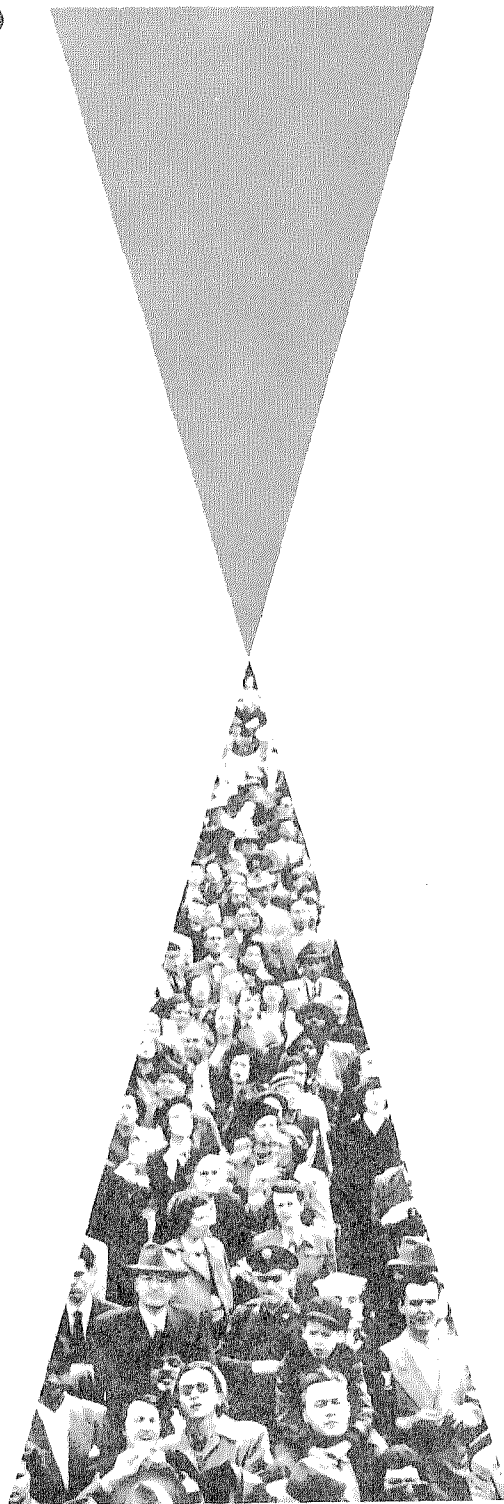

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PREFACE

This report presents statistics from the 1960 Census of Population on the marital status of the population and on married couples by selected characteristics of husband and wife. Legal provision for this census, which was conducted as of April 1, 1960, was made in the Act of Congress of August 31, 1954 (amended August 1957), which codified Title 13 United States Code.

The major portion of the information compiled from the 1960 Census of Population appears in Volume I, Characteristics of the Population, which contains data for the United States, States and counties and their urban and rural parts, cities, minor civil divisions, etc. The present report is part of Volume II, Subject Reports, and is designated as PC(2)-4E. A list of the Volume II Subject Reports appears on the inside of the front cover. A summary description of all the final reports of the 1960 Population Census appears on page IV.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

A large number of persons participated in the various activities of the 1960 Census of Population. Primary responsibilities were exercised by many of the persons listed on the preceding page. Within the Population, Demographic Operations, Field, Geography, and Statistical Methods Divisions, most of the staff members worked on the program. Important contributions were also made by the staffs of the Administrative and Publications Services Division, Cecil B. Matthews, Chief; Budget and Finance Division, William E. FINAL REPORTS OF THE 1960 CENSUS OF POPULATION

The final reports of the 1960 Population Census are arranged in three volumes and a joint Population-Housing series of census tract reports. The 1960 Population Census publication program also includes preliminary, advance, and supplementary reports, certain evaluation, procedural, and administrative reports, and graphic summaries. After publication, copies of all reports are available for examination or purchase at any U.S. Department of Commerce Field Office.

Certain types of unpublished statistics are available for the cost of preparing a copy of the data. Also, under certain conditions, special tabulations of the 1960 Census data can be prepared on a reimbursable basis. In addition, there are available for purchase magnetic tapes and punchcards containing 1960 Census information on the characteristics of a one-in-a-thousand and a one-in-ten-thousand sample of the population of the United States. Confidentiality of the information, as required by law, has been maintained by the omission of certain identification items. Further information about any of these materials can be obtained by writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C., 20233.

Volume I. Characteristics of the Population. This volume consists of separate reports for the United States, each of the 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone. For each of these 57 areas, the data were first issued in four separate paper-bound "chapters," designated as PC(1)-A, B, C, and D. (For Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone, the material normally contained in chapters B, C, and D are included in chapter B.) For library and general reference use, the paper-bound reports have been assembled and reissued in buckram-bound books identified as Parts A and 1 to 57 of Volume I.

Series PC(1)-1A to 57A: Chapter A. Number of Inhabitants. These reports contain final population counts for States and counties and their urban and rural parts, and for standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, all incorporated places, unincorporated places of 1,000 inhabitants or more, and minor civil divisions.

Series PC(1)-1B to 57B: Chapter B. General Population Characteristics. These reports present statistics on sex, age, marital status, color or race, and relationship to head of household for States and counties and their urban and rural parts, and for standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, places of 1,000 inhabitants or more, and minor civil divisions.

Series PC(1)-1C to 53C: Chapter C. General Social and Economic Characteristics. These reports cover the subjects of nativity and parentage, State of birth, country of origin of the foreign stock, mother tongue, place of residence in 1955, year moved into present house, school enrollment by level and type, years of school completed, families and their composition, fertility, veteran status, employment status, weeks worked in 1959, year last worked, occupation group, industry group, class of worker, place of work, means of transportation to work, and income of persons and families. Each subject is shown for some or all of the following areas: States and counties and their urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts, standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, and urban places.

Series PC(1)-1D to 53D: Chapter D. Detailed Characteristics. These reports present most of the subjects covered in chapter C, above, cross-classified by age, color, and other characteristics. There is also included additional information on families, as well as data on single years of age, detailed occupation, and detailed industry. Each subject is shown for some or all of the following areas: States and their urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts; and large counties cities, and standard metropolitan statistical areas.

