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

### POPULATION—AMERICAN SAMOA

#### NUMBER AND DISTRIBUTION OF INHABITANTS

Total population.—The islands of American Samoa were taken over by the United States in 1900. An Executive order, dated February 19, 1900, placed the Samoan group of islands under the control of the Department of the Navy for a naval station. In conformity with the act of Congress providing for the Fifteenth Census, the census of American Samoa was taken under the supervision of the governor of Samoa in accordance with plans prescribed or approved by the Director of the Census. The population on April 1, 1930, according to the Fifteenth Census, was

10,055, which represents an increase of 1.999, or 24.8 per cent, as compared with the population on January 1, 1920. The total area of the group of islands comprising American Samoa is 76 square miles. The average number of inhabitants per square mile in 1930 was 132.3 as compared with 106 in 1920.

Table 1 shows the population of American Samoa at the Federal census of April 1, 1930, the Federal census January 1, 1920, and the local censuses of 1912 and 1900, together with the increase between censuses.

Minor civil divisions.—For administrative purposes American Samoa is divided into Manua District, Eastern District of Tutuila, Western District of Tutuila, and Swains Island. The administrative

districts are divided into 14 counties. The population of the counties is reported by villages. Swains Island was annexed in 1925.

#### COMPOSITION AND CHARACTERISTICS OF THE POPULATION

Introduction.—This section presents the complete statistics for the population of American Samoa classified by sex, color or race, age, marital condition, etc. These detailed statistics are given in some form for all the areas shown in the preceding tables except for the villages. The first Federal census of American Samoa having been taken in 1920, there are no comparable figures available for any years prior to 1920 except for the total population as given in Table 1.

In Table 1 the population is given by the administrative districts from 1900 to 1930, together with the number and per cent of increase in each census period. The population of Swains Island is given for 1930.

Color or race, nativity, and sex.—In Table 2 are presented the population statistics for American Samoa classified by color or race, nativity, and sex for 1930, and by color and sex for 1920. The divisions of the population by color orrace are: (1) Polynesians, the native race of Samoa; (2) mixed, those of a mixture of Polynesian and any other race; (3) white; and (4) other colored, which includes Chinese, Japanese, Filipinos, and Negroes. Statistics of the population classified by color or race and sex are presented by districts in Table 9. The white population for 1930 (227) as given in Table 2 includes the naval personnel (178) stationed in American Samoa; whereas the white population for 1920 (41) is exclusive of the naval personnel.

Of the 8,987 persons of native birth reported at the census of 1930, 8,040, or 89.5 per cent, were Polynesians, and all but 6 of these were born in American Samoa. Of the native-born white population, 188 were born in continental United States, 1 in Guam, 1 in Porto Rico, and 3 in American Samoa.

In 1930 the Polynesians constituted 83 per cent of the foreign-born population of American Samoa. All of these Polynesians as well as all of the 135 foreignborn persons of mixed race were born in the Pacific Islands other than American Samoa. Of the foreignborn white population, 21 were of European and 7 of Canadian birth.

Age.—By reason of the outstanding importance of the age classification of the population at the present time, the 1930 age statistics are presented in considerable detail in Table 3. In this table the age classification is presented not only for the total population but also for the principal race classifications (Polynesian, mixed, white, and other colored), by sex.

Similar statistics are presented in Table 8 by districts. Comparative figures for 1920 are given in Table 3 for those groups for which available.

School attendance. In American Samoa school attendance does not signify all that it does in most American communities. The Regulations and Orders for the Government of American Samoa as amended in 1926 require every child over 6 years of age who has not passed the examination prescribed for the completion of the fourth grade in the primary schools to attend up to and including the fourth grade. Under this law or rule it is possible for a child to enter school at the age of 6, and if a grade is passed each year the child will have fulfilled the requirements of the school laws at approximately 11 years of age. There is no provision for higher education in American Samoa; at the present time the public school system extends only through the eighth grade. The school-attendance tabulation is based on the replies to the enumerator's inquiry as to whether the person had attended school or college of any kind since September 1, 1929. The totals for 1930 and 1920 for all population classes, and the races for 1930 separated into significant age periods, are presented in Table 4. School attendance is shown by districts in Table 9.

Illiteracy.—The census defines as illiterate any person 10 years of age or over who is unable to read and write. The classification is based on the answers given to the enumerator in response to the question "Whether able to read and write." No specific test of ability to read and write was prescribed, but the enumerators were instructed not to return the answer "Yes" (which would classify the person as literate) simply because a person was able to write his or her The comparison of illiteracy in American Samoa in 1930 with 1920 for the races and for age groups is not possible for the reason that data concerning illiteracy were not shown for the races in 1920, nor were the age groups in 1920 the same as in 1930. The statistics of illiteracy are presented for the group of islands in Table 5, and for the districts in Table 9.

Marital condition.—The classification as to marital condition—whether single, married, widowed, or divorced—is presented for the population 15 years of age and over by sex and color in Table 6, and in Table 9 for districts.

Ability to speak English.—In 1930 a total of 1,565 males and 890 females, or 35.6 per cent of the population 10 years of age and over, reported that they could speak English. Of this total, 1,159 males and 680 females were reported as Polynesians. In 1920 the total number of Polynesians reported as able to speak English was only 591, or 7.6 per cent of the total Polynesian population and 12.3 per cent of the Polynesian population 15 years of age and over. This large increase in number of persons able to speak English is not surprising for the reason that English is now taught in all the public schools in American Samoa, the Samoan language being used only in the schools of the missionaries.

