mile, the corresponding figure for 1900 being 40.2. As regards population, it ranked fifteenth among the 49 states and territories of continental United States in 1910 and tenth in 1900. Thirty and six-tenths per cent of the entire population of the state resided in incorporated cities and towns having a population of 2,500 or over, as against 25.6 per cent in 1900.

Des Moines, with a population of 86,368, is the only city in the state having a population of over 50,000. Sixteen other cities, however, each have a population exceeding 10,000. They are Boone, Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Clinton, Council Bluffs, Davenport, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Iowa City, Keokuk, Marshalltown, Mason City, Muscatine, Ottumwa, Sioux City, and Waterloo. These 17 cities contained 21 per cent of the total population of the state and were credited with 73 per cent of the total value of its manufactures. Apart from the cities named, only 9.6 per cent of the population of the state resided in cities and towns of 2,500 inhabitants or over.

The railway facilities, consisting of trunk lines and various branch lines serving as feeders, are excellent, Iowa ranking fourth among the states in 1909 in the length of trackage.¹ The Mississippi River on

the eastern boundary of the state and the Missouri River on the western boundary afford water transportation.

Importance and growth of manufactures.—In 1899 the value of the agricultural products of Iowa was greater than that for any other state, while in the value of its manufactures the state ranked only seventeenth in 1899 and eighteenth in 1909.

In 1849, when Iowa ranked twenty-seventh in the value of its manufactures, the total value of the manufactures of the state, including the products of the neighborhood and hand industries, amounted to only \$3,552,000, while in 1909, exclusive of the value of the products of the neighborhood and hand industries, it reached \$259,238,000. In 1849 an average of 1,707 wage earners, representing nine-tenths of 1 per cent of the total population, were engaged in manufactures, while in 1909 an average of 61,635 wage earners, or 2.8 per cent of the total population, were so engaged. During this period the gross value of manufactured products per capita for the total population of the state increased from \$18 to \$117. From 1849 to 1909 the proportion which the value of the manufactures of the state represented of the total value of products of manufacturing industries in the United States increased from three-tenths of 1 per cent to 1.3 per cent.

The following table gives the most important figures relative to all classes of manufactures combined for the state as returned at the censuses of 1909, 1904, and 1899, together with the percentages of increase from census to census:

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In 1909 the state of Iowa had 5,528 manufacturing establishments, which gave employment to an average of 78,360 persons during the year and paid out \$43,514,000 in salaries and wages. Of the persons employed, 61,635 were wage earners. These establishments turned out products to the value of \$259,238,000, to produce which materials costing \$170,707,000 were used. The value added by manufacture was thus \$88,531,000, which figure, as explained in the Introduction, best represents the net wealth created by manufacturing operations during the year.

In general, this table brings out the fact that the manufacturing industries of Iowa as a whole showed a steady growth during the two five-year periods. For the earlier period, 1899-1904, although the number of establishments decreased nine-tenths of 1 per cent, the number of wage earners increased 11.4 per cent,

the value of products 20.8 per cent, and the value added by manufacture 22.6 per cent. Much greater increases, however, are shown for the more recent period, 1904-1909. During this period the number of establishments increased 15.5 per cent, the average number of wage earners 24.6 per cent, the value of products 61.4 per cent, and the value added by manufacture 53.4 per cent. As pointed out in the Introduction, it would be improper to infer that manufactures increased in volume to the full extent indicated by these figures regarding values, since the increase shown is certainly due, in part, to the increase that has taken place in the price of commodities. The only decrease shown in the table is that in the number of establishments during the period 1899-1904.

The relative importance and growth of the leading manufacturing industries of the state are shown in the following table:

It should be borne in mind, in considering this table, that the value of products in some of the industries involves a certain amount of duplication, due to the use of the product of one establishment in the industry as material for another establishment.

In addition to the 45 industries presented separately, there are 14 important industries each of which had a value of products in 1909 in excess of \$500,000. They are included under the head of "All other industries" in the table, in some cases because the operations of individual establishments would be disclosed if they were shown separately; in others, the returns do not properly present the true condition of the industry, for the reason that it is more or less interwoven with one or more industries of similar character; while for others, comparable statistics for the different census years can not be presented on account of changes in classification. These industries are: Automobiles, including bodies and parts; brooms; butter, reworking; cars, steam-railroad, not including operations of railroad companies; cement; coffee and spice, roasting and grinding; explosives; food preparations; glucose and starch; mineral and soda waters; oil, linseed; soap; stationery goods, not elsewhere specified; and washing machines and clothes wringers. Statistics for 1909 for the manufacture of automobiles, including bodies and parts, and of brooms are presented in Table II.

Although a few industries predominate greatly in importance, it will be seen from Table II that there is, on the whole, considerable diversity in the manufacturing activities of the state. The most important industries listed in the table, in which they are arranged in the order of the value of products, call for brief consideration.