Volume I, Part A: Number of Inhabitants. This is a compendium of the 57 chapter A reports, i.e., PC(1)-1A to 57A.

Volume I, Parts 1 to 57: Characteristics of the Population. The 57 parts relate respectively to the United States, each of the 50 States, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone. Each part contains the data previously published in the four chapters A, B, C, and D, and is in the form of a separate, buckram-bound book. Parts 54, 55, 56, and 57--for Guam, Virgin Islands, American Samoa, and Canal Zone, respectively--are bound in a single book.

Volume II (Series PC(2) reports). Subject Reports. Each report in this volume concentrates on a particular subject. Detailed information and cross-relationships are generally provided on a national and regional level; in a few reports data for States or standard metropolitan statistical areas are also shown. Among the characteristics covered are ethnic origin and race, fertility, families, migration, education, employment, unemployment, occupation, industry, and income. There is also a report on the geographic distribution and characteristics of inmates of institutions. A list of reports is given on the inside of the front cover.

Volume III (Series PC(3) reports). Selected Area Reports. Four of the reports in this volume present selected characteristics of the population for State economic areas, for standard metropolitan statistical areas, and according to the size and type of place where the individual resided. A fifth report provides data on the social and economic characteristics of Americans overseas.

Series PHC(1). Census Tract Reports. These reports present information on both population and housing subjects. There is one report for each of 180 tracted areas in the United States and Puerto Rico. The population subjects include age, race, marital status, country of origin of the foreign stock, relationship to head of household, school enrollment, years of school completed, place of residence in 1955, employment status, occupation group, industry group, place of work, means of transportation to work, and income of families, as well as certain characteristics of the nonwhite population in selected tracts. The housing subjects include tenure, color of head of household, vacancy status, condition and plumbing facilities, number of rooms, number of bathrooms, number of housing units in structure, year structure built, basement, heating equipment, number of persons in unit, persons per room, year household head moved into unit, automobiles available, value of property, and gross and contract rent, as well as certain characteristics of housing units with nonwhite household head for selected tracts. In addition, for selected tracts these reports contain data on certain population and housing subjects for persons of Puerto Rican birth or parentage and for white persons with Spanish surnames. (This series is the same as the tract reports listed in the publication program for the 1960 Census of Housing.)

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Marital Status

GENERAL

This report presents detailed statistics from the 1960 Census on the marital status of persons 14 years old and over and data for married couples cross-classified by selected characteristics of husband and wife. All of the statistics are based on a 5-percent sample. The report contains data on the following subjects: color or race, nativity and parentage, years of school completed, whether married more than once, years since first marriage, occupation, and income in 1959. This report shows statistics for the United States, urbanized areas combined, and the South. In addition, some of the tables show figures for regions and for the urban, rural-nonfarm, and rural-farm parts of the United States.

RELATED REPORTS

1960 Census reports.--Complete-count statistics on persons 14 years old and over by marital status are presented for States, their urban and rural parts, counties, standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, places of 1,000 or more, and minor civil divisions in chapter B of each State part of Volume I, Characteristics of the Population. Similar data are shown for census tracts in the Series PHC(1) reports. In addition, chapter B of Volume I, Part I, United States Summary, shows statistics on marital status for the United States, the commonwealth of Puerto Rico, outlying areas of sovereignty or jurisdiction, and the United States population abroad. For States and the rural-farm population of counties, statistics on marital status and married couples based on the 25-percent sample are presented in chapter C of Volume I. Chapter D of Volume I presents 25-percent sample statistics on marital status by age, color, and sex for the United States, urban and rural, regions, standard metropolitan statistical areas, and counties of 250,000 or more.

Statistics on marital status, for family and sub-family heads by presence of children under 18 years old, and for unrelated individuals, based on the 25-percent sample, are presented for States and their urban and rural parts in chapter D of Volume I, and for census tracts in the Series PHC(1) reports.

Several other reports in Series PC(2) and PC(3) contain additional information on marital status and married couples. Report PC(2)-4A, Families, presents statistics based on the 5-percent sample on the marital status of heads of households, families, and subfamilies, by number of children. Report PC(2)-3A, Women by Number of Children Ever Born, presents 5-percent sample statistics on marital status of women 15 years

old and over by number of children ever born and statistics on age of husband and age of wife for women 15 to 49 years old. Report PC(2)-4B, Persons by Family Characteristics, presents 5-percent sample statistics on the marital status of persons 14 years old and over, by detailed family status, age, color, and sex, for the United States and urbanized areas, and on the marital status of persons living with one or both parents, by age, color, and sex, for the United States, its urban and rural parts, and the South. Most other reports in Series PC(2) and PC(3) include information on marital status.

1950 Census reports.--Statistics on persons 14 years old and over by abridged marital status categories based on a complete count for States, standard metropolitan statistical areas, urbanized areas, cities, and counties were shown in 1950 Census of Population, Volume II, Characteristics of the Population, chapter B. In chapter C, cross-classifications of marital status by age, and relationship to family head by age, were shown for States and standard metropolitan statistical areas; data for marital status by age were also shown for large cities.

Statistics on marital status by single years of age and on marital status by family status and income were presented in 1950 Census of Population, Volume IV, part 2, chapter D, Marital Status. Volume IV, part 2, chapter E, Duration of Current Marital Status, presented statistics on women 15 to 59 years old for five marital status categories by duration of current marital status, age at entry into current marital status, number of children ever born, years of school completed, and labor force status. Statistics on marital status for females 15 to 59 years old were also published in Volume IV, part 5, chapter C, Fertility, by age of woman, years of school completed, and labor force status, for the United States, urban and rural. Marital status by selected characteristics of women were also shown for States. Statistics on marital status by household status and labor force status for the United States, urban and rural, were shown in 1950 Census of Population, Volume IV, chapter 1A, Employment and Personal Characteristics. Additional statistics on marital status were presented in nearly all of the special reports in Volume IV of the 1950 Census of Population.