Gainful workers in specified occupations.-No discussion of the occupations of the population of American Samoa would be intelligible unless preceded by a brief description of the Samoan family. At the head of each social group known as a family is a matai. The word "matai" may be freely translated as "master." The matai is the ruler of his family (aiga) and directs its economic and political activities. A Samoan family may consist of the matai and his wife and children, his other relatives, adopted children, and servants. These families vary greatly in size. As many as 50 persons may be members of a Samoan family. In rare instances a matai may be the only surviving member of his family. Each normal Samoan family is a self-sustaining economic group, the members of which, including the matai, contribute the products of their labor to the family fund.

In Table 7 is shown the population 10 years old and over engaged in gainful occupations. The fig-

ures are presented for males and females and also for the Polynesians, mixed, white, and other colored workers, the latter including Japanese, Chinese, Negroes, etc.

Persons engaged in gainful occupations in American Samoa increased from 1,420 in 1920 to 2,855 in 1930, representing an increase of 101.1 per cent. This large difference is doubtless due to a better understanding of the census instructions by the enumerators in 1930 rather than to an actual increase in number of occupied persons.

In 1930, 130 Polynesians and 1 person of mixed blood were returned as matais. This number, however, does not represent the total number of matais in American Samoa for the reason that where the head of a family, or matai, was reported on the census schedules as having a specified occupation, such as farmer or carpenter, this specified occupation was reported rather than "matai."

If officers and enlisted men in the Navy were reported as having a specific occupation such as dentist, electrician, chauffeur, etc., they have been classified according to their naval service, officers being shown under "officials and inspectors" and the enlisted men under "soldiers, sailors, and marines." However, if dentists, electricians, chauffeurs, etc., were reported without reference to naval service they have been classified under the specific occupation given.

Persons engaged in gainful occupations in each of the three districts and Swains Island were as follows: 562 in Manua District, 1,445 in the Eastern District of Tutuila, 794 in the Western District of Tutuila, and 54 on Swains Island.

## AGRICULTURE—AMERICAN SAMOA

### NUMBER OF FARMS, ACREAGE, PRODUCTION, AND LIVESTOCK

Census dates.—The census of 1930 relates to April 1 of that year and the crop year 1929. The census of 1920 relates to January 1 of that year.

Farm.—A "farm," for census purposes, is all the land which is directly farmed by one person, either by his own labor alone or with the assistance of members of his household or hired employees. The farm may be operated by the owner, managed for the owner, or rented from an owner, and may produce field crops, fruits, and nuts, as well as livestock.

Products.—The farms, or plantations, of Samoa produce principally coconuts, breadfruit, bananas, and taro. Sometimes a plantation is devoted to only one product, sometimes a section is given over to each kind of product, and in other instances there seems to be an indiscriminate cultivation of the several varieties.

The coconut is the most important product of the soil of Samoa. A law requires each taxpayer to plant at least 30 nuts a year, if he has the land. It grows anywhere it is planted—by the sea, on plateaus, slopes, or even on mountain ridges. The dried kernel of the ripe coconut, called copra, is the principal commercial product of and the only export from American Samoa. It is marketed in San Francisco, Sydney, London, Hamburg, and Marseilles, and the marketing is done for the natives by the American Government. The oil of the copra is in great demand for manufacturing coconut butters, soaps, and salad oil.

Table 10 shows the amount of copra produced in each district in 1929 and 1919.

Samoan fruits, comprising the orange, grapefruit, lemon, lime, citron, mango, alligator pear, papaya, pineapple, and banana, are grown for home consumption but not for outside market.

Tables 11 and 12 furnish the number of trees and the amount of production of fruits and nuts in 1929.

The chief vegetables grown in Samoa are breadfruit, taro, and vams. The banana is also used as a vegetable. Breadfruit is one of the principal foods and needs to be planted only rarely. The taro is a succulent plant with edible starchy, tuberous rootstock. The yam grows to a larger size than taro, is more difficult to cultivate, and is not grown so extensively. Bananas are of many varieties and are extensively cultivated, each family having its banana plantation. Arrowroot is indigenous but is seldom cultivated. It is used both for food and for laundry starch. Kava is a shrub grown extensively for its root, from which the national nonintoxicant beverage of the same name is made. Kava is used in Germany and America in the manufacture of certain medicines. Sugarcane, coffee, and tobacco are grown in small quantities. The sugarcane leaves are used for the thatch of the native houses.

Tables 13 and 14 furnish the acreage and production of specified field crops in 1929.

No attempt has been made to market the timber of Samoa. Although the surface of the islands is heavily wooded, the timber is not abundant enough to make it worth the labor of getting it to the coast.

Livestock.—Samoan livestock consists of cattle, horses, pigs, and poultry. The number of cattle and horses is constantly increasing. An attempt is being made to improve breeds, animals being imported for that purpose. No sheep are raised as the natives will not eat mutton. A few goats are raised as pets but are not included in the tabular statement.

Table 15 furnishes the number and varieties of livestock in 1930 and 1920.