Slaughtering and meat packing.—This industry is by far the most important in the state when measured by value of products, although 4 other industries employed a greater average number of wage earners. It embraces not only establishments doing wholesale slaughtering and meat packing, but also those engaged in the manufacture of sausage. Twenty-seven of the 33 plants reported in 1909 were engaged primarily in the first-named branch of the industry. The industry is to a large extent confined to the four cities of Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Ottumwa, and Sioux City. In 1849 there were 8 establishments reported, with a product valued at \$273,600, or 7.7 per cent of the total for all manufacturing industries in the state, whereas the value of output in 1909 constituted 22.8 per cent of the total. The value of products increased from \$25,763,000 in 1899 to \$59,045,000 in 1909, a gain of \$33,282,000, or 129.2 per cent. In 1909 the state held sixth place among the states and territories in this industry, as compared with the eighth place in 1904 and 1899.

Butter, cheese, and condensed milk.—The factory manufacture of butter, cheese, and condensed milk, common to many agricultural districts, is the second industry of the state when measured by value of products. Iowa has occupied a prominent place in the creamery industry ever since its establishment on a factory basis. In 1904 it ranked third among the states, the value of its products being \$15,028,000, or 8.9 per cent of the total for all the states. From 1904 to 1909 the industry showed marked development, the value of products having increased \$10,822,000, or 72 per cent. It continued to rank third in respect to its manufactured dairy products in 1909.

Foundry and machine-shop products.—This industry includes not only foundries and machine-shops, but also establishments engaged in the manufacture of gas machines and meters; hardware; plumbers' supplies; steam fittings and heating apparatus; and structural ironwork. The industry was really of greater importance in the state than is indicated by the statistics, as some machine shops manufacturing a distinctive product were assigned to other classifications. A number of the most important establishments are engaged in the manufacture of pumps, windmills, and parts for agricultural machinery. With the exception of steam-railroad repair shops a larger number of wage earners were employed in the foundry and machine-shop industry than in any other industry, constituting 8.3 per cent of the total wage earners in all industries. The growth in the value of products during the 10-year period 1899-1909 amounted to \$8,568,000, or 155.9 per cent.

Flour-mill and gristmill products.—As a rule, the mills are small and are located in the rural districts. Owing to the comparatively simple processes involved and the extent to which these processes are carried on by machinery, the value added by manufacture and the number of wage earners employed are not commensurate with the gross value of products. The development during the last 10 years was slight when compared with all manufactures combined and other important industries individually. Iowa was nineteenth among the states in the value of flour-mill and gristmill products in 1909, eighteenth in 1904, and fifteenth in 1899.

Lumber and timber products.—This industry includes the logging operations, as well as the mills which saw rough lumber, shingles, and cooperage materials, the mills which produce finished lumber, sash, doors, blinds, interior finish, and other millwork, and wooden packing-box factories. The output of the planing mills in 1909 represented much the greater proportion of the total value of products for the entire industry. The state contains very little timber land. For a number of years the sawmills of Iowa have been largely depend-

ent upon the forests of Minnesota and Wisconsin for logs, and the depletion of those forests, together with the establishment of many mills in those states, has caused a decline in the lumber industry of Iowa. In 1909 the value of products was \$12,659,000, as compared with \$14,635,000 in 1899, a decrease of \$1,976,000, or 13.5 per cent, during the decade.

Printing and publishing.—The printing and publishing of newspapers, books, music, and periodicals; job printing; bookbinding and blank-book making; and lithographing are included under this classification in Iowa. Almost one-fifth of all the manufacturing establishments of the state were reported by this industry in 1909, although it employed only 7.9 per cent of the total wage earners and reported only 4.7 per cent of the total value of products. More than twice as many establishments were engaged in this industry than in any other in the state.

Cars and general shop construction and repairs by steam-railroad companies.—The activity in this industry is confined practically to repairs to the rolling stock and equipment of the steam railroads, although to a limited extent there may be some construction of new rolling stock. The statistics are exclusive of minor repairs made in roundhouses. More wage earners are employed in this industry than in any other manufacturing industry in the state, the number being 6,969 in 1909, or 11.3 per cent of the total for all manufacturing industries combined.

Buttons.—The output of buttons in Iowa consists of the fresh-water pearl variety, made from the shells of the Mississippi River mussel. Muscatine is the center of the industry in the state, having within its corporate limits 43 of the 70 establishments reported for the entire state in 1909.

None of the six leading industries presented in the preceding table hold the same rank when measured by value added by manufacture as when measured by value of products. When measured by value added by manufacture, printing and publishing displaces slaughtering and meat packing from first place, the latter industry falling to third place. The foundries and machine shops displace the butter, cheese, and condensed-milk industry from second place, the latter industry dropping to seventh place. The lumber and timber industry advances from fifth to fourth place, and flour mills and gristmills change from fourth to fifteenth place. The brick and tile industry ranks only eleventh in value of products, but sixth in value added by manufacture.

This table shows also the percentages of increase for the leading industries in respect to value of products and value added by manufacture, where these statistics are comparable. Five industries—artificial stone,

gas and electric fixtures and lamps and reflectors, dairymen's, poulterers', and apiarists' supplies, pottery, terra-cotta, and fire-clay products, and manufactured ice—show extraordinary rates of increase from 1904 to 1909 in both value of products and value added by manufacture.