1940 Census reports.--Statistics on marital status by age and relationship to head of household for States and large cities were published in 1940 Census of Population, Volume IV, Characteristics by Age.

Furthermore, the 1940 special report entitled "The Labor Force (Sample Statistics)--Employment and Personal Characteristics" contains a cross-classification of household relationship by broad marital status categories and age.

Statistics on duration of first marriage and age at first marriage for 1940, and on duration of first marriage for 1910, were published in the 1940 reports which appeared under the general title Differential Fertility--1940 and 1910.

Current Population Reports.--Annual estimates of the population by marital status and age based on the Current Population Survey are published in Current Population Reports, Series P-20. Occasional reports in this series present more detailed information pertaining to marital status. Series P-20, No. 108, "Marriage, Fertility, and Childspacing: August 1959" presented statistics on marital status by age at first marriage, year of first marriage, and color. Series P-20, No. 88, "Household and Family Characteristics:

March 1958," presented statistics on married couples by ages of husband and wife. Other reports in the P-20 Series for earlier years presented additional detailed statistics on subjects related to marital status. See, for example, Series P-20, Nos. 67, 50, 26, 23, and 20.

AVAILABILITY OF UNPUBLISHED DATA

The data shown in the present report represent the full detail printed out by the computer system. The detail shown for the United States was tabulated separately for each State and was stored on magnetic tape but not printed out. Requests for unpublished data, giving a specific description of the figures desired, may be made by writing to the Chief, Population Division, Bureau of the Census, Washington, D.C., 20233. Inquiries concerning unpublished data should be transmitted to the Bureau as soon as possible because tape files are not maintained indefinitely.

DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Some of the definitions used in 1960 differ from those used in 1950. These changes were made after consultation with users of census data in order to improve the statistics, even though it was recognized that comparability would be affected. The definitions and explanations should be interpreted in the context of the 1960 Censuses, in which data were collected by a combination of self-enumeration, direct interview, and observation by the enumerator.

The definitions below are consistent with the instructions given to the enumerator. As in all surveys, there were some failures to execute the instructions exactly. Through the forms distributed to households, the respondents were given explanations of some of the questions more uniformly than would have been given in direct interviews. Nevertheless, it was not feasible to give the full instructions to the respondents, and some erroneous replies have undoubtedly gone undetected.

More complete discussions of the definitions of population items are given in 1960 Census of Population, Volume I, Characteristics of the Population, Part 1, United States Summary, and in each of the State parts.

MARITAL STATUS

The data on marital status were obtained from answers to question P7 on the Advance Census Report.

In the 1960 Census, as in the 1950 Census, data on marital status were obtained from persons 14 years old and over largely because economic data were to be presented for persons in that age group. In 1940, most of the data on marital status were shown for persons 15 years old and over. In earlier censuses data on marital status were tabulated only for persons 15 years old and over.

The marital status classification refers to the marital status of the person at the time of the enumeration.

Single persons are those who have never married or whose only marriage has been annulled. Persons ever married are those in the categories married (including separated), widowed, and divorced.

Married persons are those who reported themselves as married, whether or not the person's spouse was living in the same household, and include persons who were living in common-law marriages. Persons classified as married, spouse present, are married persons whose spouse was living in the same household, even though he or she may have been temporarily absent on business or vacation, or in a hospital, at the time of the enumeration. Presence of spouse was ascertained by examining entries for household relationship, marital status, and related information, for members of the household. Persons married, spouse absent, are married persons whose spouse did not live in the same household. Such persons are further classified as separated or other married, spouse absent, as defined below. The small number of persons living with their spouse in group quarters are classified as married, spouse absent; if a married person in group quarters was in the sample, his spouse was unlikely to be in

the sample, because in group quarters the sample consisted of every "nth" person in order of enumeration.

The number of married couples is, by definition, identical to the number of married men with wife present.

Separated persons are those with legal separations, those living apart with intentions of obtaining a divorce, and other persons permanently or temporarily estranged from their spouse because of marital discord. Persons with a limited divorce were also classified as separated. Persons classified as other married, spouse absent, include married persons working and living for several months at a considerable distance from their homes, those whose spouse was absent in the Armed Forces or in an institution, immigrants whose spouse remained in another area, and all other married persons (except those reported as separated) whose place of residence was not the same as that of their spouse.

Widowed persons are those whose spouse had died and who were not remarried at the time of the enumeration. Divorced persons are those who had been legally divorced and were not remarried at the time of the enumeration.

Differences between the number of married men and the number of married women are due partly to the absence of husbands or wives from the country at the time of enumeration. Examples are women whose husbands were in the Armed Forces overseas and immigrants whose husbands or wives were still abroad. Differences may also arise because the husband and wife have different places of residence, because of differences in the completeness and accuracy of reporting on marital status for men and women, and because of the methods used to inflate the sample cases. The number of married men with wife present shown in this report should, by definition, be identical with the number of married women with husband present. However, the figures may not be exactly the same because, in the weighting of the sample, husbands and their wives were sometimes given different weights.

WHETHER MARRIED MORE THAN ONCE AND YEARS SINCE FIRST MARRIAGE

The data on whether married more than once and date of first marriage were obtained from answers to the following questions on the Household Questionnaire:

These data were obtained for all ever-married persons in the 25-percent sample, that is, for all persons reported as married, widowed, divorced, or separated at the time of the enumeration. Persons who had been married only once were asked when they were first married, and those who had been married more than once were asked when they were married for the first time. The number of years since the person's first marriage, shown in table 2, was derived by subtracting the date of first marriage from April 1, 1960, and represents the number of completed years since first marriage.

USES AND LIMITATIONS OF THE DATA

In using these statistics, it should be kept in mind that they refer to marital status as of the time of the enumeration. For instance, the number of widowed persons does not include persons who have remarried and are living with their second husband or wife; these persons are classified according to their current marital status. Nonetheless, in the absence of data based on a longitudinal study of identical persons covering their lifetime experience, analyses of lifetime changes in characteristics may be made from cross-sectional data such as these. The figures are of value, also, for studying differences between social and economic groups with respect to the likelihood of marriage, separation, divorce, widowhood, and remarriage.

