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CHAPTER VIII.—OCCUPATION STATISTICS FOR ALASKA, HAWAII, AND PORTO RICO.

INTRODUCTION.

This chapter presents statistics relative to the occupations of persons in Alaska, Hawaii, and Porto Rico, respectively, as returned at the Fourteenth Census, with comparative statistics for preceding censuses. The statistics are presented for Alaska in Tables 1 to 12, for Hawaii in Tables 13 to 25, and for Porto Rico in Tables 26 to 41.

Because of the comparatively small number of industries and of gainful workers in Alaska, and because of the small number of industries in Hawaii and in Porto Rico, and the special characteristics of some of these industries, the occupation classification followed in the detailed tables presented for these areas, respectively, is much shorter than, and in some respects is different from, the classification followed in the detailed tables presented in this report for the respective states of continental United States.

In the case of Hawaii, separate occupation statistics are presented for a number of population classes—because prominent there—for which separate statistics are not shown in the case of Alaska, Porto Rico, or the respective areas of continental United States.

Tables 11 and 12 for Alaska, 22 to 25 for Hawaii, and 36 to 41 for Porto Rico are limited to selected occupations. The occupations selected for presentation in these tables, respectively, are those occupations shown in Table 10 for Alaska, Table 21 for Hawaii and its principal cities, and Tables 34 and 35 for Porto Rico and its principal cities, which are most important for the sex and area to which the figures relate.

The marked decrease from 1910 to 1920 in the number of persons engaged in gainful occupations in

Alaska (Table 1) was common to each general division of occupations except agriculture, forestry, and animal husbandry (Table 2) and is accounted for mainly by the decrease in the total population.

The marked decrease in the proportion of the population of Hawaii 10 years of age and over engaged in gainful occupations (Table 1) may have been due to the change of the census date from a very busy farming season in 1910 (April 15) to a less busy farming season in 1920 (January 1). This is suggested by the material decrease in the proportion of all workers engaged in agriculture, forestry, and animal husbandry (Table 13). The great increase in the proportion of male workers engaged in public service is explained mainly by the increase, from 1,608 in 1910 to 4,366 in 1920, in soldiers, sailors, and marines. The marked increase from 1910 to 1920 in the number of persons of "all other" races engaged in gainful occupations (Table 15) was due principally to the great increase in Filipino workers, who formed about five-sixths of the "all other" total in 1920.

The large population increase in Porto Rico from 1910 to 1920 (Table 1) was not followed by a proportionate increase in gainful workers, though there was a numerical increase in each general division of occupations except domestic and personal service, which group decreased by 15,336 (Table 26). On the other hand, a much larger number of persons were engaged in manufacturing and mechanical industries in 1920 than in 1910.