Persons engaged in manufacturing industries.—The following table shows, for 1909, the distribution of the number of persons engaged in manufactures, the average number of wage earners being distributed by sex and age. It should be borne in mind, however, that the sex and age classification of the average number of wage earners in this and other tables is an estimate obtained by the method described in the Introduction.

The average number of persons engaged in manufactures during 1909 was 78,360, of whom 61,035 were wage earners. Of the remainder, 8,814 were proprietors and officials and 7,911 were clerks. Corresponding figures for individual industries will be found in Table II.

The next table shows, for 1909, the percentage of proprietors and officials, clerks, and wage earners, respectively, among the total number of persons employed in manufactures. It covers all industries combined and 15 important industries individually.

Of the total number of persons engaged in all manufacturing industries, 11.2 per cent were proprietors and officials, 10.1 per cent clerks, and 78.7 per cent wage earners. In the bakeries, creameries, flour mills and gristmills, and printing and publishing establishments, the proportion of proprietors and officials was 20 per cent or more. Many of the establishments reported in the industries named are small and the work is to a large extent done by the proprietors or their immediate representatives, so that the proportion of persons engaged in these industries falling into the class of proprietors and officials is very much higher than for most of the other industries or for all industries combined. The smallest

proportion for this class is shown for railroad repair shops and is due partly to the fact that the establishments in this industry were under corporate ownership and so reported no proprietors; and partly to the fact that the higher officials of the railroad companies, who exercise general supervision over them, are not as a rule assigned to this particular branch of work.

The following table shows, for 1909, in percentages, for all industries combined, the distribution of the average number of wage earners by age periods, and for those 16 years of age and over by sex, calculated in the manner described in the Introduction. It also shows for some of the important industries separately a similar distribution of wage earners as reported for December 15, or the nearest representative day. As a means of judging the importance of the several industries, the average number employed for the year is also given in each case.

For all industries combined, 83 per cent of the average number of wage earners were males 16 years of age and over; 15.3 per cent, females 16 years of age and over; and 1.7 per cent, persons under the age of 16 years. The largest proportions of female wage earners for the industries shown separately are in the printing and publishing, bakery, button, patent medicine, and tobacco industries. In the first three of these industries over one-fourth of the employees were females 16 years of age and over, and in the tobacco industry about two-fifths are of this class. Although the total number of wage earners is comparatively small in the patent-medicine industry, more than one-half of the employees were females 16 years of age and over.

Of the total number of wage earners who are under 16 years of age, 43.8 per cent were employed in the

bakery, button, printing and publishing, slaughtering and meat-packing, and tobacco industries combined. The last-named industry shows the highest proportion of wage earners under 16 years of age, 4 per cent, while slaughtering and meat packing shows the next highest proportion, 3 per cent.

Comparable figures are not obtainable for 1899. The table shows a greater percentage of increase in the salaried employees than in the other two classes.

The next table shows the average number of wage earners, distributed according to age periods, and in the case of those 16 years of age and over according to sex, for 1909, 1904, and 1899. The averages for 1909 are estimated on the basis of the actual number reported for a single representative day. (See Introduction.)

SUPPLEMENT FOR IOWA.

This table indicates that for all industries combined there has been practically no change in the proportion of male wage earners 16 years of age and over. In 1909 and 1904 they formed 83 per cent of all wage earners, as compared with 83.1 per cent in 1899. The proportion of female wage earners 16 years of age and over has shown greater variation, being 15.3 per cent of all wage earners in 1909, as compared with 14.8 per cent in 1904 and 12.9 per cent in 1899. There has been a decided decrease during the decade in the employment of children under 16 years of age.

Wage earners employed, by months.—The following table gives the number of wage earners employed on the 15th of each month during the year 1909, for all industries combined, for the brick and tile and can-

ning and preserving industries, and for all other industries combined; it gives also the percentage which the number reported for each month is of the greatest number reported for any month. In Table II, page 704, are shown, for practically all of the important industries in the state, the largest number and the smallest number of wage earners reported for any month. The figures are for the 15th day, or the nearest representative day, of the month.

Decidedly the greatest variation during the year is shown for the canning and preserving industry, the numbers employed varying from 217, or only 3.8 per cent of the maximum, in February, the month of least activity, to 5,642 in September, the month of greatest activity occasioned by the time of ripening of the raw material. Employment in the brick and tile industry fluctuates from 1,594 in January to 4,093 in June.

The number of wage earners employed in all industries combined was the smallest in January and increased steadily month by month, with the exception of a small decrease in July, until September, when the largest number was reported. There was a difference of 12,357 wage earners, or 18.2 per cent, between the numbers employed in the months of greatest and least activity.

Prevailing hours of labor.—In the next table wage earners have been classified according to hours of labor prevailing in the establishments in which they are employed. In making this classification the average number of wage earners employed during the year is used, and the number employed in each establishment is classified as a total, according to the hours prevailing in that establishment, even though a few employees work a greater or less number of hours.