Because changes in marital status may be selective of certain types of persons, the persons in a marital status class at the time of the enumeration may not be representative of all persons who have entered that class at some time in the past. Thus, if rich widows have a higher probability of remarriage than poor ones, the income distribution of women who are still widows at the time of the enumeration will tend to be lower than the income distribution for all women who have ever been widowed, including those who have remarried.

In addition, it should be kept in mind that the statistics refer to the population enumerated at its usual place of residence. For instance, a married woman whose husband is living away from home because of membership in the Armed Forces would have been assigned the marital status classification "married, spouse absent" because, according to the rules by which the population was assigned a usual place of residence, her husband would have been counted at his military installation rather than at her home.

QUALITY OF THE DATA

The quality of the data on marital status may be judged from information on nonresponse rates and from comparison of the marital status reported by identical persons in the census and in the Current Population Survey. In addition, some information is available on the marital status reported by persons who were divorced immediately before the census.

Allocation for nonresponse.--Information on nonresponse rates on marital status is shown in 1960 Census of Population, Volume I, Characteristics of the

Population, tables B-1, C-2, and D-1. All persons with a nonresponse on marital status were allocated to a definite marital status category, as explained in the section on "Editing," below. Only six-tenths of one percent of persons 14 years old and over in the 25-percent sample failed to respond to the question on marital status or gave a response inconsistent with other information in the schedule. The proportion was 0.6 percent for white persons, and 1.3 percent for nonwhite persons.

The relative quality of data for each marital status class of the population is measured to some extent by the proportion of persons in each class who were assigned to that class by allocation. Only 0.1 percent of the number of married persons shown in the published tables based on the 25-percent sample was allocated (table A). By contrast, the corresponding figure was 2.8 percent for the number of separated persons, and 2.3 percent for divorced persons. The percent of allocation in each marital status class was derived by comparing the number of persons by marital status in the Volume I tables based on the 25-percent sample with the figures in table D-1 of Volume I, which shows the number of persons in each class before allocation for nonresponse. From these sources, rates of allocation for each marital status class may be developed by color, residence, regions, and States. However, some assignments of marital status were not included in the count of allocations, as explained below in the section on "Editing."

The nonresponse rate on whether married more than once was 5.0 percent of the number of ever-married persons. The corresponding figure was 4.6 percent for white persons, and 8.9 percent for nonwhites. About 5.1 percent of the number of persons married once was assigned by allocation, as compared with 4.6 percent of the number of persons married more than once (table B). Data on this subject by color, for States, are presented in table A-1 of the present report. The procedures for editing the information on whether married more than once are described in the section on "Editing," below.

Persons with marital status allocated for nonresponse were more likely than others to have allocations also for the number of times married. One in every three persons with an allocation to one of the "ever-married" categories had an allocation of whether married more than once, as compared with only 1 in every 20 persons whose marital status was not allocated (table C). This suggests that to some extent problems of enumeration on one of these items were associated with problems on the other. However, only 2 percent of persons with whether married more than once allocated had marital status allocated; for 98 percent of these persons, allocation of marital status was not necessary.

Response variance.--Information on the reliability of the data on marital status is shown by measures of simple response variance prepared in connection with the CPS-Census Match Study. As part of that study, the marital status reported for persons in the 1960 Census was compared with the marital status for identical persons in the March 1960 Current Population Survey. Around 98 or 99 percent of married persons and single persons in the CPS were identically reported in the census. Percentages of identical reporting were lower for other classes, especially for separated and divorced persons. Furthermore, in most classes, percentages of identical reporting were lower for males than for females (table D). Several different measures of response variance on marital status are shown by age, color, sex, and residence, in Evaluation and Research Program of the U.S. Censuses of Population and Housing, 1960: Accuracy of Data on Population Characteristics as Measured by CPS--Census Match, Series ER-60, No. 5.

Divorce-Census Match.--Some information on problems of enumeration of divorced persons was obtained in a study of the 1960 Census characteristics of a sample of persons who received divorces in March 1960. This study was sponsored by the Monograph Committee of the American Public Health Association. It is expected that the results of the study will be further reported in the forthcoming American Public Health Association monograph on marriage and divorce. The study involved matching to census records the persons listed in all certificates of divorces occurring in March 1960 in the States of Georgia, Iowa, Ohio, Oregon, and Pennsylvania.

A total of 554 persons were matched to the 25-percent sample records of the 1960 Census, after allowance for persons not included in the 25-percent census sample, for attrition due to persons who had moved away from the address listed in the divorce certificate, and for addresses that were insufficiently precise for matching purposes. Of these 554 persons, all of whom received divorces in March, 418 were reported as divorced in the April 1960 Census, 124 had a marital status report other than divorced, and 12 had a nonresponse on marital status (table E). Persons who were reported as "married, spouse present" in the census doubtless included several who had married again shortly after the divorce decree was issued. Persons reported as separated or "other marital status" (comprising single, widowed, and married, spouse absent except separated) largely represent errors of classification. However, only errors involving the misclassification of divorced persons are reflected in these figures. Figures on net error in classification would require additional information, which is not available, on the extent to which persons of other marital status classes were misclassified as divorced. Furthermore, the errors in reporting of marital status in the census for recently divorced persons may not be representative of errors for all divorced persons.

Some part of the misclassification of recently divorced persons may be due to deliberate misreporting. An additional source of misclassification may be the fact that a relatively large proportion of divorced persons live in lodging houses and other types of living quarters where census information may be reported by persons, other than the person himself, who do not know the person's marital status.

COMPARABILITY

Earlier census data.--Inquiry regarding marital status was first made in the Census of 1880 but the results were not tabulated; the earliest Federal census figures on marital status therefore are those for 1890.

The category "Separated" was included in the question on marital status for the first time in 1950. It was added to the categories "Single," "Married," "Widowed," and "Divorced," included in previous censuses, in order to distinguish between married persons with spouse absent on account of marital discord and other married persons with spouse absent. With the introduction of this category, figures on separated, divorced, and widowed persons may be combined to yield the total number of persons with "broken" marriages. This change, however, may have made the number of persons reported as divorced somewhat smaller in 1950 and 1960 than it would have been under the earlier procedure.

