#### CHAPTER III.—PERSONNEL

#### INTRODUCTION

The total number of persons engaged in manufactures was 1.4 per cent smaller in 1929 than in 1919, if figures for the total personnel of industry as shown in General Summary, Table 3, are made comparable with those for 1919 by the addition of data for the salaried employees of central-administrative offices. (See same table, footnote 1.) Wage earners alone, who in 1929 constituted 85.6 per cent of the total number of persons engaged, decreased 1.8 per cent during the same period. Managerial and clerical staffs, on the other hand, increased about 9 per cent, a trend consistent with the increase in the number and importance of the central-office groups of establishments, which normally require considerable centralized administrative attention.

With reduced personnel, industries nevertheless turned out a 38 per cent larger physical volume of goods in 1929 than in 1919. The reason was to be found in greater plant mechanization and in the more economical administration of both human and material production facilities. The new machinery installed in manufacturing establishments not only was considerable in amount but, in general, was more nearly automatic in operation than was that which it replaced. Following the war-time emphasis on production rather than cost, management, impelled by the increasing pressure of competition, resorted to numerous managerial devices for effecting greater efficiency in the utilization of materials and processes. The indexes for "Production per wage earner" (General Summary, Table 2), which reflect roughly changes both in mechanization and in administration, indicate that productivity per wage earner increased 40 per cent between 1919 and 1929.

Some indication of the increase in power-driven mechanical equipment at the disposal of factory operatives is afforded by the relative numbers for "Horse-power per 100 wage earners" (General Summary, Table 2), which increased from 326 to 486 during the decade.

The statistics for industrial personnel, by sex (Table 1), show very little change between 1919 and 1929 in the proportions of male and female workers in industry.

A small increase in the percentage of females employed in 1929 is too slight to indicate a general tendency to replace male by female factory operatives, although in isolated instances such substitutions may have been made.

The statistics on wage-earner employment, by months (Table 3), afford a means of observing seasonal, cyclical, and secular fluctuations in employment levels. Reasonable continuity of factory operation over the 12 months of the year, generally recognized as a social and economic desideratum, is indicated by the figures for "Per cent minimum is of maximum" which approach nearest to 100. The notable attempt to regularize production by the laterial integration of products by part or all of the establishments in certain industries in which some irregularity of operation had grown to seem inevitable was a step toward a more stable and satisfactory employment situation. Nevertheless, the figures for "All industries" (Table 3) indicate that the fluctuation of the wage-earner-employment level in 1929 (90.8 to 100) exceeded that of 1925 (93.7 to 100). In 4 of the 5 years for which figures are given in the table either December or January was the month of minimum employment. For the 16 major groups of industries, the figures indicate that the greatest regularity of employment in 1929 was in "Printing, publishing, and allied industries" (97.2 per cent) and "Railroad repair shops" (96.8 per cent), and that "Food and allied products" and "Transportation equipment" were least successful in eveningout employment through the year 1929. In four Southern States—Alabama, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Georgia—the percentage which the minimum number of wage earners for the year was of the maximum did not drop below 95.6. All generalizations concerning employment stability, however, should be made in the light of the general or particular industrial conditions existing at the time.

The changes from 1919 to 1929 in the prevailing hours of labor are seen by the table following to have been considerably less radical than were those which took place during the 5-year interval from 1914 to 1919:

These figures show a striking reduction during the 5-year period from 1914 to 1919 and a much less pronounced decrease during the following 10-year period in the percentage of wage earners employed 54 hours or more per week. It will be noted, however, that the proportion employed 48 hours or under per week after quadrupling between 1914 and 1919, decreased slightly during the following decade.

The wage and salary compensation received by industrial personnel amounted in 1929 to 22.5 per cent of the gross value of products manufactured, or, on a more equitable basis of comparison, to 33.5 per cent of the net value, excluding duplication. (General Summary, Tables 3 and 7.)