It is evident from the figures that for slightly more than three-fourths of the wage earners employed in the manufacturing industries of Iowa the prevailing

hours of labor range from 54 to 60 a week, 14 per cent of the total being employed in establishments operating less than 54 hours per week, and only 9.5 per cent being employed in establishments operating more than 60 hours per week.

It will be noted that in most of the larger industries the greater part of the wage earners work 60 hours per week. The majority of the wage earners in the gas industry, however, work more than 60 hours per week, while the prevailing hours of labor in the tobacco manufacturing industry are for the most part less than 54 per week.

In 1909, 73 per cent of the total value of products was reported from cities having over 10,000 inhabitants, and 72.8 per cent of the average number of wage earners was employed in such cities. The figures indicate that while very little relative change has taken place during the last 10 years, yet on the whole the industries of the cities of over 10,000 have gained slightly on those of the districts outside during the last decade. The increase in the population of different cities has affected the grouping in the table. In 1900 Clinton and Waterloo were in the first group, but during the following decade the population of each increased so that both now fall in the second group. Prior to 1910 Boone, Iowa City, and Mason City each had less than 10,000 inhabitants, hence were included with the districts outside the cities in 1899.

The addition of Boone, Iowa City, and Mason City to the group of cities having 10,000 inhabitants or over in 1909 caused little proportionate change in the totals for such cities and for the remainder of the state. By deducting from the total for cities the total value of products, \$4,368,202, reported in 1909 for these three places, the remainder would represent 71.3 per cent instead of 73 per cent of the total for the state. The group comprising the cities having from 10,000 to 25,000 inhabitants shows a decline in its proportions of the various totals, as compared with 1899, while the group made up of cities having more than 25,000 inhabitants shows pronounced increases in these proportions, due in part to changes in the composition of the respective groups. A marked absolute increase was, however, returned in all items for the group of smaller cities. In 1909, of the total value of products reported for the state, 18.9 per cent was reported from the nine cities having from 10,000 to 25,000 inhabitants, and 54.1 per cent from the eight cities having more than 25,000 inhabitants.

The relative importance of each of the 17 cities having a population of 10,000 or over in 1910 is shown in the next table, in which the value of products and average number of wage earners are shown separately for 1909, 1904, and 1899.

With the exception of Fort Dodge and Boone, every city for which separate statistics are presented for both 1904 and 1909 shows an increase in value of products for the five-year period, and all excepting Dubuque, Clinton, Muscatine, and Marshalltown show increases from 1899 to 1904. The percentages of increase, however, are generally greater for the period 1904-1909. The greatest absolute and relative gains from 1904 to 1909 were made by Sioux City, which is the most important manufacturing center of the state. During the period named the value of products increased \$22,663,699, or 153.5 per cent. This increase was due largely to the development of slaughtering and meat packing, which is the leading industry of the city. The next largest absolute increase, \$8,544,570, is shown for Cedar Rapids, and was due principally to an increased production of meat and other food products. Council Bluffs ranks next to Sioux City in the percentage of increase, with 95.9. This large increase was not due to unusual gains in any particular industry. Des Moines, which ranks first in population, ranks only third as a manufacturing center. The most important industries are foundry and machine-shop products, patent medicines and compounds, printing and publishing, and slaughtering and meat packing. A number of new industries have been established since 1904. This city shows an increase from 1904 to 1909 of \$8,499,709, or 56.3 per cent, in value of products, and an increase of 1,228, or 29.6 per cent, in number of wage earners.

The manufacture of glucose and starch, foundry and machine-shop, and flour-mill and gristmill products are the leading industries in Davenport. Steam-railroad repair shops, the men's clothing, and the lumber and timber industries are the most important in Dubuque. Ottumwa is the second city of the state in slaughtering and meat packing. Waterloo leads in the production of agricultural implements and dairymen's, poulterers', and apiarists' supplies, while Muscatine leads in the production of buttons. The principal industries in the remaining cities shown in the above table were as

follows: Burlington, the steam-railroad repair shops, and foundries and machine shops; Clinton, the manufacture of glucose and starch and of lumber and timber products; Keokuk, reworking butter and the manufacture of glucose and starch and of patent medicines; Marshalltown and Mason City, slaughtering and meat packing; Fort Dodge, the manufacture of boots and shoes, food preparations, and wall plaster; Iowa City, printing and publishing, breweries, and leather gloves and mittens; and Boone, railroad repair shops.

Character of ownership.—The table that follows has for its purpose the presentation of conditions in respect to the character of ownership, or legal organization of manufacturing enterprises. For all industries combined comparative figures are given covering the censuses of 1909 and 1904. Comparative data for 1899 are not available. Figures for 1909 only are presented for several important industries individually. In order to avoid disclosing the operations of individual concerns it is necessary to omit several important industries from this table and the one following.

Little change is shown from 1904 to 1909 in the proportions of the total number of establishments under the several forms of ownership. Individual and corporate ownership each show a slight increase in their percentages of the total number of establishments, 1.3 and 2, respectively, while firm ownership and "Other" forms show decreases of 2.7 and six-tenths of 1 per cent, respectively.