In 1950, as in 1960, the question on marital status included the category "never married," whereas the corresponding term in earlier censuses was "single." This change may have made the number of persons reported as never married in 1950 and 1960 somewhat smaller than it would have been under the earlier procedure.

The 1960 marital status categories are the same as those of the 1950 Census, except for the exclusion of all persons in group quarters from the category "married, spouse present." It is possible, however, that the use of self-enumeration in 1960 rather than direct enumeration, as in previous censuses, has produced some degree of incomparability in the data.

In 1960, and in previous censuses, marital status was not reported for a small number of persons. For such persons marital status was assigned in 1940 and 1950 on the basis of age and the presence of spouse or children. Because of the methods used in 1950, however, some persons who would have been classified as single under the 1940 procedure were classified as "married, spouse absent" or "widowed" in 1950. The procedures used in 1960 for assigning characteristics such as marital status when they were not reported are described below in the section on "Editing."

1960 Census data in other reports.--Other reports present data based on the complete count and the 25-percent sample. The number of persons 14 years old and over in the United States in the 25-percent sample is identical to the number in the complete count, because the totals in the sample were controlled to agree with those in the complete count (table F). This control did not extend to the classifications by marital status. Thus, the 25-percent sample as published overrepresented married persons and underrepresented widowed and single persons. These discrepancies reflect in large part an underrepresentation of primary individuals, most of whom are widowed and single, in the sample, and an overrepresentation of primary family heads, most of whom are married (see 1960 Census of Population, Final Report, PC(2)-4B, Persons by Family Characteristics, pages XIII and XIV). Investigation of available data suggests that these differences arose primarily in the sample designation. The procedure for selecting the sample would have produced unbiased results if the design had been carried out

according to instructions. The designation of the sample by the enumerator at the time he was canvassing was a low-cost procedure which created some opportunity for undetected errors to occur and made control difficult. These and other differences shown in table F

may also result in part from differences in the procedures for editing the complete-count and sample data, and from the fact that the sample data were processed through a clerical coding operation, whereas the complete-count data were not.

The marital status figures from the 5-percent sample shown in this report tend to be in close agreement with those from the 25-percent sample shown in other reports. Where the 5-percent sample data differ from the 25-percent sample data, the 5-percent sample data are, in most cases, in closer agreement with the complete count.

Current Population Survey.--Table F also includes comparisons of figures from the March 1960 Current Population Survey (CPS) with those from the present report. Most of the CPS figures on marital status are in agreement with those in the 1960 Census 5-percent sample when allowance is made for differences in coverage between the Census and the CPS, differences in the classification of married couples in group quarters, and the sampling error of the estimates. The CPS figures include members of the Armed Forces living off post or on post with their families, but exclude all other members of the Armed Forces; whereas, in the Census, all members of the Armed Forces resident in the United States are included. In addition, the small number of married couples in group quarters were classified as married, spouse present in the CPS, whereas in the Census such persons were classified as married, spouse absent, as explained above.

The number of single males in the CPS is too large relative to the Census figure, when account is taken of the exclusion of males in military barracks from the population covered by the CPS. Furthermore, the CPS figure for married males with spouse absent (except separated) falls short of the Census figure by too large an amount to be attributable to this difference in coverage. These differences may represent inconsistencies in the reporting of marital status in the CPS and the Census or chance fluctuations in the data for these marital status classes; persons in these marital status classes are overrepresented in the population in institutions and other group quarters, where the sampling errors in the CPS are relatively large.

A detailed comparison of a number of items, including marital status, appearing in the 1960 25-percent sample and the CPS is available in Evaluation and Research Program of the U.S. Censuses of Population and Housing: 1960, Accuracy of Data on Population Characteristics as Measured by CPS--Census Match, Series ER-60, No. 5.

MEAN

The arithmetic mean is that measure of central tendency which represents the sum of values divided by

the number of values. Mean earnings shown in table 7 is the amount obtained by dividing the total earnings of a group by the number of earners in that group. These amounts are expressed to the nearest dollar.

MEDIAN

The median is presented in connection with the data on age, years of school completed, income, and the difference between age of husband and age of wife. It is the value which divides the distribution into two equal parts, one-half the cases falling below this value and one-half the cases exceeding this value.

A plus (+) or minus (-) sign after the median indicates that the median is above or below that number. For example, a median of "\$10,000+" for income indicates that the median fell in the interval \$10,000 or more. For information on computation of median difference between age of husband and age of wife see discussion of that subject below.

URBAN-RURAL RESIDENCE

In general, the urban population comprises all persons living in urbanized areas and in places of 2,500 inhabitants or more outside urbanized areas. More specifically, according to the definition adopted for use in the 1960 Census, the urban population comprises all persons living in (a) places of 2,500 inhabitants or more incorporated as cities, boroughs, villages, and towns (except towns in New England, New York, and Wisconsin); (b) the densely settled urban fringe, whether incorporated or unincorporated, of urbanized areas; (c) towns in New England and townships in New Jersey and Pennsylvania which contain no incorporated municipalities as subdivisions and have either 25,000 inhabitants or more or a population of 2,500 to 25,000 and a density of 1,500 persons or more per square mile; (d) counties in States other than the New England States, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania that have no incorporated municipalities within their boundaries and have a density of 1,500 persons or more per square mile; and (e) unincorporated places of 2,500 inhabitants or more. The population not classified as urban constitutes the rural population.

FARM-NONFARM RESIDENCE

The rural population is subdivided into the rural-farm population, which comprises all rural residents living on farms, and the rural-nonfarm population, which comprises the remaining rural population. In the 1960 Census, the farm population consists of persons living in rural territory on places of 10 or more acres from which sales of farm products amounted to \$50 or more in 1959 or on places of less than 10 acres from which sales of farm products amounted to \$250 or more in 1959. All persons living in group quarters are classified as nonfarm except the relatively few living in workers' quarters (including quarters for migratory agricultural workers) that are located on a farm or ranch.

