Census Publications consists of the following parts issued separately:

- 1. Program for the Year (annually)—an outline of the regular publication program of the Bureau of the Census in the various subject matter fields.
- 2. <u>List of Publications Issued</u> (monthly)—a listing of special publications, reports issued in series at irregular intervals, and regular publications issued less frequently than quarterly.
- 3. Subject Guide (monthly) -- a classified guide to contents of all publications issued during the month.

#### SPECIAL NOTE

This issue of <u>Census Publications</u> combines Part S, <u>Subject Guide</u>, for the three months of April, May, and <u>June</u>. The <u>Guide</u> for the three months is being issued in combined form in order to place the series on a more current basis, but consideration is also being given to issuing the <u>Subject Guide</u> in the future on a quarterly basis. Opinions of users as to the relative merits or disadvantages of quarterly coverage as compared with single month issues will be of assistance in determining future policy.

It will also be helpful if librarians and others using this publication will raise any questions which they have regarding classification of Census reports. Each query will receive individual attention, and, if correspondence indicates widespread interest, the problem will be discussed in a future issue of this series.

### FACTS FOR INDUSTRY SERIES NUMBERING

The Facts for Industry Series which is included among the publications covered in this Guide is, in effect, two related series, one series covering data compiled by or for the War Production Board, and the other covering industry reports of the Bureau of the Census. A list of all releases included in both series can be obtained from the Bureau of the Census.

WPB Industry Series: The policy of releasing industry statistics by the War Production Board whenever such release does not interfere with the war effort was approved in November 1943. The "Facts for Industry" series is the medium by which this policy is carried out. Many of the reports in this series are issued jointly by the War Production Board and the Bureau of the Census. Inquiries and requests for all numbers of this series should be directed to the Eureau of the Census.

Each publication in the "Facts for Industry" series of this group is identified by three numbers: The first shows the Division within the War Production Board responsible for the series; the second, the number of the individual series among those for which that Division is responsible; and the third, the sequence of releases in a given individual series. For example, in the number 1-7-3, the "1" indicates the Aluminum and Magnesium Division of the War Production Board, the "7" indicates the seventh series released by that Division, and the "3" shows that three releases have been published in that series.

Census Industry Series: The Bureau of the Census issues periodically reports on particular phases of industry, some of which date back to the first World War. According to present plans, surveys of the War Production Board which have general economic value will be taken over by the Bureau as those surveys are discontinued by that agency In order to integrate all these reports into a convenient arrangement, it was decided to create a parallel "Facts for Industry" series which would cover all industry reports of the Bureau including those parts of War Production Board surveys which will be extended beyond the war period as part of this program.

The numbering used for this part of the "Facts for Industry" releases is tied to the public inquiry form on which the data are collected. The "M" stands for "Manufactures." The next two digits of the numbering system apply to the 2-digit Standard Commodity Classification. The alphabetical subscript identifies the reporting form in the specific commodity group, and the last two digits identify the month and year of the report. Thus, "MI3C-15" is interpreted as a release of manufacturing data in the commodity field of general purpose industrial machinery; the "15" means that the release covers data for January 1945. The release covering data for February 1945 would have "25" as the last two digits. For quarterly reports the first four characters of the series number are similar to those described above, but the last two

identify the quarter and the year. Thus, the release numbered "MSIE-1-5" is interpreted as a release of manufacturing data in the field of plumbing and heating equipment covering the first quarter of 1945. An annual release is differentiated by the last two digits, "O4" meaning the release for 1944, etc. A one-time release is identified by putting the four digits of the year after the first four digits of the identification symbol, i. e., "M35A-1944."

#### RELEASE OF FOREIGN TRADE INFORMATION

The security regulations, revised as of July 1, 1945, now permit the release of all United States import and export figures through 1944. The revised regulations also permit the current release of 1945 import and export figures except for information on an abbreviated list of strategic, critical, and military commodities and except for information on trade with individual countries in the Pacific theater of military operations. Separate information on Lend-Lease exports in full commodity and country of destination detail through 1943, also may now be published.

For the first time since the United States entered the war, the public can obtain current and practically complete information on United States imports and exports. Information on the trade in 1942, 1943, and 1944 is already available for distribution to the public. Statistics for 1943 and 1942 include separate tables on Lend-Lease exports. Lists of statistical reports covering 1942, 1943, and 1944 and of data which are being released currently during 1945 are available and may be obtained from the Bureau of the Census.

The export figures exclude shipments to the United States armed forces abroad. The foreign trade figures for 1943 and 1944 exclude certain isolated figures still retained in a confidential status.

#### GEOGRAPHIC AREAS

Bince many users of statistics are interested in particular localities, such as a specific city or State, an attempt is made in the Subject Guide to assist in finding such data. Where a survey, such as a housing vacancy survey or a special census, covers only a few specific localities, the name of that locality is given as a cross-reference. However, where all places in a certain type of area, i. e., States, cities with 100,000 or more inhabitants, etc., are covered, no attempt is made to cross-reference each place separately. In these instances a cross-reference is made to GEOGRAPHIC AREAS, and the type of area is specified. For example, all reports showing State data are listed under "GEOGRAPHIC AREAS: STATES" with an indication of the main entry where a more complete description of the publication will be found.