For all industries combined, as measured by value of products and value added by manufacture, all forms of ownership show substantial absolute increases. The most noticeable feature of the table is the variation in the relative proportions of the different items reported for the respective forms of ownership. In 1909 establishments operated by corporations, although constituting only 23.8 per cent of the establishments engaged in all manufacturing industries, contributed 73 per cent of the total value of products, while individual ownership was credited with 49.5 per cent of the establishments and only 9.3 per cent of the total value of products.

The form of ownership prevailing in the different industries varied considerably. In all but four of the industries shown separately the most common form of ownership was the individual. The largest percentages of corporations are found in the agricultural implement, foundry and machine-shop, and slaughtering and meat-packing industries. In the butter, cheese, and condensed-milk industry the most common form of ownership was the cooperative, classed under "Other" form of ownership in the table. These are establishments operated largely by associations which organize for the purpose of securing a steadier and better market for their milk and cream.

Size of establishment.—The tendency for manufacturing to become concentrated in large establishments, or the reverse, is a matter of interest from the standpoint of industrial organization. In order to throw some light upon it the table on page 693 groups the establishments according to the value of their

products. The table also shows the average size of establishments for all industries combined and for important industries separately as measured by number of wage earners, value of products, and value added by manufacture. The totals for all industries are shown for the last two censuses, while for the individual industries figures are given for 1909 only.

This table shows that, in 1909, of the 5,528 establishments only 29, or five-tenths of 1 per cent, had a value of products exceeding \$1,000,000. These establishments, however, employed a combined average of 10,394 wage earners, or 16.9 per cent of the total number in all establishments, and reported 36.9 per cent of the total value of products and 20.9 per cent of the total value added by manufacture.

On the other hand, the very small establishments—that is, those having a value of products of less than \$5,000—constituted a considerable proportion (41.3 per cent) of the total number of establishments, but the value of their products amounted to only 2.1 per cent of the total. The great bulk of the manufacturing was reported by establishments having a product valued at not less than \$100,000. In 1909 these establishments reported 61.4 per cent of the total wage earners and 72 per cent of the total value of products.

It will be seen from the table that during the five years from 1904 to 1909 there was a considerable increase when measured by value of products in the relative importance of the largest establishments—those reporting products of not less than \$1,000,000 in value—and a decrease in that of all other classes.

The fact that the average value of products per establishment increased from \$33,557 to \$46,895 and the value added by manufacture from \$12,064 to \$16,015 can not be taken as in itself indicating a tendency toward concentration. The increased values shown may be, and probably are, due in part to the increase that has taken place in the price of commodities. The average number of wage earners per establishment shows an increase of only one.

SUPPLEMENT FOR IOWA.

In some respects, and especially from the standpoint of conditions under which persons engaged in manufactures work, the best classification of establishments to bring out the feature of size is a classification according to the number of wage earners employed.

Of the 5,528 establishments reported for all industries, 11.6 per cent employed no wage earners; 63.8 per cent, from 1 to 5; 14.7 per cent, 6 to 20; 5.7 per cent, 21 to 50; and 4.2 per cent, more than 50. The most numerous single group consists of the 3,525 establishments employing from 1 to 5 wage earners,

and the next of the 815 establishments employing from 6 to 20 wage earners. There were 102 establishments that employed over 100 wage earners; 34 employed over 250; 9 employed over 500; and only 1, which was a slaughtering and meat-packing establishment, employed over 1,000.

Of the total number of wage earners, 42.4 per cent were in establishments employing over 100 wage earners. The two groups having the largest number of employees were those comprising the establishments employing from 21 to 50 wage earners and from 101 to 250, each of which employed 10,228 wage earners, or 16.6 per cent of the total. The individual industries listed in this table, but not in the preceding one, namely, the steam-railroad repair shops, breweries, the patent medicine industry, and tobacco manufactures are all industries in which comparatively large establishments do most of the business, as appears from the classification according to the number of wage earners.

Expenses.—As stated in the Introduction, the census does not purport to furnish figures that can be used for determining the cost of manufacture and profits. Facts of interest can, however, be brought out concerning the relative importance of the different classes of expenses which make up the total.

The next table shows, for 1909, in percentages, the distribution of expenses among the classes indicated for all industries combined and for certain important industries separately. The figures on which the percentages are based appear in Table II.

This table shows that, for all industries combined, 73.2 per cent of the total expenses were incurred for materials, 18.6 per cent for services—that is, salaries and wages—and but 8.2 per cent for other purposes. As would be expected, these proportions vary greatly in the different industries. The high percentage for materials shown for all industries combined is caused mainly by three important industries, namely, slaughtering and meat packing; the butter, cheese, and condensed-milk industry; and the flour-mill and gristmill industry, for which the proportions were 92.3 per cent, 91.9 per cent, and 91.7 per cent, respectively. The expenses for services, however, were but 4.9 per cent of the total for the slaughtering and meat-packing and the butter, cheese, and condensed-milk industries, and 4.7 per cent for the flour-mill and gristmill industry.