URBANIZED AREA

An urbanized area contains at least one city of 50,000 inhabitants or more in 1960 and the surrounding

closely settled incorporated places and unincorporated areas that meet certain criteria relating to population density or land use. An urbanized area may be thought of as divided into the central city, or cities, and the remainder of the area, or the urban fringe. All persons residing in an urbanized area are included in the urban population.

AGE

The age classification is based on the age of the person in completed years as of April 1, 1960, as determined from the reply to a question on month and year of birth.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN AGE OF HUSBAND AND AGE OF WIFE

The difference between age of husband and age of wife was obtained by subtraction of the age of the wife from the age of the husband, and represents the interval in completed years. A negative value indicates that the wife is older than the husband and a value of zero indicates that both are the same age.

The medians shown in table G take into account the approximate nature of some of the derived intervals. Subtraction of one age (in completed years) from another age (also in completed years) produces differences that are subject to errors of plus or minus one year. For example, a computed difference of "2 years" may reflect a true value of anywhere from 1.0 years to 3.0 years. Similarly, a computed difference of "3 years" may reflect a true value of anywhere from 2.0 to 4.0 years. Thus, the range of true values overlaps from one completed interval to another. If the overlapping parts are assumed to be compensatory in nature, then the data are the equivalent of independent intervals that begin and end one-half year on either side of the computed differences, or 1.5 to 2.5 years for the computed "2 years" difference and 2.5 to 4.5 years for the computed "3 to 4 years" difference.

Outer limits for the open-end intervals were set after inspection of distributions based on vital statistics records.

AGE AT FIRST MARRIAGE

Age at first marriage was derived by subtraction of the person's birthdate from his date of first marriage and is expressed in completed years.

RACE AND COLOR

The term "color" refers to the division of population into two groups, white and nonwhite. The color group designated as "nonwhite" consists of such races as the Negro, American Indian, Japanese, Chinese, Filipino, Korean, Hawaiian, Asian Indian, Eskimo, Aleut, and Malayan races. Persons of Mexican birth or ancestry who are not definitely of Indian or other nonwhite race are classified as white.

Negro.--In addition to persons of Negro and of mixed Negro and white descent, this classification includes persons of mixed Indian and Negro descent, unless the Indian ancestry predominates or unless the individual is regarded as an Indian in the community.

American Indian.--In addition to fullblooded Indians, persons of mixed white and Indian blood are included if the proportion of Indian blood is one-fourth or more, or if they are regarded as Indian in the community. Indians living in Indian territory or on reservations were not included in the population until 1890.

Other races.--Separate statistics are given in this report for Japanese, Chinese, and Filipinos. The category "other races" includes Koreans, Hawaiians, Asian Indians, Eskimos, Aleuts, Malaysians, etc.

Mixed parentage.--Persons of mixed racial parentage are classified according to the race of the nonwhite parent, and mixtures of nonwhite races are classified according to the race of the father, with the special exceptions noted above.

Married couples with husband and wife of different race.--Figures on married couples with husband and wife of different race are shown in tables 10 and 12 of this report. These figures may be understated because some couples did not report race on the self-enumeration form (Advance Census Report). For such persons, race was sometimes entered by the enumerator from observation; but, when the enumerator did not interview both husband and wife directly and in cases when race was assigned in the computer, it was assumed that the husband and wife were of the same race.

NATIVITY AND PARENTAGE

Native.--This category comprises persons born in the United States, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or a possession of the United States; persons born in a foreign country or at sea who have at least one native American parent; and persons whose place of birth was not reported and whose census report contained no contradictory information, such as an entry of a language spoken prior to coming to the United States.

Foreign born.--This category includes all persons not classified as native.

Native of native parentage.--This category consists of native persons both of whose parents are also natives of the United States.

Native of foreign or mixed parentage.--This category includes native persons one or both of whose parents are foreign born.

Foreign stock.--This category includes foreign-born persons and native persons of foreign or mixed parentage.

YEARS OF SCHOOL COMPLETED

The data on years of school completed were derived from the answers to the two questions: (a) "What is the highest grade (or year) of regular school he has ever attended?" and (b) "Did he finish this grade (or year)?" Enumerators were instructed to obtain the approximate equivalent grade in the American school system for persons whose highest grade of attendance was in a foreign school system, whose highest level of attendance was in an ungraded school, whose highest level of schooling was measured by "readers," or whose training by a tutor was regarded as qualifying under the "regular" school definition. Persons were to answer "No" to the second question if they were attending school, had completed only part of a grade before they dropped out, or failed to pass the last grade attended.

The number in each category of highest grade of school completed represents the combination of (a) persons who reported that they had attended the indicated grade and finished it, and (b) those who had attended the next higher grade but had not finished it.

EMPLOYMENT STATUS

The data on employment status relate to the calendar week prior to the date on which the respondents filled their Household Questionnaires or were interviewed by enumerators. This week is not the same for all respondents because not all persons were enumerated during the same week.

Employed persons comprise all civilians 14 years old and over who were either (a) "at work"--those who did any work for pay or profit, or worked without pay for 15 hours or more on a family farm or in a family business; or (b) were "with a job but not at work"--those who did not work and were not looking for work but had a job or business from which they were temporarily absent because of bad weather, industrial dispute, vacation, illness, or other personal reasons.

Persons are classified as unemployed if they were 14 years old and over and not "at work" but looking for work. A person is considered as looking for work not only if he actually tried to find work but also if he had made such efforts recently (i.e., within the past 60 days) and was awaiting the results of these efforts. Persons waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off or furloughed are also counted as unemployed.

The "civilian labor force" includes all persons classified as employed or unemployed, as described above. The "labor force" also includes members of the Armed Forces (persons on active duty with the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard).

Persons "not in the labor force" comprise all those 14 years old and over who are not classified as members of the labor force, including persons doing only incidental unpaid family work (less than 15 hours during the week).