For purposes of the Subject Guide, geographic areas are defined, on the whole, in accordance with usage in the Population Census. (See Sixteenth Census of the United States: 1940, Population, Vol. I.) The heading \*DIVISIONS\* indicates the nine standard geographic divisions formed by groups of States, namely the New England, Middle Atlantic, East North Central, West North Central, South Atlantic, East South Central, West South Central, Mountain, and Pacific Divisions. The general heading, "REGIONS," implies either the four or three area combinations of the Standard Census divisions. In the four region combination, the New England and Middle Atlantic Divisions form the Northeast Region; the East and West North Central Divisions, the North Central; the South Atlantic East and West South Central form the South; and the Mountain and Pacific, the West. For the three region presentation, the Northeast and North Central regions are combined into one designated the North. The South and West are the same as in the four region grouping.

Other regional groupings, used for more specialized presentation, are specifically designated and are defined in the publications listed. These include the Cotton Regions, Customs Districts, and Forest Service Regions.

#### Introduction

With this issue, Part 3, <u>Subject Guide</u> of the Series, "Census Publications," becomes a regular quarterly issue instead of monthly. Needs for current information on Census publications are apparently met by Part 2 of this series, <u>List of Publications Issued</u>. The release of this part on a quarterly basis will also permit more careful preparation.

Suggestions from users as to appropriate cross references and groupings, or criticisms of the <u>Subject Guide</u> will be appreciated. All comment should be addressed to the Director of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

# Aids in Using Census Material

A major census is a comprehensive survey which reports a great amount of detail. Although publications are all issued according to some plan, the plan is not always apparent, and the user is often confused by the detailed reports in attempting to find out what is available on a particular subject. The difficulty created by this condition has led to the establishment of this series in an attempt to provide guides in finding information in the wide variety of Census publications.

Because of its comprehensive coverage in all subject matter fields reported on by the Bureau of the Census, this <u>Subject Guide</u> must of necessity be somewhat general. From time to time, however, more detailed guides to the reports in a particular subject matter field are issued. Such a guide is the <u>Housing: Index of Reports</u> which covers the basic volumes, the supplements, and the special reports of the 1940 Census of Housing. Through a series of 49 tabular indices, the information available from the 1940 Census of Housing, the type of detail, and the volume and page where it can be found, is presented. This report is for sale by the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C., for 35 cents.

Another publication which may be or interest to users of quantitative information is the <u>List of Schedules Used for Collecting Data by the Bureau of the Census: 1945</u>. This publication gives a broad description of the survey work in which the Bureau of the Census is engaged, and includes a listing of the forms used, their identifying numbers or symbols, frequency of the survey, method or canvass, whether complete or sample, number and type or resp. ants, and publications in which the results appear. It is available upon request from the Directof the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

# Foreign Trade Reports

The end of the war has brought about the lifting of all security regulations except for the inclusion of uranium and thorium in the statistics. The Bureau of the Census can now make all data on imports and exports available to the public.

Two catalogues, both bearing the general title United States Foreign Trade Statistical Publications, have been prepared to indicate what was released during the period since 1941. A 17-page pamphlet lists the reports covering the calendar years 1941-1944. Another report, of 20 pages, lists the monthly reports starting with statistics for January 1945.

Supplements to previously censored reports present data previously withheld.

# Monthly Report on the Labor Force

In July 1945, the Bureau of the Census adopted an improved interviewing procedure for obtaining the information on the activity of the civilian population which constitutes the basis for the estimates in Monthly Report on the Labor Force. The report for August, No. 39, is the first in this series showing the results of the new method. This procedure, introduced after many months

of experimental work conducted with the aid of an interagency committee sponsored by the Division of Statistical Standards of the Bureau of the Budget, will provide a more accurate count of persons in the labor force and therefore more accurate estimates of employment and unemployment. The series prior to July 1945 is now being revised and will be published as soon as possible.

# Organizational Changes Within the Bureau of the Census

The headings under which publications are listed in Part 2 of this series, <u>List of Publications Issued</u>, and the identifying letters which appear on some of the publications, refer to Divisions of the Bureau of the Census which are responsible for the preparation and publication of the material.

Recently the Special Surveys Division was discontinued. The reports for which this Division was responsible, including the Monthly Report on the Labor Force, the Labor Force Bulletin, the Survey of Occupancy (and of

Vacancies) in Privately Financed Dwelling Units, and others, will henceforth be issued by the Population Division, and symbols for the series will be adjusted accordingly. For example, the Survey of Occupancy in Privately Financed Dwelling Units, previously the SS-HO series, will henceforth be identified as the P-HO series. The report numbers following this series designation will not be interrupted.

Another recent transfer from one Division to another is the group of reports relating to stocks and consumption of cotton and linters, spindle activity, stocks and consumption of oils and fats, and production and stocks of cottonseed and cottonseed products. These reports, previously prepared in the Agriculture Division, are now being prepared in the Industry Division. On the September releases the identifying letter "A" was replaced by the letter "I". After September these reports will be redesignated in accordance with the series numbering of the Industry Division. The cotton ginning reports continue to be prepared by the Agriculture Division.