The large proportion shown for miscellaneous expenses for the malt-liquor industry is due to the inclusion of internal-revenue tax, and that for the patent-medicine industry is because of the large expenses for advertising.

The table indicates that from 1904 to 1909 there was an increase of 37,319 horsepower, or 31.6 per cent, in the total primary power used in manufactures, while from 1899 to 1904 the increase was only 11,401 horsepower, or 10.7 per cent. Of the total increase from 1904 to 1909 in power used, 21,464 horsepower, or 57.5 per cent, was in power generated by steam engines, and 13,356 horsepower, or 35.8 per cent, in rented electric power. Water power decreased from 7,315 horsepower in 1899 to 6,531 in 1904 and 6,411 in 1909. The classes of power, both owned and rented, included under the head of "Other" show a decrease from 1904 to 1909. Steam is still the predominant power, although it furnished but 78.4 per cent of the total horsepower in 1909, as compared with 85.1 per cent in 1904 and 85.5 per cent in 1899. The more general use of gas engines is shown, there being 1,336 such engines, with a total of 8,025 horsepower, reported in 1909, as against 922 engines, with 4,486 horsepower, in 1904. The figures also show that the practice of renting electric power is on the increase, 11.9 per cent of the total primary power being of this character in 1909, compared with but 4.3 per cent in 1904 and only 2.4 per cent in 1899. The use of electric motors for the purpose of applying the power generated within the establishments is also shown to be increasing, the horsepower of such motors having increased from 3,556 in 1904 to 22,273 in 1909.

Fuel.—Closely related to the question of kind of power employed is that of the fuel consumed in generating this power, or otherwise used as material in the manufacturing processes. The following table shows the quantity of each kind of fuel used in 1909, by totals for all industries, and for certain selected industries:

For certain industries the Census Bureau collects, by means of special schedules, details regarding the quantity and value of materials and products which do not appear on the general schedule. Certain data of this character for five important industries in Iowa are here presented.

Slaughtering and meat packing.—The number and cost of animals slaughtered, by kind, together with the cost of fuel and rent of power and the cost of all other materials, and the kinds, quantities, and values of products, as reported at the censuses of 1909, 1904, and 1899, are shown in the following table:

The number of all animals slaughtered increased from 2,018,521 in 1899 to 2,183,654 in 1904 and 2,810,086 in 1909, representing a gain of 165,133, or 8.2 per cent, from 1899 to 1904, and a gain of 626,432, or 28.7 per cent, from 1904 to 1909. The table indicates that the total number and total cost of each of

the four classes of animals increased from 1904 to 1909, and, with the exception of sheep, this is true of the period from 1899 to 1904. Hogs represented 88.5 per cent of the total number and 76.7 per cent of the total cost of the animals slaughtered in 1909, and beeves only 9 per cent of the total number and 22.4 per cent of the total cost.

Each of the products in the above table shows an increase in quantity and value from 1904 to 1909, with the single exception of the products included in the total for all other fresh meat. From 1899 to 1904, however, the quantities of salted and cured beef and of lard, and the quantity and value of fresh mutton, and the amount received for contract work decreased. In 1909 all meats, both fresh and cured, were valued at \$45,938,256, which constituted 77.8 per cent of the total value of products for the industry. The value of this group of products was \$23,720,582 in 1904 and \$20,685,108 in 1899, representing 78.7 per cent and 80.3 per cent, respectively, of the totals for the industry at the two censuses. It is noteworthy that the output of lard from 1904 to 1909 increased 8.8 per cent, whereas its value increased 71.8 per cent.

Butter, cheese, and condensed milk.—The quantity of milk used in this industry decreased from 1,586,044,620 pounds in 1899 to 994,925,394 pounds in 1904 and 474,821,988 pounds in 1909, whereas the quantity of cream increased as regularly from 45,621,241 pounds in 1899 to 110,850,356 pounds in 1904 and 243,619,568 pounds in 1909. This condition is due to the radical change which has taken place in the industry during the last decade. Formerly whole milk was brought to the creamery, while at present the cream is usually separated before leaving the farm.

1904 and three in 1909. The combined output of the three factories in 1909 was important, but can not be presented separately in the above table without disclosing the operations of individual establishments, and the value therefore is included in the total for all other products.

The value of solid packed butter represented 80.5 per cent of the total value of products in 1909, 88 per cent in 1904, and 91.1 per cent in 1899. The quantity and value of cheese manufactured show a decrease from census to census, while cream showed a decrease in both respects from 1904 to 1909.

The main part of the product of this industry was white wheat flour, the value of which constituted 60.7 per cent of the total value of products for the industry in 1909, as against 68.2 per cent in 1904 and 69.3 per cent in 1899. The quantity of this class of products has decreased constantly since 1899, whereas the value increased \$613,921 from 1899 to 1904, but decreased \$432,131 from 1904 to 1909. With the exception of Graham flour and feed, each of the different varieties of products decreased in quantity from 1904 to 1909, while the only decreases in value of products were shown for white flour, rye flour, buckwheat flour, and offal.