OCCUPATION

The data on occupation in this report are for employed persons and refer to the job held during the week for which employment status was reported. For persons employed at two or more jobs, the data refer to the job at which the person worked the greatest number of hours. The occupation statistics presented here are based on the detailed systems developed for the 1960 Census; see 1960 Census of Population, Classified Index of Occupations and Industries, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 1960.

INCOME IN 1959

Information on income for the calendar year 1959 was requested from all persons 14 years old and over in the sample. The unqualified term "income" refers to the sum of amounts reported separately for wage or salary income, self-employment income, and other income. Wage or salary income is defined as the total

money earnings received for work performed as an employee. It represents the amount received before deductions for personal income taxes, Social Security, bond purchases, union dues, etc. Self-employment income is defined as net money income (gross receipts minus operating expenses) from a business, farm, or professional enterprise in which the person was engaged on his own account. Earnings are the sum of wage or salary and self-employment income. Other income includes money income received from such sources as net rents, interest, dividends, Social Security benefits, pensions, veterans' payments, unemployment insurance, and public assistance or other governmental payments, and periodic receipts from insurance policies or annuities. Not included as income are money received from the sale of property (unless the recipient was engaged in the business of selling such property), the value of income "in kind," withdrawals of bank deposits, money borrowed, tax refunds, and gifts and lump-sum inheritances or insurance payments.

COLLECTION AND PROCESSING OF DATA

COLLECTION OF DATA

Several enumeration forms were used to collect the information for the 1960 Census of Population. A few days before the census date, the Post Office Department delivered an Advance Census Report (ACR) to households on postal delivery routes. This form contained questions which were to be answered for every person and every housing unit. Household members were requested to fill the ACR and have it ready for the enumerator. The census enumerator recorded this information on a form specially designed for electronic data processing by FOSDIC (Film Optical Sensing Device for Input to Computer). The information was either transcribed from the ACR to the complete-count FOSDIC schedule or entered on this schedule during direct interview.

In the densely populated areas, the enumerator left a Household Questionnaire to be completed by each household (or person) in the sample and mailed to the local census office. The population and housing information was transcribed from the Household Questionnaire to a sample FOSDIC schedule. When the Household Questionnaire was not returned or was returned without having been completed, the enumerator collected the missing information by personal visit or by telephone and entered it directly on the sample FOSDIC schedule. In the remaining areas, when the enumerator picked up the ACR, he obtained all the information by direct interview and recorded it directly on the sample FOSDIC schedule.

Soon after the enumerator started work, his schedules were examined in a formal field review. This operation was designed to assure at an early stage of the work that the enumerator was performing his duties properly and had corrected any errors he had made.

More detailed descriptions of the 1960 Census procedures in the collection and processing of the data are given in reports entitled United States Censuses of Population and Housing, 1960: Principal Data

Collection Forms and Procedures, 1961; and Processing the Data, 1962, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C., 20402.

MANUAL EDITING AND CODING

After the FOSDIC forms had been checked for completeness in the field, they were sent to a central processing office for manual editing and coding and for microfilming. Except where some special problems arose, there was no manual coding of the FOSDIC forms for complete-count data. On the sample forms, the manual operation was limited to those items where coding required the reading of written entries and therefore could not be done effectively by machine. The coding clerks converted the written entries to codes by marking the appropriate circles on the FOSDIC schedules and at the same time were able to correct obviously wrong entries and sometimes supply missing information.

ELECTRONIC PROCESSING

After the enumerators and coders recorded the information by marking the appropriate circles, the schedules were microfilmed. The information on the microfilm was then read by FOSDIC, which converted the markings to signals on magnetic tape. The tape, in turn, was processed in an electronic computer, which was used extensively to edit and tabulate the data and to produce the publication tables.

EDITING

For a majority of items, nonresponses and inconsistencies were eliminated by using the computer to assign entries and correct inconsistencies. In general, few assignments or corrections were required, although the amount varied by subject and by enumerator.

The assignment of an acceptable entry by machine was based on related information reported for the person or on information reported for a similar person in

the immediate neighborhood. For example, in the assignment of age in the complete-count tabulations, the computer stored reported ages of persons by sex, color or race, household relationship, and marital status; each stored age was retained in the computer only until a succeeding person having the same characteristics and having age reported was processed through the computer; this stored age was assigned to the next person whose age was unknown and who otherwise had the same characteristics. This procedure insured that the distribution of ages assigned by the computer for persons of a given set of characteristics would correspond closely to the reported age distribution of such persons as obtained in the current census.

Specific tolerances were established for the number of computer allocations acceptable for a given area. If the number was beyond tolerance, the data were rejected and the original schedules were re-examined to determine the source of the error. Correction and reprocessing were undertaken as necessary and feasible.

Marital status and whether married more than once.--The computer editing and allocation procedure for marital status from the sample FOSDIC schedule was designed so that the sample marital status entry would be consistent with the entries for whether married more than once, date of first marriage, and detailed family status. Household heads with wives present and wives of household head were treated as married regardless of their original entries. Similarly, if the head or the wife of a husband-wife subfamily or of a husband-wife secondary family was reported in a marital status category other than married, the computer changed the classification to married. Heads of a parent-child subfamily or of a parent-child secondary family with a blank in marital status were edited as separated. If the marital status of a child-in-law, parent, or parent-in-law was reported as never married, this entry was changed to a blank (and then a code was assigned from the matrix described below).

After these edits were performed, all remaining persons with blanks in marital status were assigned a marital status from values stored in a 64-cell matrix in which the variables were type of living quarters, relationship to head of household, presence of children (for household heads only), sex, evidence that the person had ever married (defined as an entry in either of the questions on whether married more than once or date of first marriage, or a relationship entry of child-in-law, parent, or parent-in-law), and age (only for those persons with evidence of ever having married). The editing and allocation of the sample data on marital status occurred after the editing and allocation of type of living quarters, relationship, and sex, and before the editing and allocation of color, age, and all items collected on a sample basis only.

