CHAPTER III.—COLOR OR RACE, NATIVITY, AND PARENTAGE OF OCCUPIED PERSONS.

INTRODUCTION.

Statistics relative to the color or race, nativity, and parentage of the gainfully occupied population of continental United States, as returned at the Fourteenth Census, are presented in this chapter, with comparative statistics for the preceding census.1 The statistics are presented for the United States (Tables 1 to 5), for divisions and states (Tables 6 to 10), and for principal cities (Tables 11 to 14).

In the tabulation of the Fourteenth Census (1920) occupation returns, all gainful workers were distributed by color or race, nativity, and parentage into the following eight classes: Native whites of native parentage, native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, foreign-born whites, Negroes, Indians, Chinese, Japanese, and "all others." 2

Since in many of the states and in many of the cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more the number of gainfully occupied Indians, Chinese, Japanese, and persons of other minor population classes is small, Tables 7 and 8, for states, and Tables 11 and 12, for cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more, have been limited to statistics relating to the principal four classes of the population, namely, native whites of native parentage, native whites of foreign or mixed parentage, foreign-born whites, and Negroes. In Table 9 for states, however, statistics are given for Indians, Chinese, Japanese, and "all other" combined; while

There were very important changes between 1910 and 1920 in the proportion of persons 10 years of age and over in the respective population classes returned by the census enumerators as engaged in gainful occupations (see Tables 1 and 2). Together, these changes resulted in a marked decrease during the decade in the proportion of all persons of each sex 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations. Because of the very large proportion native white males of native parentage 10 years of age and over formed of all males 10 years of age and over (see Table 1), the decrease from 1910 to 1920 in the proportion of them gainfully occupied (see Table 2) plainly was the principal factor in the decrease during the same period in the proportion of all males 10 years of age and over gainfully occupied. And the decrease between 1910 and 1920 in the proportion of all females 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations resulted in large measure from the very large decrease in the proportion of Negro females 10 years of age and over gainfully occupied.8

in Table 10 for states, and in Table 13 for cities of 100,000 inhabitants or more, statistics are given for each of the eight population classes into which the gainful workers were distributed at the Fourteenth Census. In Table 14, which gives the statistics for cities of 25,000 and under 100,000 inhabitants, only seven of these eight population classes are shown-Indians, usually few in number in cities, being combined with "all others."

Occupation statistics for Alaska, Hawaii, and Porto Rico, first published as separate bulletins, are reprinted as Chapter VIII of

CHAPTER IV.—AGE OF OCCUPIED PERSONS.

INTRODUCTION.

This chapter presents statistics relating to the age of persons engaged in gainful occupations in continental United States, as returned at the Fourteenth Census, with comparative statistics for preceding censuses. Tables 1 to 14 present the statistics for the United States, Tables 15 to 18, for divisions and states, and Tables 19 to 23, for the principal cities.

In the tabulation of occupations at the Fourteenth Census—except in the special tabulation relating to the marital condition of gainfully occupied women—all gainful workers were distributed into 11 age periods, as follows: 10 to 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, 20 to 24, 25 to 44, 45 to 64, 65 years and over, and age unknown. At the Thirteenth Census, all gainful workers were distributed into 9 age periods: 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16 to 20, 21 to 44 and unknown, and 45 years and over. Because of the differences in certain age periods at the two censuses, exact comparison of age statistics is impossible in these cases.

In Table 18 for states, and Table 22 for cities, only six of these age periods are shown—the five periods covering ages 10 to 17 years being combined, and "age unknown" being joined with the period "25 to 44 years." Since in the entire United States, in 1920, gainful workers of unknown age constituted, in the case of each sex, only two-tenths of 1 per cent of all gainful workers (see Table 1), the omission in Tables 18 and 22 of "age unknown" as a separate age period is of slight importance. Also, since males 25 to 44 years of age were 47.1 per cent of all gainfully occu-

pied males, and since females 25 to 44 years of age were 40 per cent of all gainfully occupied females (see Table 1), the inclusion of "age unknown" with the period "25 to 44 years" evidently did not affect perceptibly the statistics for this period. In fact, probably a large proportion of the gainfully occupied persons returned as of unknown age were from 25 to 44 years of age.

While the age periods covering ages 16 to 44 years differ somewhat at the two censuses—1910 and 1920—they are sufficiently alike to indicate strongly that were they the same the proportion of persons of each sex in each respective age period engaged in gainful occupations would not differ greatly at the two censuses (see Table 2). In the case of the age periods 10 to 13 years, and 14 and 15 years, however, there was a striking decrease in the proportion of children engaged in gainful occupations. The statistics show that one-half of the decrease in the proportion of the population 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations resulted from the decrease in proportion for ages 10 to 15 years.

Nearly two-thirds of the decrease from 1910 to 1920 in the proportion of all males 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations is accounted for by the decrease in proportion for ages 10 to 15 years. The decrease in the proportion of all females 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations is, however, accounted for considerably more by the decrease in proportion for ages 16 years and over, including age unknown, than by the decrease in proportion for ages 10 to 15 years.²