Printing and publishing.—The progress of the newspaper and periodical branch of the printing and publishing industry during the last decade is indicated in the next statement, which shows the number and aggregate circulation per issue of the different classes of publications for the years 1909, 1904, and 1899.

From 1899 to 1909 the aggregate circulation per issue for all publications combined more than doubled, while there was a decrease of 80 in the number of publications. With the exception of the weeklies and semiweeklies and triweeklies, each of the several classes of publications increased in number and in circulation between 1904 and 1909. In 1909, 15 of the 68 daily papers, with an aggregate circulation of 110,794, were morning editions. All the publications were in the English language, except 2 dailies, which were in German; 8 semiweeklies, 5 of which were in German, 1 in Norwegian, 1 in Dutch, and 1 in Bohemian; 42 weeklies, 1 of which was in Bohemian, 3 in Danish, 2 in Dutch, 30 in German, 1 in German and English, 3 in Norwegian, and 2 in Swedish; 6 monthlies, 1 of which was in Dutch, 3 in German, 1 in Norwegian, and 1 in Swedish; and 1 included under the head of "All other classes," which was in German.

Agricultural implements.—Although tenth among the industries shown separately for this state, when measured by value of products, this class of manufacture is of considerable interest, owing to the importance of the state in agriculture. The next table gives in detail, by groups, the value of products manufactured during 1909 and 1904 and the total value of products for 1899.

The products included in the total for "All other products" represent more than half of the total value, including thousands of small implements, such as hoes and rakes.

CHAPTER 5.

MINES AND QUARRIES.

Introduction.—The present chapter contains a complete statement of the statistics of all mining industries, which include all mines and quarries, in the state of Iowa for the year 1909, as shown by the Thirteenth Census.

A brief explanation of the scope of the census of mining industries and of the terms used, in so far as the usage differs from that followed in the census of manufactures, is presented below in order to prevent any misinterpretation of the statistics.

The explanations here given show the usage of the mining census generally, though some of the special rules have obviously no relation to particular states in which the industries referred to do not exist.

Scope of census.—The Thirteenth Census covered all classes of mines, quarries, and petroleum and gas wells that were in operation during any portion of the year 1909, both those which were producing and those whose operations were confined to development work. Mines, quarries, or wells that were idle during the entire year 1909 were omitted from the canvass. The following operations were likewise omitted from the canvass: Prospecting; the digging or dredging of sand and gravel for the construction of roads and for building operations; the production of mineral waters; and the operation of small bituminous coal banks producing less than 1,000 tons annually. Where the mineral products are not marketed in their crude condition, but are dressed or washed at the mine or quarry, the statistics of mining cover the entire work of obtaining the crude material and its preparation for the market.

Period covered.—The returns cover the calendar year 1909, or the business year which corresponds most nearly to that calendar year. The statistics cover a year's operations, except for enterprises which began or discontinued business during the year.

Number of operators.—As a rule, the unit of enumeration was the "operator." Every individual, firm, or corporation was required to furnish one report for all mines, quarries, or wells which were operated under the same management or for which one set of books of account was kept. Separate reports were obtained for all properties operated in different states, even where they were owned by the same operator. Likewise, where the operations of one individual, firm, or corporation covered more than one class of mines and quarries, such as coal, iron, limestone, etc., a separate report was received for each industry.

Number of mines, quarries, and wells.—This figure represents the total number of mines and quarries in operation or in the course of development at any time during the calendar year 1909, or the business year that corresponds most nearly to that calendar year, and the number of completed petroleum and natural gas wells in operation on December 31, 1909.

In most mining and quarrying industries the number of mines or quarries varies but little from the number of operators.

Expenses of operation and development.—A certain amount of development work is incidental to the operation of every mine. The expenses reported for producing mines include the cost both of operation and of development work which was done in connection with operation.

Wages.—The amount shown as wages includes only the compensation of regular wage earners hired by the day, week, or month, or under the piecework system.

Supplies and materials.—This item includes the cost of lumber and timber used for repairs, mine supports, track ties, etc.; iron and steel for blacksmithing; rails, frogs, sleepers, etc., for tracks and repairs; renewals of tools and machinery and materials for repairs; and supplies, explosives, oil, etc., as well as the cost of fuel and the rent of power. The schedule called only for the cost of such supplies and materials as had been used during the year covered by the report. Accurate figures, however, could be furnished only in those cases where the operators kept an account of supplies and materials used, or had an inventory made of all in stock at the beginning and at the end of the year. Such a system of accounting is far from general among mine operators, and there is reason to believe that in many cases the reported cost of supplies and materials covered all purchased during the year rather than those used during the year. The crude product of some operators was purchased by others for further dressing or refining; the cost of such materials is shown separately in the general table.

Capital.—The census schedule required every operator to state the total amount of capital invested in the enterprise on the last day of the business year reported, as shown by his books. There is, however, a great diversity in the methods of bookkeeping in use by different operators. As a result, the statistics for capital lack uniformity. Some of the figures reported apparently represent capital stock at face value; others include large investments in mineral lands which are not at present being actively mined, but are held in reserve; still others may include expenditures for unproductive mining ventures in no way related to the operations carried on during the census year.