The data on whether married more than once were transferred from the microfilmed stage II FOSDIC schedule to the computer tape without prior manual editing. No manual coding was necessary because the item was precoded on the schedules. A computer edit was used to eliminate inconsistencies and to allocate blanks. Blanks on whether married more than once were allocated as follows: If the person was married,

spouse present, and the person's date of first marriage was the same as or later than that of the spouse, the person was recorded as married once. If the person was married, spouse present, and the person's date of first marriage was earlier than that of the spouse the person was coded as married more than once. For all other persons, blanks for whether married more than once were allocated from the value stored in a 28-cell matrix in which the variables were age, sex, and color.

The extent of allocation for nonresponse on marital status is described in the section on "Quality of the data," above. Certain types of response assignment (or allocation), however, are not shown in these tables. The following are the chief examples for marital status: Allocations of marital status and sex were automatically made for persons identified as wives of household heads or as heads of households with wife present; all persons coded as wives were automatically classified as female and married, and all heads with wife present as male and married. These automatic classifications occurred regardless of the original entries in sex or marital status, and assignments in sex or marital status resulting from these allocations were not recorded. Furthermore, the data shown above on allocations for nonresponse do not include the 0.2 percent of the population for whom data were replicated because there were no sample data for them; for these persons, the characteristics shown are those for persons in the substitute households.

ACCURACY OF THE DATA

Human and mechanical errors occur in any mass statistical operation such as a decennial census. Such errors include failure to obtain required information from respondents, obtaining inconsistent information, recording information in the wrong place or incorrectly, or otherwise producing inconsistencies between entries on interrelated items on the field documents. Sampling biases occur because some of the enumerators fail to follow the sampling instructions. Clerical coding and editing errors occur, as well as errors in the electronic processing operation.

Careful efforts are made in every census to keep the errors in each step at an acceptably low level. Review of the enumerator's work, verification of manual coding and editing, checking of tabulated figures, and ratio estimation of sample data to control totals from the complete count reduce the effects of the errors in the census data.

Very minor differences between tables in this report or between corresponding data in this report and chapters C and D of the Volume I report, Characteristics of the Population, result from imperfections in the electronic equipment. No attempt has been made to reconcile these minor discrepancies.

Some innovations in the 1960 Censuses reduced errors in processing and others produced a more consistent quality of editing. The elimination of the card-punching operation removed one important source of error. The extensive use of electronic equipment insured a more uniform and more flexible edit than could have been accomplished manually or by less intricate mechanical equipment. It is believed that the use of electronic equipment in the 1960 Censuses has

improved the quality of the editing compared with that of earlier censuses but, at the same time, it has introduced an element of difference in the statistics.

A group of reports designated "Evaluation and Research Program Series" deals with the methods, re-

sults, and interpretation of a group of evaluation and research studies of the 1960 Censuses of Population and Housing. A report entitled The Post-Enumeration Survey: 1950, Technical Paper No. 4, presents evaluative material on the 1950 Census.

SAMPLE DESIGN AND SAMPLING VARIABILITY

SAMPLE DESIGN

For persons in housing units at the time of the 1960 Census, the sampling unit was the housing unit and all its occupants; for persons in group quarters, it was the person. On the first visit to an address, the enumerator assigned a sample key letter (A, B, C, or D) to each housing unit sequentially in the order in which he first visited the units, whether or not he completed an interview. Each enumerator was given a random key letter to start his assignment, and the order of canvassing was indicated in advance, although these instructions allowed some latitude in the order of visiting addresses. Each housing unit to which the key letter "A" was assigned was designated as a sample unit, and all persons enumerated in the unit were included in the sample. In every group quarters, the sample consisted of every fourth person in the order listed. The 1960 statistics in this report are based on a subsample of one-fifth of the original 25-percent sample schedules. The subsample was selected on the computer, using a stratified systematic sample design. The strata were made up as follows: For persons in regular housing units there were 36 strata, i.e., 9 household size groups by 2 tenure groups by 2 color groups; for persons in group quarters, there were 2 strata, i.e., the 2 color groups.

Although the sampling procedure did not automatically insure an exact 5-percent sample of persons, the sample design was unbiased if carried through according to instructions. Generally, for large areas, the deviation from the estimated sample size was found to be quite small. Biases may have arisen, however, when the enumerator failed to follow his listing and sampling instructions exactly.

RATIO ESTIMATION

The statistics based on the 5-percent sample of the 1960 Census returns are estimates that have been developed through the use of a ratio estimation procedure. This procedure was carried out for each of the following 44 groups of persons in each of the sample weighting areas:¹

¹ Estimates of characteristics from the sample for a given area are produced using the formula:

$$x' = \sum_{i=1}^{44} \frac{x_i}{y_i} Y_i$$

where x' is the estimate of the characteristic for the area obtained through the use of the ratio estimation procedure, x_i is the count of sample persons with the characteristic for the area in one (i) of the 44 groups, y_i is the count of all sample persons for the area in the same one of the 44 groups, and Y_i is the count of persons in the complete count for the area in the same one of the 44 groups.

The sample weighting areas were defined as those areas within a State consisting of central cities of urbanized areas, the remaining portion of urbanized areas not in central cities, urban places not in urbanized areas, or rural areas.

For each of the 44 groups, the ratio of the complete count to the sample count of the population in the group was determined. Each specific sample person in the group was assigned an integral weight so that the sum of the weights would equal the complete count for the group. For example, if the ratio for a group was 20.1, one-tenth of the persons (selected at random) within the group were assigned a weight of 21, and the remaining nine-tenths a weight of 20. The use of such a combination of integral weights rather than a single fractional weight was adopted to avoid the complications involved in rounding in the final tables. In order to increase the reliability, where there were fewer than 275 persons in the complete count in a group, or where the resulting weight was over 80, groups were combined in a specific order to satisfy both of these conditions.

These ratio estimates reduce the component of sampling error arising from the variation in the size of household and achieve some of the gains of stratification in the selection of the sample, with the strata being the groups for which separate ratio estimates are computed. The net effect is a reduction in the sampling error and bias of most statistics below what would be obtained by weighting the results of the 5-percent sample by a uniform factor of twenty. The reduction in sampling error will be trivial for some items and substantial for others. A byproduct of this estimation procedure, in general, is that estimates for this sample are generally consistent with the complete count with respect to the total population and