Persons engaged in mining industries.—The statistics of the number of operators and officials, clerks, and wage earners, are based on the returns for December 15, or the nearest representative day. The reported number of wage earners includes overseers and foremen performing work similar to that of the men over whom they have charge; those whose duties are wholly supervisory are classed as superintendents and managers. Because of the common practice of shutting down mines at frequent intervals, it is impossible to ascertain with any satisfactory degree of accuracy the average number of employees—that is, the number who, if continuously employed, would be required to produce the actual output of the year.

Value of products.—Statistics of the value of mineral products were obtained by the Bureau of the Census in cooperation with the United States Geological Survey, but the two bureaus follow different methods in presenting these statistics. The Geological Survey shows separately the value of each mineral product, whereas the Bureau of the Census presents the value of products of each mining industry. The value of products given for a mining industry often includes the value of some products not covered by the industry designation. The crude product of metalliferous mines may include varying combinations of metals, such as gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc, and iron. Similarly, the total value of all products of the granite quarries is not identical with the value of the total output of granite, but may include the value of some marble or other stone quarried in connection with the principal product.

The value of products for 1909 in most cases represents the value of the products marketed during that year, not the value of those mined during that year.

SUPPLEMENT FOR IOWA.

MINING IN IOWA.

Summary.—Statistics for all mining enterprises in the state of Iowa are presented in Table 7, which gives statistics for all industries combined and for producing enterprises separately in all cases where the statistics could be given without disclosing the operations of an individual enterprise. Statistics for nonproducing enterprises are also given separately from producing enterprises.

The total value of the products of the producing mining industries in Iowa in 1909 amounted to \$13,877,781, and the total number of persons employed was 19,904. Of these totals the coal mining industry reported \$12,682,106, or 91.4 per cent of the value of the products, and employed 18,332, or 92.1 per cent of the employees. Gypsum mining and limestone quarrying, the industries next in importance, reported products valued, respectively, at \$669,731 and \$499,665.

In the bituminous coal industry as a whole the expenses of operation and development exceeded the value of the products, a result which indicates either that certain enterprises were operated at a loss, or that a considerable sum was expended for development work which added to the permanent value of the mining properties.

Character of organization.—Table 1 classifies the producing mining operations of the state under form of organization, distinguishing corporations from individual owners and firms, while Table 2 gives further details for incorporated enterprises distinguished from those which are unincorporated. Out of a total of 373 operators, 118, or 31.6 per cent, were corporations. These corporations reported 88.6 per cent of the total value of products and employed 85.6 per cent of all wage earners.

Size of enterprises.—In Table 3 the producing mining enterprises of the state are classified according to the number of wage earners employed per enterprise or operating unit. Of the 387 enterprises reported, 124 employed less than 5 wage earners each and 2 were operated exclusively by contract work. Nearly one-fourth of all the wage earners in the mining industry were employed in the 6 bituminous coal enterprises employing over 500 wage earners each.

Pervailing hours of labor.—In Table 4 all producing mines and quarries, except those employing no wage earners and those operating exclusively by contract work, have been classified according to the prevailing hours of labor per day in each enterprise or operating unit. The table shows the percentage of the total

number of enterprises falling in each group, and also a per cent distribution in which each enterprise has been given a weight according to the total number of wage earners employed December 15, 1909, or the nearest representative day. It should be borne in mind that this latter distribution does not show the exact proportion of the total number of wage earners working the specified number of hours per day, since, in some cases, a part of the employees worked a greater or less number of hours than those generally prevailing in the enterprise. In the bituminous coal mining enterprises, which employed 92.7 per cent of the wage earners in all enterprises, the 8-hour day prevailed in practically all mines.

Engines and power.—As shown by Table 5 the total primary horsepower employed in producing enterprises was 23,453, of which 23,160 horsepower was developed by engines and water wheels owned by the enterprise using them and 293 by electric motors operated by purchased current.

Comparison of mining industries: 1902-1909.—In order to make comparisons between 1909 and 1902, it is necessary to omit from the 1902 figures, as given in the mines and quarries report for that year, statistics for enterprises operated by governmental institutions; to omit from the 1909 figures, as they appear in other tables in this chapter, the value of by-products of coal mines; and to add to the 1909 statistics figures for the production of lime, which were omitted from the census of mines and quarries in 1909. Such items as are comparable for the two years are presented in Table 6.

The principal increase in the value of products was in the bituminous coal industry, which reported products in 1902 and 1909 valued, respectively, at \$8,660,287 and \$12,682,106. This represents an increase of \$4,021,819, or 46.4 per cent.

Duplication between manufactures and mining.—In the gypsum industry some of the mining operators subjected the mineral product obtained to certain manufacturing processes on the premises before marketing. These enterprises have been included in the statistics both for manufactures and for mining. As a result of this fact the combined value of products for manufacturing and mining industries in Iowa involves a duplication of \$669,734.
